
"I don't mind the regimentation of the Army at all. But the only thing that bothers me is

The WAC contingent here is expected to be increased considerably by early spring, it was announced by Lt M. E. Nestor, temporary Commanding Officer of the WAC Detachment. Three more will be transferred here this week. Women are now being recruited from civilian life to the MIS School as well as from those now in service, many of whom will be transferred here as students or to be assigned to permanent clerical positions in the School Battalion Headquarters.

Majority of the WACs here at Fort Snelling have brothers in service and at least five of them have brothers now overseas in France.

The present detachment includes: Cpl Shizuko Shinagawa, Tec 5 Kay Ogura, Pfcs Akiko Mikami, Bette Nishimura, Sue Ogata, Toyome Uyeno and Iris Watanabe and Pvts Kathleen Iseri, Trooda Oda, Irene Taniguchi and Ryuko Uyesaka. Only half of the contingent lived in relocation centers prior to their induction. Pvt Iseri was formerly employed in the New York City War Relocation office in the Empire State Building.
