- 1. Request Mr. Housel to maintain status-quo until the acknowledgment of City Charter by WRA the Legal Aid Dept. and Judicial Commission are concerned. Take into consideration of the fact that without persons of legal experience the Judicial Body would be but in name Daly.
- 2. Abolish elaborate red tape in obtaining permit for the use of mess halls. we propose that any activity requesting the use of mess halls obtain permit from the Block office which, in turn, shall convey such schedule to the chef and block residents and shall make arrangement with Mr. Kurtz of the Recreation Department.
 - 3. Supply rock salt or cheap grade salt to prevent danger of slipping by ice formed in front of mess and laundry entrances.
- 4. Construct eaves and protective walls at the door-ways of school buildings, laundry and mess entrances.

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Request Mr. Todd to report the result of conference with the Enterprise Advisory Board regarding the matter of commission received from Montgomery Ward on catalog orders sent thru the Community Enterprise.

- Distribution of 1943 callendar to each apartment by either requesting contribution from Sears, Wards or constructing a printing shop wherein such calendar as a binding finish can be printed.
 - 7. Request undertaking of imporovement of apartment by furnishing a table and a chair (per individual), covering floor with linoleum, etc.
 - 8. Request report on Administration's opinion on proposal entered by the Fire Dept. of erecting an emergency fire exit in each apartment. took to carry. the They more importants

9. Permit mothers or kins of infant patients in the hospital at any time of the day and night.

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10. Request written official information on the case of those who received public assistance grants whether such persons will be subject to any threat on their civic rights after the war.

According to memorandum issued by Dr. Thompson of Can Francisco to Dr. Irwin, related Dr. Hanaoka, evacues doctors of nurses shall not be appointed to the assistant director or head nurse in order to avoid professional jealousy. Becessity of alteration on hospital management was admitted but due to inefficient provision of hospital organization and lack of proper training on the part of hospital employees including nurse's aide and lack of director and coordination a perfect harmongy could not be attained. Figures of the hospital staffs are as follows:

Dentists: 8 Total employees: 540 Registered nurses: 6 evacuees 5 Caucasians 5 Caucasians 70% of total employees

Applying outside statistics, one doctor is sufficient for a population of 1500; hence thes have number of resident doctors is not sufficient for a community of Heart Mountain. Approximately 40 registered nurses are required compared to 11 this center claims.

January 6th, memorandum was issued by Mr. Hobertson appointing Dr. Hansoka as assistant director of the Heart Mountain hospital. Dr. Hansoka disclosed that Drs. Ito and Nakaya will serve as advisory to him in formulation rules and regulations by which staffs abide. As to establishing a separate hospital for children, Dr. Hansoka said he would consult with Dr. ito for the possibility of the idea. According to Dr. Hansoka this might conflict with army regulations, and he was at a loss as to what to do. The hospital has a capacity of accommonating 200 persons--100 beds available.

As to dental clinics, dentists do not cooperate with each other on prices of charges. Finally, Dr. Hanaoka requested Block Chairmon to cooperate and understand the doctors' position. Dr. Hanaoka left at 2:50 p.M.

Recreation Department announced a schedule of motion picture, starting January 12 from Blocks 1 and 2. The admission will be five (B) cents per person, free for youngsters under 6 years of age.
