From 1908 to 1915,

the Japanese Association rented space at 1614 Park Street. It moved to 2306 Pacific 1915-1916, then to the 2256 Pacific Avenue location pictured here.

It is at 2256 Pacific that the Official California Japanese elementary School was housed in the same building, also beginning 1916. It would remain here until 1926.

Architecturally, 2256 was Italianate in detail and style, suggesting it was originally constructed in the late 1860s to 1870s. In the 1897 and 1910 Sanborn maps, it is identified as tenements and on the 1934 and 1948 Sanborns as a dwelling.

On July 26, 1926, a building permit was issued for the construction of a new building at 2320 Buena Vista Ave, which adjoins the Buddhist Temple. It signaled the end of the school's time at 2256.

2320 would be the new location of the Japanese Association, and also the Temple's own language school. It is unclear if 2256 Pacific was a part of the Temple. There is no mention of it in the official Alameda Temple history. It's possible that 2256 was run by the Japanese Association.

2256 Pacific was demolished in 1957 for an apartment building. By an odd coincidence, the building at 2320 Buena Vista met the exact same fate - razed in 1957 for the apartments that are owned by the temple and exist today (as of 2023).
