: INSTRUCTIONS GOVERNING VOLUNTARY MOVEMENT OF JAPANESE  
NO.....2 ) FROM LOS ANGELES TO OWENS VALLEY

I. General.

1. Each person will bring with him:
  - a. All bedding except mattress.
  - b. Tools of his trade, if any.
  - c. Cooking and eating utensils.
  - d. Clothing and other personal belongings.
  - e. A one gallon container filled with drinking water.
2. The amount of baggage to be taken by each person is limited as follows:
  - a. Those going by train to that which they can carry with them.
  - b. Those going by automobile to that which can be carried in the vehicle in which they travel.
3. All persons are prohibited from taking with them any firearms, explosives, radios, car radios, cameras or photographic equipment, or other contraband.
4. Breakfast will be eaten before reporting for trip. A cold lunch will be furnished each person. Drinking water will be furnished. Food will be furnished on arrival at destination.

II. Rail Movement.

1. All persons going by rail will report to the old Santa Fe station on Santa Fe Avenue in Los Angeles at 8:00 AM, Monday morning, March 23, 1942.
2. Each person must take care of all belongings and baggage brought by him.

III. Motor Convoy.

1. All motor vehicles which are to travel by convoy will report at the South end of the PASADENA ROSE BOWL in the Arroya Seca, at 6:00 AM on Monday morning, March 23, 1942.
2. This location is reached by way of the Arroya Seca Speedway, which is the northern continuation of Figueroa Street, or by driving East on Colorado Blvd from Glendale or Eagle Rock. Guides will be present to direct drivers of vehicles through Pasadena and from Colorado Blvd to the Rose Bowl and to positions in the convoy.
3. All vehicles will be completely loaded and ready to depart from the ROSE BOWL not later than 6:15 AM.
4. Vehicles will travel in groups of 10 and will conform to speed and direction of convoy.
5. Vehicles will not stop except as directed by Officers in charge.
6. In case of accident or emergency, vehicle will pull over to the right side of highway and stop.
7. Convoy will halt for 10 minutes after each two hours of travel.
8. When convoys are halted, all persons will remain in vehicles until signalled to get out.
9. All persons getting out of vehicles will get out on the RIGHT side, and will not stand in highway or attempt to cross the highway.
10. All persons will remain in vehicles at all times unless told to get out.

11. Each automobile taken will be prepared in advance by the driver as follows:

- a. Gasoline tanks will be full.
- b. Oil reservoirs will be full.
- c. Tires will be properly inflated and a spare tire carried.
- d. Cars will be in good running order.
- e. Drivers will be prepared to buy necessary gasoline and oil along the way. Total distance is about 300 miles.

12. The number of persons that may go in any one vehicle is limited as follows:

Coupe or roadster,	2 persons.
Sedan or touring car,	3 persons.
Truck,	4 persons.


13. Destination is a camp in the vicinity of Lone Pine reached by state highway No. 6, running north from San Fernando by way of Lancaster, Mojave, and Olancho.

14. Orders of officers conducting convoy will be instantly obeyed.
