THOMAS JEFFERSON MEMORIAL

The Jefferson Memorial was started in December 1938 when ground was broken by President Roosevelt who said in his dedication address: " . . . millions of American citizens who each year visit the National Capital will have a sense of gratitude that at last an adequate permanent national memorial to Thomas Jefferson has been placed at this beautiful spot . . . " The Memorial is at the east end of Tidal Basin in West Potomac Park and was completed at a cost of \$3,000,000. It is a dignified structure in classic lines constructed of Vermont marble for the exterior and Georgia white marble for the interior. It is 600 feet in diameter including the surrounding roads. The interior consists of a single austere chamber which contains a fine and impressive statue in bronze of the man who drafted the Declaration of Independence, Thomas Jefferson.
