Absentees: Messrs. Fujimoto, Kaneko, Hara, Kakuuchi.

1. Mr. Chandler requested recruit of 4-6 voluntary men per block to unload and distribute coal to barracks with wages.

He pointed out that:

1. 20 cars on hand as of 10/26, 55 cars on tracks waiting to be unloaded.
2. There isn't enough man power.
3. Orders of unloading:
  - a) Food cars
  - b) Coal cars
  - c) Materials for Center
  - d) Households car: 6 carloads, covering 110 families.
4. Relief measures:
  - a) 7 dump trucks available at night; each truck covering one block, unloading a pile of coal in front of each barrack.
  - b) 20 flat bed trucks available: inconvenient of the use thereof.
5. Disadvantages:
  - a) Dirty work
  - b) Arduous labor
  - c) Night work: 6 P.M.-2 A.M., 8 hours per day.

2. Mr. Barber answered to agenda, 10/26:

1. a) According to Mr. Griffin there is no justification of crew as the crew may be kept idle.  
Small force will make task difficult to make repairs of center.
- b) What is delaying is the materials and equipments.
2. c) Necessity in Fire Dept;
  1. Providing steam plant in Fire Dept. to keep engines from freezing.
  2. Plumbing supplies.
  3. Drying rooms and drying racks.
  4. Special suits of cloth to fight fire without getting wet.
2. a) Adding to this request, provide adequate stoves in latrines.
- b) Securing adequate materials in plumbing.
- c) water main is 6 feet under surface ground.
- d) will ask Mr. Lummis to report to Mr. Rachford for whole situation of water system.
3. Mr. Barber's personal opinion:
  - a) Wise to have some supplies of barrels in warehouse.
  - b) Doubt if possible to furnish all that number of barrels.
  - c) Insanitation to keep water standstill in barrels for emergency.
  - d) Will get report on this problem.
4. Take up with Mr. Rachford.  
One information: Large kiln to set up a ceramics industry will be furnished from Syracuse, N. Y., to W.H.A.

A discussion took place on the following problems. As a result we are requesting that the Administration please take into consideration:

1. Placement of maintenance crew under Fire Department consisting of 2 carpenters, 3 assistant carpenters, 3 electricians, 2 plumbers.
2. Urgent necessity of preparation in equipments and materials for possible cracking pipes and repairing thereof due to low temperatures.
3. Order 4 spring water barrels to a mess hall for emergency relief in event of unavailability of water due to various causes.
4. Ask W.R.A. for free rent on Community Stores and wages for clerks to be paid by W.R.A. instead of by the Community Enterprises.
