We are very proud to host this special 65th Anniversary Tribute dinner for veterans of the "Rescue of the Lost Battalion." On November 1st, we are holding a special event in Houston that is a tribute to the 442nd Regimental Combat Team (RCT) who rescued the Texas based, 141st Infantry Battalion nicknamed the "Lost Battalion" during World War II.

Over 30 World War II Veterans who served in the 442nd and the 141st are flying to Houston to participate in this special evening. This is the 2nd time since World War II that these heroes are being brought together to celebrate this pivotal rescue. The 141st was completely surrounded by the Germans. Two other rescue teams tried to get through enemy lines to reach the "Lost Battalion"...but to no avail. The 442nd had distinguished itself as tough, capable and determined. This all Japanese-American Battalion wanted to prove to its country that they were Americans first and foremost. When they began the mission to rescue the Lost Battalion, few thought success was possible. The 442nd suffered hundreds of casualties during the battle, while they defeated the Germans, and rescued the remaining 211 members of the 141st.

At the Tribute dinner, we will also honor Speaker Jim Wright and Governor Connally (whose family will be on hand to accept a tribute to him)...who both played a role in recognizing the contributions of the Japanese American soldiers of the 442nd who became known as the Purple Heart Battalion as they were the most decorated battalion in both purple hearts and medals of honor for size and length of service.

We hope you will make plans to attend this once in a lifetime event and make a contribution to help fund some special projects. The proceeds of the event will pay for the veterans and a family member to attend this final tribute. The Crane Monument (shown on the front cover of the invitation) will also be erected in Houston to pay tribute to the 442nd and recount the story of this historic battle. And finally an educational interactive exhibit will be funded that will insure the "Rescue of the Lost Battalion" will be remembered for generations to come.

# Congressional Medal of Honor Recipient

## In Attendance

### GEORGE T. SAKATO, PRIVATE, U.S. ARMY



Private George T. Sakato distinguished himself by extraordinary heroism in action on 29 October 1944, on Hill 617 in the vicinity of Biffontaine, France. After his platoon had virtually destroyed two enemy defense lines, during which he personally killed five enemy soldiers and captured four, his unit was pinned down by heavy enemy fire. Disregarding the enemy fire, Private Sakato made a one-man rush that encouraged his platoon to charge and destroy the enemy strongpoint. While his platoon was reorganizing, he proved to be the inspiration of his squad in halting a counter-attack on the left flank during which his squad leader was killed. Taking charge of the squad, he con-

tinued his relentless tactics, using an enemy rifle and P-38 pistol to stop an organized enemy attack. During this entire action, he killed 12 and wounded 2, personally captured 4 and assisted his platoon in taking 34 prisoners. By continually ignoring enemy fire, and by his gallant courage and fighting spirit, he turned impending defeat into victory and helped his platoon complete its mission. Private Sakato's extraordinary heroism and devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of military service and reflect great credit on him, his unit, and the United States Army.
