The J. A. C. L. Hall will be officially released by the California State Guards on October 8, 1945 according to a notification received by Mr. Guy Curtis. Plans are now being worked on through the sponsorship of the Inter-Racial Council of the Monterey Peninsula to use the building for a hostel for returning evacuees.

Mr. Guy Curtis, who has been empowered to act for us through the power of attorney given him, desires to be freed from all further responsibility relative to the use of the building, and from all responsibility he may have possessed through the authority of the power of attorney. For this reason, a letter has been prepared releasing him from all claims and responsibility for his actions taken under the authority of the power of attorney; and is enclosed for each officer of our corporation to sign and return immediately to me.

Being the only officer of the corporation in Monterey at this time, it has been arranged that the property will be surrendered to me. The responsibility will be great; and I shall welcome any suggestion you can make in helping me to fulfill this obligation. Regular reports will be made to you on the progress of the plans.
