Residents interested in selling shortwave radios and weapons stored as contraband are asked to report to the evacuee property control office in the Sentinel building with information as to the make and model of the item, price and storage place.

The United States Navy base at Treasure Island, S. F., is willing to purchase radios and small arms needed for the recreation and instruction of sailors stationed there. Items most wanted are small radios, either with or without shortwave, pistols and rifles of .25 calibre or less.

Delegates to Give Reports on YBA Conference

Contraband Articles From Washington Expected

Radios, kodaks and others taken as contraband in Yakima, Wash. before evacuation are expected here this week, according to James H. Porter, evacuee property custodian. Residents concerned will be notified upon arrival of their goods. Arrangements are also being made to return contraband articles taken from evacuees in other sections of the country.

Claims for Breakage of Property May Be Made

Claims against the WRA for any shortage or breakage of property shipped here from the West coast should be reported within three days after signing for delivery so that reports of discrepancies may be sent to San Francisco in time to meet the ten-day limit, James H. Porter, evacuee property custodian, announced.

Small Amount of Coal Available Here

Due to the nation-wide coal strike, no coal was received at this project the first of June. This leaves a small amount of lump coal in the stock pile in the warehouse area which will be issued only to the mess halls and the hospital, according to John A. Nelson, senior administrative officer.

Persons requiring coal at the laundries or other buildings should call Howard E. Lewis at 23 who will arrange to have unscreened slack delivered. As soon as screens can be obtained, the coal crew will start screening slack piles and this coal will be delivered to the mess halls. Residents are asked to use care in firing stoves so that the stock on hand will be used to the best advantage.

Accept Shoes for Repair Thursday, Friday

Shoes will be received for repair at the shoe repair shop at 24-26-N on Thursday and Friday, it was announced by Kametaro Nakashima, manager. During those two days, repaired shoes will not be returned to owners. Beginning Monday, June 14, people may call for their shoes.

Warning Issued by Police Department

The police department announced today that driving licenses may be suspended for any of the following causes:

1. Driving over 25 miles an hour on an open street.
2. Driving over 8 miles an hour on an alley within the block.
3. Failing to give the right of way to police cars, fire trucks or ambulances
4. Driving with deflated tires.
5. Failure to report an accident to the police department within 24 hours.
6. Violation of parking regulations (three times). Note: Parking prohibited within 25 feet of a fire hydrant or building.
7. Driving over a fire hose.
8. Reckless driving. Note: A reckless driving charge may be made for failure to slow down at street intersections, passing on a hill, and any other action that might endanger the lives of others.

Payment of April clothing allowance will be discontinued until the latter part of next week, Victor J. Ryan, budget and finance officer, announced.

The Wednesday matinees have been cancelled, according to Frank Inouye of the motion picture department. Because of limited seating capacity, only 300 tickets will be sold for each showing, he said.

A recreation program for elementary and high school students will begin June 14 with the summer session opening on June 28, C. D. Carter, superintendent of schools, announced. Teachers will cooperate with the community activities department, Carter said. Plans are also being made for a recreational leadership training course.

New Ruling on Unemployment Compensation Announced

New regulations pertaining to payment of unemployment compensation have been received in Administrative Instructions 27 Supplement 2 (revised). The new ruling became effective with the first of the month and reads as follows:

"Eligibility of evacuees to receive unemployment Compensation shall be limited to those actively engaged in WRA project employment, who are unable to report to work due to illness and who present a statement from a physician certifying to this fact. This shall not apply to disabilities resulting from injury in line of duty covered by Administrative Instructions 79 permitting workmen's compensation."

Residents Urged to Save Cash Register Receipts

Residents were urged by Scott Taggart, chief of community enterprises, to save their cash register receipts. Announcement is to be made about the first of July for additional refunds.

Distribute Carload of Personal Property

A carload of personal property from Toppenish, Wash., received here this week is now being distributed. All shortages or damage must be reported immediately to the evacuee property office. Delay will make it impossible to file claims on damaged pieces or trace lost items, James Porter, property officer said.

Collection Made for PTA Get-together

A small collection is being made from parents of school children to help meet expenses for the Parent-Teachers get-together June 11. Collectors will make door-to-door calls.

Leadership Training Classes to Start June 14

Leadership training classes in athletics, youth organizations and social recreation will begin June 14 under the auspices of the community activities section. The course will be a series of lectures conducted by school faculty members experienced in teaching leadership.

Those interested in working in the recreation department as a voluntary worker or on assignment and who wish to enroll in these classes are asked to see David Yamakawa, assistant director of community activities, at 16-N. The course will prepare leaders for the coming summer and winter recreation program at Heart Mountain.

Shoe Purchase Certificates Expire June 15

Residents were reminded by Jehn A. Nelson, senior administrative officer, that the expiration date on shoe purchase certificates is June 15. It will not be possible to purchase shoes with expired certificates, he added.

Practice for Commencement, Baccalaureate Services Set

Graduating seniors of the Heart Mountain high school will hold a practice for commencement exercises at 9 a.m. Wednesday, June 9, at the high school building, John K. Corbett, principal, announced. Practice for the baccalaureate services will be held Saturday, June 5, at the same locale.

Parents of high school students were asked by Corbett to help in seeing that all text books are returned before school is closed. Any student who is charged with a text book which is not returned will not receive final grades until a satisfactory adjustment has been made.

Letters to Chicago WRA Office Discouraged

As his staff is heavily overburdened, a request that evacuees refrain from writing to the Chicago WRA relocation office and the Chamber of Commerce for general and specific information was received this week from Elmer L. Shirrell, relocation supervisor for the Chicago area.

Shirrell declared that questions are usually asked about housing, cost of living, job opportunities, community attitude toward evacuees, education and recreational facilities and many request free maps and other descriptive literature. As many of these letters appear to be from students for school assignments, Shirrell asked that schools discourage pupils from writing to both the WRA office and the Chicago Chamber of Commerce which forwards the letters to his office.

Declaring that "we realize the importance of an educational program in the camps which will acquaint the evacuees with conditions in the relocation areas and want to do all we can to help", Shirrell stated that "with the rush of work and limitation on the staff, we cannot undertake this job on an individual basis."

He revealed that information on all the major cities in the Chicago area is begin compiled which will include the name and location of the town, temperature and rainfall, type of agriculture, cost of living, main industries, hospitals and clinics, education and cultural activities, church and community facilities.

"We are also trying to secure lantern slides, film, photographs and descriptive literature but for many localities this type of material is very difficult to secure", Shirrell declared. For example the Chicago Chamber of Commerce has discontinued printing all promotional literature. Films and slides suitable for this purpose are largely available only for use in the city, but as soon as all the information has been gathered, it will be duplicated and copies sent to all projects together with as much illustrative material as possible, he added.

"In the meantime, we will appreciate it if the evacuees will be patient and make as much use as possible of information already available to them on the project. We have been told that in your libraries are copies of books on various states in the American Guide series prepared by the Federal Writer's Project. The book on Illinois contains very complete information which should answer almost all the questions that need to be answered", Shirrell declared.

With reference to community attitude toward Japanese-Americans the evacuees should understand that when a job offer is submitted, the attitude has already been determined as favorable.

"So far as possible we will answer the letters from evacuees, but do not be discouraged about the delay or scant information we send, but rest assured that it is not because of unwillingness on our part to give this service. We feel that our primary responsibility is to secure jobs and help those people who come here to make a satisfactory adjustment." Shirrell said.

Softball League Rules Listed

In order to clarify rulings governing local softball competition and because of disputes which have arisen, the athletic department has released the following rules:

1. All games will start at the designated time with 15 minutes grace allowed or else the team present shall be awarded a forfeit victory.
2. For weekend as well as for weekday twilight games, time limits shall be observed and enforced. First games of weekend double-headers will not start a new inning after 3 p.m. unless the minimum of five innings has not been played or in the event of a tie in which case the game may be extended until the winner is determined. Twilight games will start promptly at 6:30 and end at 8.
3. In case of rain or wind during the game, the contest is to be suspended for five minutes before postponement is considered. The game must continue if the rain or wind subsides.
4. In the event that a team is in front by 10 runs or more by the completion of five innings, the game shall be called off and the winner declared. This ruling governs only games in the B and Old Timers' Leagues.
5. Anyone over 27 years of age is eligible to compete in the B and Old Timers' divisions at the same time.

Class B Teams Must Furnish Umpires

Because of the shortage of umpires, all teams which participate in the B division must furnish their own arbiters starting with Saturday's games, according to Joe Suski, athletic director.
