Absentees: Messrs. Kawahara, Fujimoto, and Hara

1. Mr. Chairman reported information as to workers' jackets (approx. 7000) being shipped out from this Center to other centers since the distribution of jackets to workers is considered completed.
2. Mr. Barber (9:50 A.M.) attended:
 - a. Certain clothing (pea jackets) originally destined for Granada is being shipped back as Granada was not completed in construction at the time these clothings were issued.
 - b. For those whose families have no workers, purchases are to be made directly by such families by catalogue and the Administration places orders thereof with Montgomery. Government pays Montgomery and such families will be deducted for their orders from future allowances as the Administration cannot pay all wances in advance.
3. According to Mr. Barber, Mr. Paulley, State Director of U.S. Employment Service had requested to present sugar beet labor problem. Mr. Chairman consented to invite Mr. Paulley to the meeting.
4. Time for closing nomination to be Friday noon, according to Hosokawa (of newspaper, reported Mr. Barber.
5. Mr. Nagamori requested Mr. Barber to announce on bulleting to remove locks on recreation halls.
6. Schedule of coal crew at night:
 - 10/28 Blocks 12, 23
 - 10/29 Blocks 22, 25
7. Proposition was made by a chairman to suggest to Mr. Chandler to shift surplus of day crew to night.
8. Proposition was made to select two men for each block by shift to take care of stoves in latrines, laundry rooms, and mess halls.
9. Mr. Barber request by a letter to answer officially as to Committee's action on sales of war bonds and stamps.
10. Mr. Nagamori read letter from Mr. Rachford which stated to the effect that the problem of fire-insurance is under grave consideration.
11. Mr. Nagamori explained the difficulty of obtaining glutinous rice (mochi gome); however, ~~however~~, Mr. Haller had already put an an order for 80 sacks thereof.
12. Mr. Okazaki explained and stressed on necessity of immediate attention on water pipe line situation. As to mess hall complaints, Mr. Chairman recommended that any complaints as far as mess halls are concerned, those concerned should take them up with Mr. Haller, Chief Steward.
13. Mr. Paulley's explanation on sugar beet labor situation.
 - a. Labor situation in Wyoming--critical
 - b. Claiborn area (under Sheridan Factory area)
 1. Acreage: 3000 acres
 2. Location: 150 miles from the project
 3. Balance labor needed to cover: 65 %; 35 % done.
 4. reasons for labor shortage;
 - a. Certified to F.S.A.; which couldn't turn out enough men.
 - b. 200 working men shortage.
 - c. Weather.
