TAKAO was born in Paia, Maui on December 10, 1919. He graduated from Maui High School in 1938, and earned a Bachelors degree in Education from the University of Hawaii in 1952 and a Masters of Education degree (Education Administration) from UH in 1974. His first teaching job was at Pearl Harbor Elementary School and then followed by stints at Makawao Elementary School on Maui and to Kahala Elementary School in Oahu. He was promoted to Vice Principal and served at Jarrett Intermediate School in Palolo and Kalaoa Elementary School at Kona. He was then promoted to Principal and served in Kona Elementary, John M. Ross Elementary (Hakalau, Big Island), Hauula Elementary, and Koko Head Elementary School. His last 18 years before his retirement in 1984 were spent as Principal of the McKinley Community and Adult School.

TAKAO took a very active and vital role to insure that Teachers and government workers received their deserved benefits. He served as President of the Oahu Principal and Vice Principal Organization, President of Unit 6, Education Office of Hawaii Government Employees Association (HGEA), President of the Hawaii State Teachers Association of HGEA and finally as President of the HGEA for four years in the early 1970's. His tenure as President of the HGEA was noteworthy because of two significant events: he was the first Japanese-American to head the powerful 25,000 member HGEA; and he was the first leader of HGEA to establish a collective bargaining procedure with management.

TAKAO has also taken an active part with Service Chapter and has served as Secretary and News Reporter for the Go For Broke Bulletin for many years. In addition, he and his wife have donated many prizes and gifts for the Chapter's get-togethers.

He married JUNE KAWAMOTO in August, 1958. They are blessed with six children: THO-MAS, ALVIN, MARILYNN, CATHERINE, PETER, and YVETTE and five grandchildren: DARRON, JUSTIN, GRANT, CHELSEA, and

DARCY.

His hobbies are golf and reading.

TAKEMI "KAJI" KAJIKAWA

TAKEMI is also one of the quiet but effective members of our Chapter. He rarely misses any of our monthly Chapter meetings.

TAKEMI has loved his independent style of life and has never married. He took care of his ailing brother (Crohn's disease) for three years at home until his brother passed away last year. He took a trip to Europe with his shipyard group in 1965 and is looking forward to attending the forthcoming Camp Shelby Homecoming and Monument Dedication trip with the RALPH CHINAKA group in June. We admire TAKEMI because he always trying to improve himself by taking University of Hawaii courses. Recently, he completed courses in Spanish and French. Keep up the good work, KAJI!

HENRY & MILDRED IKEMOTO: 442nd President of the Los Angeles area continues part II. "I was selected to be the training battalion 1st sergeant, trainee-type, that is. I didn't have to pull KP or guard duty for the rest of my basic. We finished early, in December '44 because of the 'Bulge' in Europe. We all went to Camp Shanks, NY...then us 'kotonks' were separated from the haole guys and put into a 'budda-head group.' When we were ready to ship, somebody got the measles so the whole bunch was guarantined...I guess it was for several weeks, then early in February, we got words of movement. We were held in quarters...couldn't even go to the PX, as I recall, while we saw the Italian POWs walking freely and coming out of the PX all kind of goodies. On board the USS Washington (I think that was the name) I was given a 'salt-water corporal' stripes and ran the KP duty group.

That was fun. I made friends with couple of Hawaii guys and kotonks...we used to go up to the bow of the ship as far as we could to see the night lights from the other ships...it was a large convoy...and all the lights were supposed to be out. We had a game about who counted the most and the brightest ones. We spent many quiet hours, too. I can't remember the names of any of them.

We debarked at LeHarve, late at night. As we marched off, we were met by the 442 guys...they could pronounce our names good. We got on a box car...a whole trainload of boxcars and started moving in the dark. Couple days later, after stopping in the train yard in Paris for a day, we got to Marseilles. I met my sergeant...Lefty Kawamura. Then one day I was pretty sick...very hot...feverish. Next thing I know, I am in a bed at a Station Hospital, sleeping next to an Asianlooking guy, young guy. When I woke up, he was trying to talk to me. I could not understand him at all. I said to myself, "What's happening? Am I that sick that I can't understand what my man is trying to tell me? Is my hearing all shot?" I didn't recall going into battle yet. The sergeant was just telling me that if you're afraid, it's OK because the Jerries are more afraid than you are. We've got lots of ammo and heavy stuff. They have a few heavy stuff, but they're running out of their supplies...and even their replacements are kids and old men. Then, I talked to the guy on the other side who spoke English and I understood. I found out that the Asian-looking guy was a Russian soldier. We smiled and 'signed away' and laughed. By the time I was allowed to leave, the Unit was transferred back to Italy. I was told to get to Italy and found a LST going and arrived at a Replacement Unit in Leghorn. They called 442 but nobody came to get me. I was going to go on my own, but the sergeant said, "Hell, boy, you ain't going nowhere from here unless I say so!" So, when the truck finally came for me, the Unit was in Lecco...the War was over. While I was in Leghorn, I was able to get around a few places with a couple of guys. Then in July, the Army asked for volunteers to go to the Far East. I figured that they were looking pretty hard and that I might pass the test this time. I did. So, I left beautiful Italy after a few months with the Unit...but I was very proud for having been associated with the AT boys...men, now. I spent a total of 31 years with the Army...but the first year was the most memorable. The 30 years was in the Military Intelligence Service on one way or another, at regimental level in Korea and at the Pentagon for three summers. Eight of the years were active duty and the balance as a reservist. Several of my boyhood friends died in Italy and France. At Epinal, I visited the cross of one of them. I didn't have time to go through the list at the cemetery in Florence."

Kohala No Ka Oi

Kohala is a sleepy little plantation town on the southern tip of the Big Island of Hawaii. It is where I was born and raised. It's main industry used to be sugar with sugar cane planted all over the place right up to the edge of steep cliffs overlooking the ocean. It had sugar mills at Hoea, Union Mill, and Halaula. We walked barefoot to school from Hawi to Honomakau while others from far off places like Mahukona on one end and Niulii and Makapalaon the opposite end came by bus while still others were lucky enough to ride their own horses to school. That's how we got to be known as the "Kohala Cowboys." It's main claim to fame was that King Kamehemeha I was born there and the original statue stands proudly on the courthouse vard in Kapaau.

But along came World War II and changed all that. Now our claim to fame was that for the Japanese population of the district, we had the highest number of volunteers per capita (or so it seemed to me, anyway) to join up with the 442nd Regimental Combat Team. When the parents sent their sons to uphold the honor of their country, they knew that some would not come back. When the war was over, of the first five bodies that were taken from the battlefields of Europe to be re-interred at Punchbowl, three were Kohala boys - the legendary GARY TSURUO HISAOKA from Hoea; ROY SHIZUO FUKUMOTO from Halaula; and M. Co.'s TSUGITO KAJIKAWA from 17 Camp. Wow! Just imagine that! From all the KIAs that we had. three of the first five to be re-interred at Punchbowl came from the small sleepy little plantation town of Kohala.

And then there's DR. WALLACE NAGAO, past president of Mike Chapter. He was born,

raised, and educated in Kohala. After graduating from Kohala High School in 1936, WALLY went to work for Kohala Sugar Company for three years so that he could earn enough money to further his education at the University of Hawaii. When he was a junior at UH, war came and soon he was a member of the Territorial Guard, then the Varsity Victory Volunteers, and the 442 RCT. After basic in Shelby, he was among those selected to go to Camp Savage and MIS training. WALLY spent most of his war years in Southeast Asia and the Burma campaign. After the war was over, he got discharged in Hawaii and two weeks later was in East Lansing, Michigan to attend Michigan State University where he got his Veterinarian's degree. While he was at MSU, he went to visit his long-time friend WALLACE DOI in Salt Lake City one summer and met PRISCILLA and soon PRISCILLA became MRS. WALLACE NAGAO. After he got his degree, WALLY returned to Hawaii and served as the Vet for the State of Hawaii on the Big Island of Hawaii. He is a three time president of the Veterinarians Organization, and was elected to the prestigious position of President of the Board of Veterinarians Association for one term. After 20 years on the Big Island, WALLY came to Honolulu to head the State of Hawaii Animal Industry and at the same time, another Kohala boy, SOTARO UEHARA was the head of the State Plant Division. So at that point in time, the entire State of Hawaii Plant and Animal Programs were headed by two boys from the sleepy little plantation town of Kohala.

After introducing myself as a long ago acquaintance of the Oyakata when he returned to Hawaii as a sumotori, I expressed my desire to observe the training at the stable. According to the worker, practice (Keiko) begins at 8:00 AM and lasts a few hours.

Thus, we agreed to visit the Beya on May 23 after we returned to Tokyo from the North (This arrangement was made without realizing that this date was just a few days after the tournament, which is explained in this article.)

We were not able to make the visitation on the second day of our arrival because we had previously made an appointment to tour Tsukiji, the popular Tokyo open market, to be followed by a train ride to Ryogoku Kokugikan where the sumo tournament was being held. THe atmosphere was electrifying with supporters yelling throughout the matches. Spectators start arriving at least four hours before the first Makuuchi Division confrontation. By the way, the three Hawaii sumotoris, Yokozuna AKEBONO, Ozeki MUSASHIMARU, and KONISHIKI won (I think.)

So on May 23rd at 8 AM, upon our return to Tokyo, we reached Azumazeki-Beay, JESSE's stable. As we entered the building, it was quiet and dark. Undismayed, through the persistence of BETTY's cousin, we were able to get through to JESSE.

greeted us generously and graciously.

We were pleased to meet JESSE's wife, who served us tea. She is both charming and pretty.

JESSE was generous with his time. He has a keen memory. Since he is from Happy Valley, Maui, he vividly recalls the names of his friends with whom he attended Baldwin High School where he starred in football.

For instance, he recalls associating with GLENN and EARL MATSUI, nephews of BETTY. The Matsui Store was owned and operated by BETTY's sister and her husband. JESSE said his mother used to patronize the store.

JESSE and his wife have two children, a boy and a girl. The boy is a junior at Boston University. When asked why Boston U. was chosen, he said that his son selected it himself. His daughter is a freshman at the same school. The proud fathers states that they are both doing well.

Honor Bound - A Personal Journey

It all started in spring of 1994 as far as we were concerned in our early contributions to the prokect, when GENRO KASHIWA called my attention to an ad in the National Japanese American Historical Society (NJAHS) newsletter to which he subscribes, that the ad is soliciting donations for the project, "Honor Bound." "L" Chapter sent \$300 and some individuals made their own contributions.

It was soon after, that we started to receive telephone calls from WENDY, MICHELLE RIDDLE, JOAN SAFFA, and MARIKO NOBORI for telephone interviews. Our communication network went to work as it was not certain at the time that WENDY and her crew will be at the mini-reunion at Las Vegas in September. When it was definite that they will be there, calls went out to the guys to bring all materials, photographs, their memories, etc. to the mini-reunion. The rest is history for an outstanding achievement by WENDY HANAMURA, executive producer, writer, and narrator of the documentary and her team of Director JOAN SAFFA, associate producer MARIKO NOBORI, coordinating producer MICHELLE RIDDLE, videographer DUANE POQUIS, editor TERRY KANE CHINN.

This broadcasters Gem is best told by a letter received from WENDY dated Dec. 14, 1994. Excerpts from the letter: "I was thinking back to last Christmas when our documentary, Honor Bound, was just a dream and a prayer. It seems like such a miracle that this holiday season we are on the verge of making the first edit in the opening sequence. It is thanks to all of you that we've gotten this far.

In October, our camera crew followed my father and some 800 veterans and their families back to the battlegrounds of Bruyeres and Biffontaine, France. As the sound of "Taps" reverberated through the brilliant fall sun, I believe we all sensed the presence of the men who lost their lives in those dark forests. When the army band struck up the "Star Spangled Banner" I noticed the Nisei soldiers snapped to attention, standing a little taller, the years melting away. It was such a privilege to capture those images, those moments on tape.

Our crew spent days trekking through the dusty backroads of Italy in search of a wasy to the top of Mt. Folgorito, where the men of dad's unit, Company L, scaled a 3000-foot cliff in utter darkness to surprise the Germans entrenched on the Gothic Line. When we finally clambered up to the peak, the breathtaking coastal plain of Italy stretched beneath us. From the trench atop Mt. Fologorito, a sniper could sight anything that moved with 180-degrees between his crosshairs. In 1945, Company L captured the outpost. "Amazing," my father uttered again and again. "How coulc the platoon have climbed up that mountain?"

Now we have the hard task of whittling down the treasure trove of material we've collected into a sleek 51 minutes! But as an Oscar-award winning director once told me, when the cutting room floor is littered with gems, you know you're on to something of true value."

The impossible dream and prayers of WENDY are noe fulfilled and secured for a place in history with her documentary masterpiece. Not only has she captured the heart of the veterans initimate stories never quite accomplished before, but she's also put together the sad episode of the U.S. government's internment of AJA'S in concentration camps, footage of Shelby days, actual front line scenes, the 522nd FA rescue of the Jewish prisoners at the infamous Dachau death camp, the return of the colors and the homely Alameida smalltown scenes. It's interesting to note that the U.S. Army had shot the footage of the 100/442 was considered an experimental unit whose actions and performance was being closely scrutinized. Yes, the real life stories of those interviewed mainly from the 1st platoon which was HOWE's platoon, JACOB, GENRO, BENKITAGAWA, SAMIKARI, CASEY KASADATE, LAWRENCE FUJII, RICHARD FURUKAWA, HIDEO HIGA, ART KOURA, TAK HASHIMURA, medic FEB YOKOI, TOSHI NAKAHARA, 2nd pln & PAUL MATSUMOTO, Hqrs. really depict the valors of the men of the regiment.

Within the Bay Area, "Honor Bound" had a special premire screening by invitation only before the showing on KPIX Channel 5 Sunday, March 5. On Saturday, May 20 in celebration of Asian Pacific American Heritage Month, the National Museum of American History (NMAH) and Wider Audience Development Program presented a premire of "Honor Bound" at NMAH, 14th St. & Constitution Ave, NW Washington D.C.

WENDY plans to submit "Honor Bound" for showing at this years Hawaii International Film Festival but it must first be transferred to a film, a costly procedure for which she must raise extra monies. She is also looking for a national distributor for the documentary so that it can be shown nationwide. She hopes to get it into the Public Broadcasting Station programming line-up, nationwide.

I was appointed by Pres. Elect PAUL TAKIGUCHI as the '96 442 banquet chairman. Besides PAUL (M), the committee of GENRO KASHIWA, JACOB JICHAKU, "MUN" SAITO (K), "CHAMP" SUZUKI (1), RALPH TOMEI (M), SHIGERU GOTO (3HQ), ALAN KUBOTA (S&D), and JENNIFER BAKER (Exec. Sec. 442) at a meeting on May 25, unanimously approved to invite WENDY as a guest and be a part of the evening's banquet program. At the time of this report, I am not yet able to reach WENDY on the phone at KPIX. Perhaps many of our friends on the mainland may be interested in joining her for the banquet, Saturday, March 30, 1996, Pacific Beach Hotel Ballroom?
