

My dear Mr. Ennis:



In betterment of marale and spirit of families whose husbands have been interned, it has been our sad task to comfort them and do everything possible in efforts for their return to the family.

We now refer to the case of Joshin Motoyoshi, who is now interned at the Santa Fe Detention Camp, since April 1942. We know the Motoyoshi family as a family of good standing. Mr. Motoyoshi, we know has done a great deal in the Americanizing the people of his own race, and too, aided greatly in the struggle of bettering the citizens of the United States. He is the father of six children: Merika, 15; Asoka, la; Sachimaro, 10; Kazumaro, 7; Mitsumaro, 3; and Miyuki, 1, and they are greatly in need of fatherly advice. We feel that they are at an age when they can easily be led unto stray with confusion. We as a group wonder if something can be done to have Mr. Motoyoshi return to his family, so he may again resume the normal way of life with his family, not for his selfish motive, but for a humanitarian and a sociological view. Dear Sir:

My husband was placed in the custody of the Santa Fe Detention Camp, New Mexico, on April 1942, and hence, we who were left behind find ourselves at a great loss without his guidance. As far as I know, he has been eager to abide by the laws of the United States, and was very eager in the Americanizing of the first generation (isseis) and too, lead the second generations (niseis) into becoming a good American Citizen.

After my husband was interned, I did my utmost in rearing our six children: Merika, 15; Asoka, lz; Sachimaro, 10; Kazumaro, 7; Mitsumaro, 3; and Miyuki, 1, to be good citizens. I did not for this reason, apply for the Family Reunion Camp, fearing that it will cause great effect upon their becoming better citizens of the United States. They are now at the age when much guidance of the father is most necessary. Mitsumaro, being so small, do not remember father and always wonder of the whereabouts of him, while Miyuki, the unfortunate one, had not the opportunity to this date to see him.

For their sake, Mr. Ennis, I extend my plea to you in considering the release of my husband at the earliest date possible. I am anxiously awaiting to hear from you. Until then, I have the honor to remain,

On December 8, 1943 an Alien Enemy Hearing Board composed of members appointed specially to rehear cases of interned aliens afforded the Subject, an interned Japanese alien, a rehearing.

The Board sat at the Japanese Internment Campt at Santa Fe, New Mexico and was presided over by Mr. ATTILLIO di GIROLAMO, Special Assistant to the Attorney General. At the conclusion of the rehearing the Board recommended that the alien be paroled.

Sir: Re: Petition for a Temporary Parole

Dated: October 30, 1943.

I, Joshin Motoyoshi, am the minister of Japanese Buddhist Temple formerly located at 2325 Pacific Avenue, Alameda, California, and am now an internee at Santa Fe Detention Station, Santa Fe, New Mexico.

On or about September 16, 1943, Mr. Jerre Mangione, the Assistant to the Commissioner of Immigration & Naturalization Service, Philadelphia, Pemsylvania, visited this Detention Station, and on that occasion I made my personal appeal to Mr. Mangione to aid me in solving my difficult family problem by letting me reunite with my wife and children on the following three measures:

(First) By an early transfer of myself and my family to the Family Internment Camp at Crystal City, Texas. On account of an abnormal mental condition of my wife, Mrs. Yukiko Motoyoshi (33) who is residing at 37-1 D & C, Central Utah Relocation Center, Topaz, Utah, she may refuse to be moved to the Family Internment Camp with our small children

namely: Merika Motoyoshi (14), daughter; Asoka Motoyoshi (12), daughter, Sachimaro Motoyoshi (10) son;

Sachimaro Motoyoshi (10) son, Kazumaro Motoyoshi (7) son,

Mitsumaro Motoyoshi (3) son, and

Miyuki Motoyoshi (1) daughter born after my internment.

In the event that Mrs. Motoyoshi, my wife, refuses to come to the Family Interment Camp I asked Mr. Mangione to take the necessary step to force her to come to the Family Camp, but this Mr. Mangione said was impossible. (Second) If my wife refuses to come to the Family Camp I ask the United Government would release me on parole immediately after the refusal of my wife. As a matter of fact this release on parole could be effected only after a lengthy rehearing process, and as your honor are well aware of the situation, the rehearing takes unusually a long time and I am afraid that my family problem may not be solved if my reunion takes such a long time and process. In fact I have no sponsors nor supporters in my case as I had little opportunity to associate with Caucasian American people while I was in Alameda, California and I have little confidence

in getting my release through a rehearing of my case, even thoug I had done nothing aginst the interest of this country. So far from what I see very few Buddhist priests or ministers or Shinto ministers have been released since the rehearing regulation became effective.

The main point is that I need an earlier reunion with my wife and children in order to save them, and to prevent the break-down of my respectable family which the United States Government separated from me by force.

(Third) In the event that the above First and Second propositions are not accepted or impracticable I ask that your honor will please permit me to visit my home in Topaz, Utah by a temporary parole of say 60 days or so so that during that period I can work my way through in straightening out my difficult situation which is fully described in my petition to Mr. Jerre Mangione. Since I am the Buddhist Minister I am entirely out off from any income, and on account of my large number of family members both my family and myself need such financial assistance from Welfare Department of United States Government. Such expenses as needed in the travellings bakk and forth between Santa Fe and Topaz must be born by the government Welfare Organization, and for this I sincerely ask that your honor will please give your special assistance.

For your information I am attaching herewith a detailed statement of my family circumstances which requires an immediate humane consideration As the Japanese Internee and a Buddhist Temple Minister I must appeal to your honor for the special assistance in saving my family at this time. I believe that the facts finding report has already been made by Miss Evelyn W. Hersey, Assistant to the Commissioner of Immigration & Naturalization Service as Mr. Mangione told me that he would turn over the matter to Miss Hersey. Under the circumstance kindly get in touch with Miss Hersey and expedite the decision of your Unit regarding my petition as I would like to know what I should do about my family at once. I would sincerely appreciate it if your honor could acknowledge receipt of this petition and advise me what further steps I should take in regard to my case.

Motoyoshi has no fund to pay the Government for the transportation or the expenses of the guard and therefore asks for such a temporary parole which was granted to many other internees heretofore.

If this last request is granted the Rev. Motoyoshi wishes that it does not take too long a time in investigation and other procedure. Rev. Motoyoshi feels that even if he could straighten out his family problem eventually he must ask for the early transfer to the Family Internment Camp.

For your information Rev. Motoyoshi's written statement which he wrote in the Japanese language and which was translated by Geo. Shichitaro Fugii, the Assistant-Spokesman of the Japanese Internees at Samta Fe Detention Station. is attached herewith.

Kindly note the helpless position in which Rev. Motoyoshi is now placed owing to inability to meet with his wife and children and due to the influence that Mr. Masato Maruyama maybe grang in the Central Utah Relocation Center over the family members of Rev. Motoyoshi.

It is the fervent wish of this writer, Geo'. S. Fujii, that the wish of Rev. Motoyoshi be fulfilled by the aid of the United States Government from the standpoint of humanity and justice which I believe is the principle that the United States of America stands for.

STATELENT written by Rev. Joshin Motoyoshi and translated into English by Geo. Shichitaro Fujii, Vice-Spokesman of the Internees at Santa Fe, New Mexico.

In order to save the break-down of my beloved family I wish to mak a detailed explanation of the circumstance of myself and my wife and I beg for the humane consideration and aid of your honor. If your official advice be given in this case I would appreciate greatly.

In February, 1942 the Commander of the Fourth Defense Area on the Pacific Coast issued an order to all Japanese and its descents to evacuate to the interior States . We the Japanese who lived in Alameda, California for over 20 years, some as long as 40 years had inexpressible hardship in this sudden evacuation order because of the fact that we had to find our new place first and the prospect of making living in such an unaccustomed interior States was very poor. Approximately only one-third of the population of Japanese in Alameda could decide where to go but the majority were to be taken care of by the Welfare Committee of Japanese in Alameda. and as I was one of the Committee members I made an effort in locating new places for about 50 families. To straighten out various things of our Buddhist Temple of Alameda which has the thirty-years history in Alameda was something very difficult. For these reasons I worked for about two weaks without regular sleeping time, and during that busy weeks my wife. who was pregnant and was about to give a birth to a baby, had an extremely

of the years, some as long as 40 years had inexpressible hardship in this sudden evacuation order because of the fact that we had to find our new place first and the prospect of making living in such an unaccustomed interior States was very poor. Approximately only one-third of the population of Japanese in Alameda could decide where to go but the majority were to be taken care of by the Welfare Committee of Japanese in Alameda, and as I was one of the Committee members I made an effort in locating new places for about 50 families. To straighten out various things of our Buddhist Temple of Alameda which has the thirty-years history in Alameda was something very difficult. For these reasons I worked for about two weaks without regular sleeping time, and during that busy weeks my wife, who was pregnant and was about to give a birth to a baby, had an extremely hard time in straightening out the family things. We had five small childv ren age ranging from 13 to 14 months old baby at that time and therefore it was really a difficult situation for my wife.

Thus we evacuated from Alameda to Niles. California on February 19,1942 under a great difficulty. In these days the Japanese farmers in and around Niles, California were confused by the rumours of their own evacuation and practically all of them were reluctant in planting seeds and taking care of their own gardens. Seeing this situation I encouraged the farmers there not to hesitate in taking care of their vegetable-garden as it would be a shame to leave their garden with weeds spoiling the vegetables. I told them that in order to show our appreciation of the happy lives which we enjoyed for so many years in this country we should all work hard in the prodeution of the food, particularly the vegetables, and keep the garden in good shape.

In order to show a good example I worked hard myself in the farm, and by my advice and leadership practically all of the Japanese farmers changed their attitude and worked hard in the farm as before. Nearly 90% of the Japanese farmers kept their work till the last day of their evacuation, which order came later on, and I learned that there was a good crop of vegetable in Niles, California and I am satisfied to hear that good news.

In spite of my good-will and efforts for the war production of this country I was apprehended as an alien enemy on April 28, 1942 and I was thus forcibly separated from my dear wife and small children who saw me off in tears. I believed that my innocence would be proven after an investigation the the F. B. I., however probably due to my poor knowledge in speaking English or probably due to the misunderstanding of the F. B. I. officer I was sent to Sharp Park, California. At that time the young man described in my Statement (page 1) and two couples who were under my care helped my family.

In the meantime my family had to be transferred from Niles, California to the Tanforan Assembly Center in May, 1942. Under the circumstance I wrote to my wife immediately informing her that I believed in her faithfulness to me but that in order to prevent such an unfounded rumout Mr. Masato Maruyama should be

moved to another barrack immediately. I also wrote to the said young man to the same effect, but both my wife and the young man gave no reply to my request. Then the information I received from other people near them told me that the young man was still in the same room with my family. Even though I received a few letters from my wife immediately after my suggestion to my wife and to the said young man my wife did not mention anything about my suggestion of transferring the young man to other barrack. Under the circumstance I wrote her again urging her to have the young man moved to other barrack and I finally received the reply from her that as soon as she gave birth to the baby Mr. Maruyama would be moved to the other barrack, but the general tone of my wife's letter was such that she was very much discouraged in my letter, and that she felt the birth of the sixth baby might be fatal to her life, and that the children be taken care by myself after her death. Therefore I immediately wrote several letters to her to cheer her up. On the 30th day of June, 1942 she gave birth to a baby girl.

During the weeks that she stayed in the Hospital the 13 years old daughter of mine had to take care of the other four small children at home, and this situation caused my wife the greatest worries in her life as the children's father was separately interned. The oldest daughter Merika wrote me about that time asking me why her daddy is not coming back home, and begging me to come home to help the children. He did not only refuse to accept the suggestion but he kept on visiting and staying my home and the bad rumours started going around against my wife and the

young man. My Church members gave this advice to the young man but this kind act, (at least that is what they thought best thing to do) caused an indescribable worries on the part of my poor wife who was still weak from the birth of the baby. Mentally she was broken down by this poor reputation of her and the young man. By this unfortunate incident my wife began suspecting me thinking that I was the one who put up this act by asking some of the leaders of my Church members. As a matter of fact I had nothing to do with this meeting or the suggestion, but my wife thought that I did and she was very angry. Under the circumstance I was put into the most embarrasing position. In the meantime I was transferred to Angel Island and then to Lordsburg Internment Camp, Lordsburg, New Mexico, and during all that few months my wife stopped writing me entirely inspite of my continued writing to her.

By this time all of the Japanese in the Tanforan Assembly Center were ordered to be moved into Central Utah Relocation Center, Topaz, Utah, but from my wife there was no letter advising me of her new address in Topaz, Utah. I was very much worried about her queer attitude and so I wrote to one of my friends in the Topaz Center and asked him to advice my wife to write me. As the result I received about three letters from her but she merely asked ms to remit her some money for the purchase of some clothings.

If this situation continues I am afraid that my beloved family will be completely broken-down as at present the gap between my wife and I is getting wider at all times. This unfortunate situation will undoubtedly affect the pure, innocent minds of my small children which number is new as many as six as described above. I am not blaming my wife for this as I still believe firmly in my wife. In fact maybe no body is to be blamed of this situation, but I am afraid that the shock that gave to my wife

immediately after her giving the birth of a baby might have caused her losing her mental balance. It seems to me that this queer attitude of my wife is not only because of her obstinate nature. At any rate this unfortunate situation was caused because of the forcible separation of myself from my poor family.

I have been intermed now over sixteen months (16) and I still do not be the country know why I was ordered intermed. In my fifteen years of my life I am confident that I had contributed my share for the welfare and the good of the United States of America but I had never done any thing which conflicts with the interest of this country. At the brief hearing held in San Francisco in June, 1942 I was given but a few minutes and could not express fully what I wanted to tell.

I would sincerely appreciate it if your honor could give your special consideration in my case and aid me to solve this unfortunate family difficulty at the earliest possible date. ( I want to be transferred to the Family Internment Camp, and ask the government to have my family moved there, by force, if necessary. Kindly give your sympathetic consideration about this petition.



HEARING BOARD'S RECOMMENDATION: Internment, which was concurred in by
the United States Attorney, and by a reviewing attorney of
the Department of Justice in the original memorandum of July
21, 1942. Subject submitted additional evidence in support
of his application for rehearing to the United States Attorney,
and after consideration was given the same, the application
was denied on the ground that no new evidence of enough importance had been presented to make it probable that any
different result would take place if a rehearing were granted.
Said evidence consisted of letters from the subject's acquaintances,
friends and his family.

CHARGE: Dangerous alien enemy - pro-Japanese sympathies and activities.

EVIDENCE:

Subject, a Japanese alien, is married and has 5 children, arranging in ages from  $1\frac{1}{2}$  years to 13 years, was born in Japan in 1897, and entered the United States in 1928. He made one trip to Japan in the year 1937. He lived in Honolulu from 1927 to January, 1928, in San Francisco from February, 1928 to August, 1937, and lived in Alameda, California, from December, 1937 to May, 1942. Subject married a Japanese alien, and all of his children were born and are now residing in the United States.

Subject has a brother in Japan, who is a Buddist Priest. Subject has a passport issued in Japan, Visaed at Yokohama, August 12, 1927 - no date given and not subject to expiration. Subject registered under the Alien Registration in 1940, and his number is 2013256, at Alameda, California. Subject estimates his household and personal effects at \$60.00 and an automobile at \$500.00, located at R.F.D. Box 372, Niles, California. Subject owns a farm and hill land, residence and Buddhist temple worth 100,000.00 Yen located at Fukui-Ken, Japan. Subject has lived in this country since 1928, with the exception of the one trip to Japan in 1937.

His wife's maiden name is Yukiko Kasai, who was born in Japan in 1910, and came to the United States in 1928 from Honolulu. Subject's mother and father lived and died in Japan.

Subject reads the Japanese-American and the Japanese New World and receives them by carrier. He speaks and understands Japanese and English. Subject is a Buddhist Priest by occupation. and stated that he inherited this position as a successor to his father 8 years before coming to the United States. He has had 6 years grammar school, 5 years middle school, 2 years at the Buddhist College, and 5 years at the Tokyo University at Tokyo, and has a degree of Bachelor of Arts. Subject has been a newspaper representative for the New World Sun in San Francisco. He is a member of the Japanese Association, and has circulated among the Buddhist churches in behalf of Buddhism. He has been a close associate of Japanese Navy men and of a notorious Japanese espionage agent who returned to Japan in the fall of 1941. According to the F.B.I. report, subject has spent much of his time around military men and establishments in Japan and he knew how rigorously the Japanese trained and explained the intricate groupings of soldiers (20 men to a group and how the groups would deploy and fall) - also that subject talked proudly of the technique in advance which was designed to prevent the enemy from getting the proper machine-gun range.

Continuing the F.B.I. report, subject stated that he returned to Japan in 1937, remained there about two months and again returned to the United States, and that he made this trip to attend the funeral services for his father. He denied having received any military training in Japan and stated that after having been examined by a military official he was excluded from military service because of poor eyesight and under-weight condition. Subject admitted that he donated \$5.00 to Heimusha Kai about  $3\frac{1}{2}$  years ago, and stated that it was his duty as a priest to contribute to charity and compared the Heimusha Kai to the Red Cross. Subject denied that he possessed any knowledge concerning the Japanese army or its methods of training. He denied that he would support the Japanese Government nor bear arms for same. He denied that he was ever an officer or member of the Japanese Association or any other Japanese organization other than the Buddhist Church.

The Board was impressed that the subject is intensely pro-Japanese, as admitted by him, going about from one Buddhist Church to another making speeches and inculcating the Buddhist cult to the Japanese in this country. He also admitted before the Board that he spent much time with the Japanese Navy men, and that he was a bosom friend of a notorious Japanese espionage agent who returned to Japan in the fall of 1941, and the Board felt on the face of the record that the subject was a dangerous alien enemy and should be interned. RECOMMENDATION:

The reviewing attorney agrees with the recommendation of the Board, the United States District Attorney and of the reviewing attorney of the Department of Justice that subject be interned. The record shows that he is one of the most highly educated Japanese aliens to come to this country, and with his educational background and his experience, he is bound to exercise an influence over people with whom he comes in contact. He denied that he was affiliated with any of the Japanese organizations or that he was loyal to Japan in the F.B.I. report and admitted just the reverse when he appeared before the Board.

Subject has been in this country since 1928, with the exception of one trip back to Japan in 1937, and yet the records show that he has only \$560.00 invested in this country and 1,000 yen invested in real estate and holdings in Japan. Subject has been receiving a salary of \$100.00 per month for the last 14 years, doing as he states missionary work. Interning this subject might work a hard-ship on his wife and 5 children, but this subject is too potentially dangerous, and the record shows all of his sympathies and interests are in Japan.

The records show the subject has 100,000 yen invested in real estate in Japan, and unless he inherited this property from his father and family it would be impossible for the subject to accumulate this much property in Japan. He has made something like \$19,600.00 since he came to this country. Interning the subject would throw an additional burden on this country in providing subsistence for the wife and 5 children, but this is a burden we will have to carry for the duration. I recommend internment for the duration.

I have never received a letter from my wife since last November. I warry about my family because I could not know that true condition of my family. I fear the circumstances of my family are niserable. I believe our long separation is the big cause of such trouble. I must have the responsibility and duty to raise up and educate my six children (not duel citizens) as to this country. Please would you kindly to allow me to do loyal American citizens. RE: JOSHIN MOTOYOSHI, Enemy alien, D. J. File No. 146-13-2-12-3658, F. B. I. File No. 100-10645.

Today I denied the application of Joshin Motoyoshi, of Alameda, California, Japanese alien, now detained at Camp Lordsburg, New Mexico, for a rehearing of his case. No new evidence of enough importance has been presented to make it probable that any different result would take place if a rehearing were granted. His application is based upon assertions of loyalty made by members of his family and many members of his congregation, and several friends, of his loyalty and integrity, coupled with their entreaties to allow him to join the family at their relocation center because of hardships resulting from their separation.

The Alien Enemy Hearing Board found that this alien was born in Japan in 1897. He entered the United States at San Francisco, California, in 1928 and since that time made one trip to Japan in the year 1937. He has resided in various places in the United States and finally at Alameda, California, from 1937 to the present time. He is by occupation a Buddhist Priest in San Francisco, California, and has been such for fourteen years. He inherited his position of Buddhist Priest as successor to his father eight years before coming to the United States. does missionary work as such Buddhist Priest. He owns a farm and a residence and Buddhist temple in Japan of the value of 100,000 yen. He is married to a Japanese woman who entered the United States in 1928. They have five children, respectively 13, 11, 9, 5 and 1 years of age, all born in California and all residing therein. His father and mother died in Japan. He has a brother in Japan, who is also a Buddhist priest. He was educated in Tokio University in Japan. He has been a newspaper representative for the New World Sun. He is a member of the Japanese Association. He is intensely pro-Japanese, as admitted by him, going about from one Buddhist Church to another making speeches and inculcating the Buddhist cult to the Japanese in this country. He admitted that he spent much time with Japanese

Dear Mr. Hennessey:

This is in regards to Reverend Joshin Motoyoshi who has been interned on August 11, 1942 for the duration of the war. Since he had no connection with any organization which is subversive to this country, he does not know on what account he has been interned and is asking an opportunity for rehearing in his case.

I have personally known him for over ten years. He was a minister of the Alameda Buddhist Church, serving the people of Alameda, and of Alameda County. During this time I do not recall any conduct that indicates he is dangerous to the welfare of this country. In all my observation I have known him to be of noble character.

In his contact with the Japanese parent group he has always impressed upon them to be law-abiding residents and to bring up the children to become good American citizens. To the young people he has constantly stressed the moral responsibility of becoming upright citizens, particularly in respect to the community welfare work and helped to minimize delinquency and social problems among the Japanese residents.

As for his family his wife and six children are now evacuees at Tanforan Assembly Center. The oldest is 13 year old daughter and the youngest was born at this center about five weeks ago. They are being brought up to be good American citizens.

On the bases of his conduct and his deep devotion to his family I hold every confidence in him to be a law-abiding resident of this country. Since it is also to the best interest of his six young children that he rejoin them in the relocation area I'm requesting you to consider a rehearing for Reverend Motoyoshi.

Dear Sir:

I am writing to you in behalf of Reverend Joshin Motoyoshi, who is now interned in Sharp Park Detention Camp. I am a law-abiding resident of Warm Springs since 1912. I have endeavored and exemplified in every way to be 100% American at all times, and I have given my full support in all the county's and community's welfare. In the Red Cross War Disaster Emergency Campaign, I was instrumental in helping to being the alloted quota of my county. I am a father of seven children, all American citizens, all loyal to the cause of Freedom and Liberty. Two of my oldest sons are in the service of our beloved country; Henry Kato, who is now stationed at Camp Savage, Minnesota, and the other Joseph Kato, stationed at Camp Grant, Illinois, United States Army.

I have known Reverend Motoyoshi for a period of at least ten years and have thought very highly of him as a civic-minded citizen of Alameda, and a good influence to all American-Japanese concerned.

Reverend Motoyoshi is one of the most well beloved member of the Japanese community of the city of Alameda. He stood out as an individual different from the rest of the first generation Japanese, because his contact and work was mostly amongst the second-generation Japanese-American citizens. He has always preached loyalty to America to all his boys. They all regarded him as the second "Father Flanagan of the Boys' Town" of Alameda Japanese Community. 

I fully understand the above and recognize that my execution of it will not prejudice any opportunity I may have for repatriation or reconsideration of the order directing my internment.

I also understand that the presentation of this form does not entitle me to the relief sought or imply a promise that it will be given.

DETAILS:

#### AT SAN FRANCISCO, CALIFORNIA:

The Alien Enemy Hearing Board, Northern District of California, meeting at San Francisco on June 4, 1942, recommended that the subject be interned.

At his hearing, the subject admitted that he is intensely pro-Japanese and that he spent considerable time going from one Buddhist Church to another making speeches and inculcating the Buddhist religion to the Japanese in this country. We further admitted that he spent much time with former members of the Japanese Navy.

On July 2, 1942, the Attorney General ordered that the subject be interned.

By letter dated August 14, 1942, the Immigration and Naturalization Service advised that the subject had on that date been delivered to the Army authorities at Angel Island, California, for internment.

A review of the file indicates that on February 27, 1942, Mr. JOHN OKADA, 456-25th Street, Oakland, California, advised Special Agent LEO A. SCHON that approximately two weeks prior to that date, he had taken part in a conversation between the subject and one SCOTTY TSUCHIYA, President of the Alameda Chapter of the Japanese American Citizens League. OKADA stated that the subject made the statement that all Japanese must be very discreet and must be quiet at the present time, but nevertheless, all must remember their mission and what they are supposed to do at the appropriate time. He reminded those present again that they were all Japanese and had to work for the best interests of Japan. According to OKADA, MOTOYOSHI appeared to have a better than average knowledge of military science and tactics and explained to two members of the JAPANESE AMERICAN CITIZENS LEAGUE present army tactics on how to handle themselves in actual combat in the field.

On January 9, 1942, Confidential Informant SF610 advised Special Agent LEO A. SCHON that the subject was the local pastor of the Alameda Buddhist Church and that recently he had impressed the Japanese in Alameda as being very secretive and constantly believes that he is being kept under surveillance.

SF-610 stated that the subject originally entered the United States as a newspaper reported which position he held for about ten years. Subject went to Japan about five years ago and returned to the United States in 1940. According to informant, it is very unusual for an individual to complete an education in the Buddhist religion in one year and that usually the students of Buddhism study the religion for five or six years. For this reason, he stated that he personally felt suspicious of the subject, inasmuch as he was made a Buddhist minister in the short space of one year.

SF-610 asserted that when war broke out, the subject was sure that he would be apprehended and everyone in Alameda thought so too. He hid in his home for two weeks and refused to appear on the street.

According to this same informant, subject was a bosom friend of Captain TAKIO OMORI of the Imperial Japanese Army, who returned to Japan

last fall after having completed two or three years of attendance at the University of California, as a student of Engineering. Captain OMORI has been heretofore reported as an active espionage agent for the Japanese Government during his stay in this country.

Mr. HARRY KONO, formerly President of the Japanese Association of Alameda and familiarly known as the mayor of the Japanese in that city, advised Special Agent SCHON that he personally believed the subject to be the most dangerous Japanese in Alameda at the present time. He stated that upon the outbreak of war, MOTOYOSHI was "shaking in his boots" all the time and was afraid he would be picked up; that he was active in providing comfort kits for the Japanese soldiers on duty in China, and was the leader in collecting tinfoil among Alameda Japanese to be sent to Japan. He concluded by stating that subject was 9% Japanese and that he has worked for Japan's Cause in the past and possibly would do so in the future if given the opportunity.

A review of the subject's Alien Enemy Questionnaire reveals no further pertinent information other than that contained in reports of this case.

In the arrest register of the San Francisco Field Division, the subject has been designated SFJ 593. A disposition sheet for subject is being forwarded herewith to the Bureau.

I wish to thank you for your letter of August 20, furnishing information about Rev. Joshin Motoyoshi and his family.

I regret to state that on the basis of the information that we now have it will not be possible to make a change of his present status as an internee because of the recent order by the Attorney General. However, it is possible under recent regulations to apply for a rehearing directly to the Honorable William Fleet Palmer, Los Angeles, California, United States Attorney who handled Mr. Motoyoshi's case. The application need not follow any set form.

I have forwarded your letter directly to Mr. Palmer and suggest that Mr. Motoyoshi's family may, if they apply for a rehearing, send similar material directly to Mr. Palmer. They should support their application with substantial factual information in the form of letters or affidavits relating to Mr. Motoyoshi's character, past activities, and loyalty to this country. Testimonials should include facts tending to establish the reliability of persons furnishing them as well as the opportunities they have had to observe his conduct.

After examining this material the United States Attorney may in his discretion, if the facts warrant, reopen the case and arrange for a rehearing before the Board. Would you kindly advise me if an application for a rehearing is applied for under this procedure.





Evidence: Subject was born in Japan in 1897, and entered the United States in 1928. He made one trip to Japan in the year, 1937. He is married to a Japanese alien and has five children ranging in age from 1½ years to 13 years, all born and residing in Japan. Subject is a Buddhist priest and has been occupied in this capacity for 14 years doing missionary work. He has a brother in Japan who is also a Buddhist priest. He was educated in a Buddhist college in Japan and also spent five years at the university in Tokyo. He has been a newspaper representative for the New World Sun in Sant Francisco. He owns a farm and residence and Buddhist temple valued at 100,000 yen in Japan.

Subject is a member of the Japanese Association and is intensely pro-Japanese. He has circulated among the Buddhist churches speaking in behalf of Buddhism. He has been a close associate of Japanese Navy men and of a notorious Japanese espionage agent who returned to Japan in the fall of 1941.

Conclusion: Subject appears to be an extremely dangerous Japanese leader, who according to a confidential informant has shown considerable familiarity with Japanese military technique.

Recommendation: That subject be interned.

### IN THE MATTER OF JOSHIN MOTOYOSHI

This alien enemy was born in Japan in 1897. He entered the United States at San Francisco, California, in 1928 and since that time made one trip to Japan in the year 1937. He has resided in various places in the United States and finally at Alameda, California, from 1937 to the present time. He is by occupation a Buddhist Priest in San Francisco, California, and has been such for fourteen years. inherited his position of Buddhist Priest as successor to his father eight years before coming to the United States. He does missionary work as such Buddhist Priest. He owns a farm and a residence and Buddhist temple in Japan of the value of \$100,000. yen. He is married to a Japanese woman who entered the United States in 1928. They have five children respectively 13, 11, 9, 5 and 12 years of age, all born in California and all residing therein. His father and mother died in Japan. He has a brother in Japan, who is also a Buddhist priest. He was educated in Tokio University in Japan. He has been a newspaper representative for the New World Sun. He is a member of the Japanese Association. He is intensely pro-Japanese, as admitted by him, going about from one Buddhist Church to another making speeches and inculcating the Buddhist cult to the Japanese in this country. He admitted that he spent much time with Japanese Navy men. He admitted being a bosom friend of a notorious Japanese espionage agent who returned to Japan in the fall of 1941, his name being set forth in the files and report of the Federal Bureau of Investigation made part of this record. In other words, has examination by the members of the Board and the other facts appearing of record establish this alien enemy to be a dangerous alien enemy to leave at large during the period of the war and the members of the Board accordingly recommend his permanent internment.

The files of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, No. 100-10645, and the Alien Enemy Questionnaire, Immigration No. 12044/1038, were introduced in evidence and form part of this record and recommendation.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

Subject, Japanese alien, Buddhist priest at Alameda, California, spoke proudly of the military might of Japan and contributed to HETMUSHA KAI. Apprehended at Miles, California on April 28, 1942 under authority of Presidential Warrant. Booked Alameda County Jail, Oakland, California on April 28, 1942 enroute to Inmigration and Maturalization Service, San Francisco. No contraband or evidence found.

DETAILS:

This report is predicated upon information received from Confidential Informant SF-9 to the effect that Subject is definitely pro-Japanese and that he has stated that newspaper accounts of American troops mowing down Japanese landing parties in the Philippines were "a lot of lies." According to SF-7, Subject said that he had spent much of his time around military men and establishments in Japan and he knew how rigorously the Japanese trained and explained the intricate groupings of soldiers (20 men to a group and how the groups would deploy and fall). Confidential Informant SF-9 further advised that Subject also talked proudly of the technique in advance which was designed to prevent the enemy from getting the proper machine-gun range. Confidential Informant SF-9 reported that recently Subject has been taking a large responsibility for removing Japanese aliens from prohibited areas.

Subject was apprehended under authority of a Presidential Warrant at his home at 372 Decoto Road, Niles, California on April 28, 1942 at 12:05 P.M. by Deputy Sheriff GEORGE WISNER of the Alameda County Sheriff's Office and the writer. Subject was immediately taken to the Alameda County Jail, Oakland, California where he was questioned and thereafter booked at 2:05 P.M. enroute to Immigration and Naturalization Service, San Francisco, California. #### PERSONAL HISTORY

Subject was born March 28, 1897 at Fukui Prefecture, Japan, and immigrated to Hawaii in 1927 and thereafter to the United States, arriving in San Francisco, California on or about February 1, 1928 aboard the QUEEN WILHELMINA of the Matson Navigation Company. Subject informed that he returned to Japan in 1937, remained there about two months and again returned to the United States. He stated that he made this trip to attend funeral services for his father. He informed that he was educated in a Buddhist College in Japan. He denied having received any military training in Japan and stated that after having been examined by a military official he was excluded from military service because of poor eyesight and under-weight condition. Subject stated that all of his antecedents were Buddhist priests and that they have never been connected with the military regime of Japan. He has one brother who is a Buddhist priest in Japan. Subject is married and has five children. Subject informed that his wife was born in Japan. All of Subject's children were born in the United States. Subject has two daughters, ages 10 and 13, and three sons, ages 1. 5 and 8. He has followed the profession of a Buddhist priest since his arrival in this country and has continuously resided in the Bay Area.

#### ADMISSIONS OF SUBJECT

MOTOYOSHI admitted that he donated \$5.00 to the HEIMUSHA KAI about 32 years ago. He said that it was his duty as a priest to contribute to charity and compared the HEIMUSHA KAI to the Red Cross.

## DENIALS OF SUBJECT

Subject denied that he possessed any knowledge concerning the Japanese army or its methods of training. He further denied that he was acquainted with any Japanese army official. He denied that he would support the Japanese government and stated that he would not bear arms for the Japanese government. He denied that he was ever an officer or member of the Japanese Association or any other Japanese organization other than the Buddhist Church.


