- VI. REMARKS

#### VIII. MANAGER'S NOTES

All the block managers of Boston II were taken to the warehouse near Parker with Mr. Crawford and Mr. Empey. There, we were shown where the supplies come in and go out.

What impressed the minds of the block managers the most is the way that the warehouse crew, made up of young teen-age evacuees, worked.

Just unloading the perishables alone is hard enough work for the salary they receive, but they are also forced to unload great piles of timber and scrap iron and reload them on to the tractor trailer.

I firmly believe that these extra jobs should be done by the contractors for the various projects, and not by the underpaid evacuees. The work is much too hard for the salaries to justify/
