Those Reaching 17th Birthdays Required to Register

Residents, regardless of citizenship, who have since the February registration for leave clearances attained their 17th birthdays are required to register at the outside employment office, according to Joe Carroll, employment head. As persons reach their 17th birthdays, they should be registered, he said.

18-Year Olds Must Report to Selective Service Board

All boys who have reached their 18th birthdays must report to the selective service board in the outside employment office, according to Joe Carroll, employment head.

Individuals who are registered with their selective service boards and since registration have married or acquired dependents are also asked to register for re-classification.

Domestic Training Class to Start Monday

The two-week course of domestic pre-employment training which will begin Monday, June 14, will meet 1-2:30 p.m. daily except Saturdays and Sundays in the home economics classroom, 14-26, Harold R. Bottrell, director of adult education, announced.

Mrs. John K. Corbett and Mrs. Marlin T. Kurtz, high school home economics in-structors, will conduct the training class. If the interest and demand is great enough, the course will be repeated throughout the summer, Bottrell stated. Those interested should enroll with Mrs. Susan Downer before beginning the course as classes will not be offered unless there are at least 12 enrolles.

New Shoe Ration Stamps to Be Issued

With the beginning of a new shoe ration period on June 16, shoe ration stamps will be issued to center residents on the basis of need until further information is received from the OPA, according to word received from John R. Harrison, state rationing officer.

Stamps for the purchase of shoes will not be issued to individuals who have two pairs of wearable or repairable shoes. Applications for shoe stamps must be obtained from the rationing desk in the administration building. When the applications are returned to the rationing desk, they must be referred to the rationing board for approval. If the board approves the application, stamps will be issued and mailed to the applicant. Applications for all members of the family may be submitted by any adult member of the family.

Industrial Training Offered in Chicago Area

The opportunities for employment in the Chicago defense area announced in a previous Sentinel supplement applies especially to those boys who expected to go into NYA training, according to Mrs. Susan Downer, placement officer. Machinist and welders will be trained at wages starting from 60 to 65 cents per hour. Applications should be made at the outside employment office in the administration building.

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New Ruling on Issuance of Movie Tickets Announced Because of the large number of persons who must wait in line before the show-ing of each movie, only two tickets will be sold to each person, Clarence Matsumura, supervisor of the technical department, announced. The yellow tickets bought by patrons, and not yet used, will be good for this week only. Beginning next week, only a limited number of tickets will be sold, and these tickets will be good for only that showing, and will not be accepted any other day. Farm Opportunities in Midwest Area Favorable Encouragement is given evacuee farmers who wish to relocate in the Midwestern area by Elmer L. Shirrell, Chicago relocation supervisor. In a letter addressed to the project director, he urged the farmers to come out and investigate the possibilities. He pointed out that that part of the country is not familiar with the Japanese, and in turn the evacuees are not acquainted with the land of that area. Shirrell recommended that farmers be urged to take jobs that will give them an opportunity to pay their living expenses, recognizing they may be accepting less than they may have received prior to evacuation. But taking such jobs does enable them to study the climate, soil and markets, so by the beginning of the 1944 crop season, they may have enough knowledge of this area to lease or buy a farm and operate it themselves, he said. The cities of the Midwest have good markets for vegetables, according to Shirrell. Fellowships at Antioch College Available to Nisei Fellowship positions at Antioch college in Yellow Springs, Ohio, are available to nisei with college degrees in biology, psychology or sociology, according to Susan Downer, placement officer. Dr. L. W. Sonntag, director of the Samuel S. Fels Research Institute at Antioch college is offering \$100 a month for 40 hours per week. He declared that this arrangement affords excellent opportunities for interested persons to do research work and at the same time be self-supporting. Dr. Sonntag is also desirous of securing the services of persons with Ph. D. degrees in any of the three fields to teach at the college. Qualified residents who are interested should communicate directly with Dr. Sonntag.
