As the three residents who were called previously for active duty, the group will report to the Infantry replacement training center, Camp Blanding, Fla.

To honor twenty-five inductees leaving for induction into the army at Ft. Logan, a farewell ceremony will be held 8:30 a.m. Thursday by the flag pole in front of the administration building. Victor Ryan, assistant project director, will make the main address while Saburo Nakashima, chairman of the community council will speak on behalf of the evacuees.
