Japan Admits Losses, Tells of New Warships

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—(AP)—Japan announced today for the first time that she had added powerful new battleships to her fleet since the outset of the Pacific war, and at the same time made the largest admission to date of Japanese naval losses.

Tokyo broadcasts of the announcement, made by Captain of Allied Ship Movements Hideo Hiraide, official spokesman of the navy, also said that new aircraft carriers of a unique type had been completed.

> "The imperial navy is happy to announce that already a certain number of powerful battleships have been placed in commission and are taking an active part in the current war," Hiraide said.
