WACS TO BE GIVEN SERVICE IN LIMITS OF HOME COMMAND

War department approval of a new Wac recruiting plan under which enlistees may be returned after training for duty within the service command area from which they enlisted was announced in Denver Saturday by Lieut. Peggy L. Davies, recruiting officer.

New special recruiting regulations, she said, permit women who qualify in any one of 155 job classifications to select their fields of service.

However, if an enlistee desires to discontinue the type of work in which she is engaged at the time of induction, she may enlist for general assignment and be trained by the army in the field of her choice.

Lieutenant Davies said members of the last unit of the Colorado Wac company, now being formed, will have the opportunity to return to the Seventh service command for duty after receiving their training.
