Memorial Day weekend in 1992 has been set as the actual dates of the fourth, and perhaps the largest, get-together of those who spent time in Tulelake as unwilling quests of the United States Government.

All those who made it to Sacramento for Reunions I, II, and HII are urged to set aside the above dates for REUNION IV.

Registration chairperson Chieko Alice Yagi revealed that a grand total of 779 Persons had registered for TULELAKE REUNION III, held at the Red Lion Inn on Memorial Day weekend.

Over 400 (not including those from Sacramento) came from all parts of California, followed by 44 from Washington, 29 from Illinois, 14 from Colorado, 13 from Oregon, 12 from Michigan and 10 from Hawaii.

Others traveled from Georgia, Japan, Maryland, Minnesota, New Jersey, Florida, North Carolina, Nevada, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Texas, Utah and Wisconsin.

The book contains individual and couple shots as well as those of numerous reunion activities.


Golf Tournament
