

Elementary Schools and Kindergartens to Open Sept. 4

Elementary schools and kindergartens will open for approximately 930 center youngsters at 9 a.m., Sept. 4, it was announced this week by Howard Bugbee, principal.

Pupils residing in blocks 1 to 15 will report to Washington school in block 7, while those residing in blocks 17 to 30 will report to Lincoln school in block 25.

Students who have not attended a Heart Mountain school previously should report to the principal's office in 25-7 with report cards from the last school attended for assignment to grades and section.

To enroll in the first grade, pupils must be six years of age by Nov. 1, Bugbee said. First graders who were not in kindergarten last year will be required to take a readiness test and should report to the principal's office.

Children who will be five years of age by Nov. 1 should enroll in kindergarten this fall. Age given must be supported by birth certificate.

Kindergarten pupils living in blocks 1 to 15 should report to the block 6 school, while those residing in blocks 17 to 30 should report to the block 25 school, Bugbee said.

Aid Available in Preparation of Personal Property Tax Notices

County tax assessors of the western states are now sending out notices to evacuees of personal property, either in private storage or government warehouses, to be assessed, Harvey Burnett, evacuee property officer, announced.

Residents needing aid in the preparation of these notices as well as assistance in estimating the value of property may obtain it at the evacuee property office if they desire. A household exemption of \$100 is allowed in all cases in payment of personal property tax, Burnett said. Immediate action is urged in the matter to avoid penalty.

Group to Discuss Plans for Obtaining Scholarship Fund

Due to legal difficulties encountered in obtaining community enterprises funds for the local scholarship fund, a group comprised of representatives from the community council, block managers, church council, The Sentinel, education staff, administrative staff and community activities will meet at 1:30 p.m. tomorrow at the Y lounge to map plans for a further drive for funds independent of the community enterprises.

Among the possibilities to be acted upon are the setting up of a permanent steering committee to handle problems related to student relocation and the staging of a carnival, benefit movie and dances, according to Frank Inouye, volunteer student representative of the national Japanese American student relocation council.

Residents Urged to Make Out Wills

Residents who have not already done so are urged by Byron Ver Ploeg, project attorney, to make out wills or otherwise provide for the settlement of their property affairs. Numerous cases have come to the attention of the project attorney, especially in cases where only a small amount of property is involved, where a little foresight would have saved endless difficulties for the widow or children upon the death of the head of a household, Ver Ploeg said.

Persons who have no near relatives in this country are reminded in particular to make definite provision for their property. Frequently such persons leave government bonds, government checks, money, personal effects, etc., and it becomes difficult or impossible to deliver the property to any person or to cash the checks and bonds, according to Ver Ploeg.

Wills or escheat proceedings may often be avoided by such devices as joint bank accounts, joint ownership of bonds or other property, he said. Since a will which does not comply with the requirements of the law is no better than no will at all, Ver Ploeg stated that residents should make use of the facilities of his office in the drafting of the wills. The service is performed free of charge.

Plans Completed for Scrap Paper Drive to be Held Aug. 26

The date of the center-wide scrap paper drive has been set for Saturday, Aug. 26, Arthur L. Kerr, fire protection officer, announced.

Wages are 65¢ per hour, time-and-a-half over 40 hours, with 10 hours per day guaranteed. Housing is provided for \$2 per week for each person. Food costs are divided between the workers while the company will furnish the cook. The jobs provide year around work.
