### Church as Usual

All church services will be conducted at the usual times and places today and tomorrow, the Service division stated yesterday.

### Inspection Disturbance Causes Two-Day Army Control

After being stationed within the Japanese assembly center at Santa Anita for two days, the result of a disturbance accented by the beating of an evacuee of mixed Japanese and Korean ancestry Tuesday afternoon, the Military Police were withdrawn yesterday evening.

The assault on the evacuee occurred during a routine inspection by the Interior Police. Suspected of being an informer, the evacuee was set upon by several hundred other evacuees.

A milling crowd of about 2000 Japanese gathered almost at once.

The Military Police, stationed outside the Center, were summoned. Some 200 were ordered in.

The beaten evacuee, badly but not seriously hurt, was rescued by the soldiers and removed to a hospital.

The Santa Anita center contains a total population of almost 19,000 Japanese evacuated from military areas of the Pacific coast.

## ABSENTEE BALLOT FORMS AVAILABLE ON TUESDAY

### Only Registered Voters Eligible

Application forms for absentee ballots may be obtained at the District Information offices after Monday, it was announced yesterday.

According to the regulations, only those who registered prior to July 16, 1942 are eligible to vote.

The absentee ballots must be in the hands of the Registrar of Voters before August 20.

Voters' registration will be automatically cancelled if ballots are not cast in either the primary or the general election, it was said.

"Klaks are wooden sandals," he continued, "brightly colored, with snappy canvas straps."

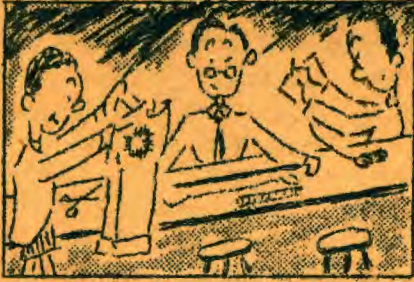
While the older generation in the Center prefers to wear the conservative and traditional geta, the nisei go in for klaks.

"Klaks are sold at downtown stores," said Miyahara, "but they don't compare with ours, because ours are made to fit the shape of one's feet."

At least one full day of planing, chiseling, filing and sandpapering is required to produce a pair of klaks. After the sandpapering, they are stained and varnished. Then canvas strips are nailed on.

"The largest klaks that I've ever made," said Miyahara, "were size eights for a friend of mine in the Army." He also made one for a neighbor, who made him a sweater in exchange.

One of the busiest klak shops in the Center is at Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hosoi's unit, 18-10 8th avenue. Six or seven young men, stripped to the waist, are always at work.

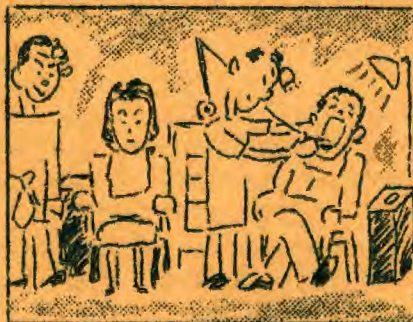
Harry Higa, brother of the new staff member, is a laboratory technician at the local hospital.

By way of comparison there have been 89 births but only nine marriages at Santa Anita. Five couples have desired quiet weddings with no publicity.

In order to marry, a couple makes two trips to Pasadena. The first time they file their intention to wed and from three to five days later they make their second trip to pick up their license. No one has been refused a license because of medical reasons, we were told.

The youngest bride in the Center is Mrs. Saburo Hatada, 18. The Hatadas became engaged here and were married on June 12. Saburo is a stock clerk at the Red mess.

A name plate with heart designs on it greeted us when we visited the Hatada home. Inside we glimpsed a neat dressing table draped with bright, figured material.

Perhaps you'd be surprised to know that a couple's own minister may officiate at marriage rites in the Center. Thus far the only such case was the marriage of Mr. and Mrs. Pete Miyashiro by the Rev. Donald Toriumi at the Government house.

The Miyashiros did not have a honeymoon, but they assured us that they are happy. Pete is a busboy and his wife, Toyo, is a waitress at the Orange mess.

Pete thinks marriage is advisable for there are no cooking or housekeeping problems in this pioneer life.

One marriage was performed at the Pasadena Wedding chapel and another at a church in Pasadena. The other six couples were united by the justice of the peace.

# Excerpts Explain Center Work Regulations

Following are excerpts from the WCCA Operations manual concerning work in the Center:

A. (a) No evacuee is required to work, however, once an evacuee has accepted a job for which he will receive remuneration, the evacuee will, except in cases of illness, carry out his or her assignment. Should the evacuee desire to quit, he or she may do so, provided 48-hour notice

of intent in writing is presented to his Caucasian supervisor. This notice will set forth the reason for quitting and effective date.

(b) Stoppage of work (except as provided in (a) above) by individuals or as a group with the intent to, or the effect of interfering with the execution of the functions and operations of the assembly center is prohibited.

AA. No evacuee shall prevent or attempt to prevent any other evacuee from working. This rule shall apply to all verbal, written or physical means which might be employed, either direct or indirect.

BB. No evacuee shall deliberately or willfully destroy or mutilate any government property.

CC. All evacuees shall obey the directions of the supervisors of the projects on which they are working. Any evacuee who has any grievance regarding such directions shall submit his grievance to the Center manager in writing.

GG. Any violation of these regulations may be prosecuted under Public Law 503.

## MEDICAL STAFF GIVES ADVICE ON 'DISEASES'

Bizarre rumors of infectious diseases, heard since the opening of the Center, have been the cause of heartache and irreparable social ostracism, the Medical staff pointed out today.

"We have a well-trained and experienced group of Public Health workers qualified to distinguish between infectious and non-infectious diseases," Dr. Norman Kobayashi of the Medical staff said. "Any questions should be reported to the Public Health department for clarification," he added.

In the matter of child hygiene parents were asked to observe the recent suggestion of Dr. Mary Dale, pediatrician. She advised that babies be taught to drink out of cups after eight months as those over one year will not be given milk bottles with nipples.

"It is better to start weaning gradually so that it will not be necessary to do it all at once," Dr. Dale said.--by Anna Sakai-zawa.

## ● a character sketch of the Gabriel of Santa Anita

The most conspicuous and vocally indefatigable person in Santa Anita is the weather-beaten figure in the uniform of the **Scopal Army**.

You may have seen him yesterday noon, outside the mess hall, sermonizing between the parallel lines of lunch-awaiting people and doing his utmost to divert their appetites. Or you may have seen him this morning in an open square, vociferating and trumpeting for the benefit of an apathetic audience. And most likely, you will see him again, anywhere between the asphalted courts of District VII and the yellow dust of District I.

His daily peregrination is so extensive that, in order to keep pace with this self-appointed disciple of the Word, one would have to forego his routine of food, work and play in order to keep pace with him.

Wherever he goes, he carries with him his cherished Bible, trumpet, harmonica and flute. He will play these instruments now and then for a feebly short time, only to turn back to a lengthier and louder use of his mobile tongue.

Being used to seasonal moods of rain, shine and storm for the last 18 years, he also seems conditioned to the changeable moods of his audience. Whether children romp around him in noisy glee or quiet curiosity, whether adults gather in sympathy or ridicule, or whether a depopulated area affords an audience only of empty air, he never heeds that which would make a man of less faith and persistence despair of his calling.

Few know the history of this man who walks outside the pattern of normal life.

He is Ichijiro Yoshida, born 63 years ago in Japan. He quit school and came to America when he was 20 years old. Shortly after, he married, and with his wife operated a thriving barbershop. But though his business flourished, his marriage did not, and soon marital discord led the two to divorce.

As one personal trouble led to another, he lost all interest in human activities and gravitated to religious meditations. Religion was not new to him. Early in his youth, religion had come to him when

Rumors Only Create Confusion

We can do no better than to quote an editorial on this subject in the Tanforan Totalizer:
