All Block Chairmen were present except Mr. Hara.

1. Mr. Barber pointed out two minor points in regard to the letter of 10/19 to the Director from the Joint Session of 10/19.
 - a. Question of whether Block 7, in which resides 125 persons, should be allowed full and equal representation as the other blocks in the charter drafting committee.
 - b. Exact steps of educational campaign:
 1. Publicizing in the bulletin
 2. Counting a vote of certifying election.
2. Mr. Rachford gave approval of the said letter.
3. Mr. Barber requested the Council for recognition of Rev. T. Horikoshi as chaplain for the hospital as Mr. Rachford and Mr. Barber thought it proper for the Chairmen Council to discuss the matter. Council's discussions as follows:
 - a. Impartiality to the Buddhist group to have chaplaincy from Christian group only.
 - b. Duties of chaplain to the hospital:
 1. To console patients.
 2. To look after patients's home affairs.
 - c. To make request for recognition with Mr. Rachford of chaplain from the Buddhist group as well as that from the Christian Community Church if the former so desires. Council seconded paragraph C. Mr. Chairmen submitted written request with Mr. Rachford.
4. Mr. Fujioka proposed immediate rebuilding of Block 6 laundry after the construction of high school buildings. Mr. Barber explains City planning Boards recommendation for a construction schedule.
 1. High school building
 2. Garage and shop building by utilizing C.C.C. building: necessity of provisions for transportation.
 3. Completion of celotexing and placing of partitions.Mr. Barber recommended submission of request to give priority to laundry building reconstruction, and the meeting approved of Mr. Fujioka's proposition.
5. Discussion the number of representation in a charter drafting committee from Block 7 concluded is unanimously agreement of equal representation of two persons. Twelve members to form a charter drafting committee was approved by the Chairmen's Council; number of citizen and non-citizen will be elected by votes.
6. Meeting resolved to demand immediate arrangement for the payment of wages, clothing allowance, and unemployment compensation.
7. Mr. Gorai proposed:
 1. Establishment of bus system from center area to the hospital for the benefit of patients. Motion seconded unanimously.
 2. To provide protective eaves and walls at the entrance of mess halls.
 3. To put up signs of designation on trucks to pick up workers in the morning.
8. Messrs. Koide, Tsunakai, and Iwamoto were appointed by the Council to make release of discussed items to the press..
9. The Council requested the Secretary to submit request for informations.
10. Mr. _____ proposed to apply with the Administration to supply

a small shovel to all families and supply an ash pan to a family without it.

The Council approved the proposition.

11. Mr. Nagamori proposed to request the Director to reduce the charges for the meals from \$1.50 to 50 cent per day.
Motion seconded unanimously.
12. Mr. Yokota requested submission of question as to what extent W.R.A. will give aid to the residents whose properties in case were destroyed by fire or by natural causes and whose families injured.
13. To the letter of A.E. Wilde, State Administrator, requesting Mr. Barber to assist in selling war bonds and stamps, the Council expressed approval of all cooperation.
14. Mr. Okagaki contended abolition of any form of contributions and entertainment sponsored by the Recreation Department.
Also to be requisitioned by the Recreation end.
15. Meeting adjourned at 11:30 A.M.

2. An establishment of bus system from the center area to the hospital for the benefit of patients.
3. Building of an extending or protective eaves over the entrances of all mess halls. *wild agree*
4. A supply of a small trowel for each apartment and an ash pan wherever lacking. *they are in the way*

5. An immediate arrangement for the payment of clothing allowance and unemployment compensation.
6. A reduction of meal charges to visitors from outside from A Dollar and Half (\$1.50) to Fifty Cents per day. *for inmates, people charge 45¢ no charge to soldiers*
7. To what extent the W.R.A. will give aid to the center residents whose properties in case were destroyed by fire or by natural causes, and whose families injured?
