S.B. Council submits  
RULES for SOCIALS  
to Mr. McLaren

Awaiting Mr. McLaren's approval or action are Student Body schedule of events, rules, and regulations for the conduct of social events, rules, and procedures for all school socials, and the recommendation of Mr. Wells and Miss Smith as co-advisors for the S. B. Cabinet and the Council. These four matters were discussed and passed at the Student Council meeting held Friday, March 3.

The S.B. schedule of events for the rest of this school year includes assemblies, socials, and meetings.

A set of rules and regulations for the conduct of social events and rules, and procedures for holding all school social events were discussed and approved by the Council.

The Student Council formally recommended Mr. Wells and Miss Smith as co-advisors of the S. B. Cabinet and the Council. This belated action was taken due to a misunderstanding between Mr. McLaren and the S. B. Cabinet over the approval of advisors.

## EDUCATION System Wanted for LOSS of TEACHERS

"Parents are faced with a problem of serious inroads into educational opportunities for the children of Boston II, unless we can secure competent teachers," declared Mr. McLaren in answer to questions regarding vacancies in the teaching staff caused by recent resignations in the industrial arts and physical education departments.

He explained that the teachers would have to come from the local community because Boston II's quota for appointed teachers has been filled.

To a question in regard to the losses of much needed credits for some students, he answered, "No credit can be given for any work that is not done."

The principal stated that he had already made requests for the problem to be considered by the Boston II Community Council and members of the P.T.A. Qualified persons are urged to make applications to join the school staff and thus make it possible for the students to continue with their subjects.

"Therefore," he concluded, "it seems that the local community must assume a larger share of responsibility for the education of the young people."

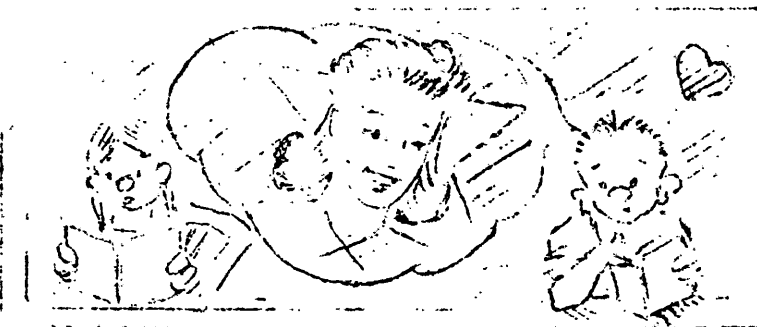

VARSIITY LOSSES CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

Minus their regular 1st string guard, Taro Yokoyama, who was unable to play because of injury, our Varsity met a stinging defeat as they lost the championship tilt 24-13 at the hands of a powerful and well-organized Poston I Quintet, last Saturday afternoon.

From the opening whistle it was Poston I's game as they swished basket after basket to take all big lead at the half, 11 to 13. This they never lost throughout the contest. Our boys playing an unusually "sloppy" game were off form as they missed the hoop time after time.

After a brief intermission, our quintet made a desperate attack in the third quarter but the lead was too large to overcome as the quarter ended 17-12.

In the final canto Poston I playing their usual cool game widened the gap as they scored seven more points while limiting our Varsity to a single point. Thus Camp I won the P.E.S. A.L. Varsity Championship 14 to 13, a never-to-be-forgotten score.

High scorer for Poston II was Tosh Toyota with 5 points while G. Tsuchiyama made 6 points for the winners.
