

Coal to Be Delivered to Mess Halls Only

The following statement regarding delivery and use of coal was released this week by Guy Robertson, project director.

"In order to utilize the slack coal that has accumulated in the stock piles throughout the center, the coal crew will as time permits pick up the piles of slack and haul it to the hospital for use in the steam boiler.

"It is not planned to make any more deliveries of coal to the various stock piles in the blocks other than the stock pile at each of the mess halls. Coal for the mess halls, laundry and barracks should be obtained from the stock piles at the mess halls. This is necessary in order to make the most efficient use of the coal and to avoid the unsightly stock piles."

Residents Urged to Claim Shoes

A large number of shoes have been repaired and may be claimed, Kamataro Nakashima, manager of the shoe repair shop, 24-25N, announced. Repaired shoes which owners fail to claim will be turned over to the welfare section in order to make room for other shoes, Nakashima warned. Shoes caked with mud will not be accepted.

New Placement System for Domestic Jobs Adopted

Three girls or women and two couples will be sent each week to Chicago to await placement in domestic jobs, Susan Downer, placement officer, revealed. This new system of placement has been adopted in order to speed up the filling of domestic positions, according to a teletype message received from Elmer S. Shirrell, relocation officer. Temporary housing in Chicago will be arranged by the relocation office and applicants will then be referred to suitable jobs.

Persons wishing to go to Chicago for domestic work are requested to fill out application forms being sent by mail to the outside employment office. Residents will be considered only if they wish to do domestic work and are willing to remain with employees if conditions are satisfactory.

Shirrell declared that the need for careful selection of evacuees for this type of placement cannot be emphasized too strongly as much dissatisfaction results through evacuees taking jobs of a type they do not like or for which they are not fitted. Many of them secure domestic positions as a stopping stone for other work. Wages average \$60 per month for maids and \$125 per month or more for couple depending on experience, according to Shirrell.
