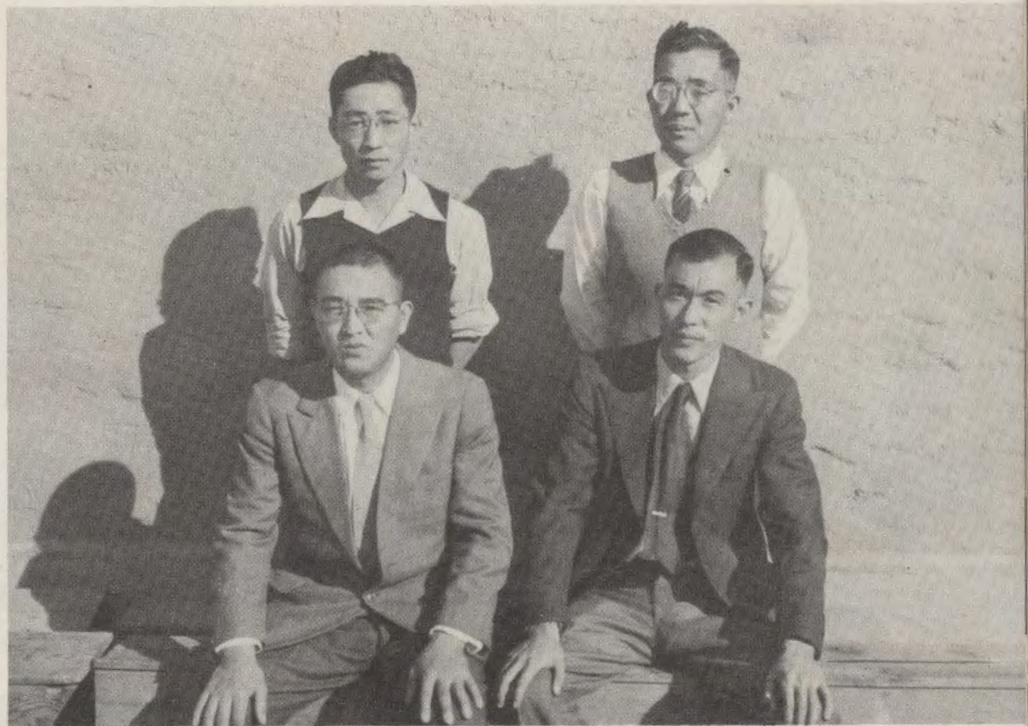
When I look back upon the past, a thousand emotions crowd my mind comparing the past with the present.
