COMMUNITY COUNCIL MEETING

DATE: Sept. 14, 1943

Tue sday

TIME: 9130 - 11:45 a.m.

PLACE: Conference Room

Attended: Mr. Masao Satow, member of YMCA National Council.
Mr. Horikoshi was absent. Messrs. Nagumo and Nakaki were tardy.
Minutes of September 11 were read and approved.

Following Communications were received by the Council: Welcome Signs for new residents by Mr. Anderson; analysis data of "Homara" shoyu by Mr. Yonemura; and notice of resignation from Mr. Umemoto.

Result of approval on a proposal of work draft was announced by councilmen. Opposition to the proposal came from Blocks 8 and 22. The proposal calls for volunteer workers from any work division who are drafted on a basis whereby they shall be excused from work in their own division to remedy the situation of manpower shortage in any division where emergency cases arise to require additional workers. Mr. Okamoto proposed that the Council body make periodical visits to the various block for acquaintance and moulding of public opinion. At Mr. Ritchie's motion, The Council passed to the residents of Block 22 to discuss this and other center problems. Date of this meeting was set for this Wednesday evening at 7:30 at Block 22-30.

Requisition of a coal bin and a coal loading machine which was reported to have been installed at Granda Relocation Center, Colorado, was referred to Block Managers through Mr. Magunaga. Mr. Naka shima to supply the Granada Pioneer for information.

The to a vacancy created by Mr. Miyasato's relocation in the Manpower Commission, it has become necessary that someone must be appointed. Since the Commission was founded by the Joint effort of the Temporary Block Chairmen and Block Managers, the appointment of personnel in the Commission should also be referred to Block Managers. It was agred by the Council that a block manager should participate in this organization, and the matter was referred to Block Managers through Mr. Masunaga. Then the absolute necessity of full-time service was advocated by Mr. Okazaki who moved that a resolution be passed to be submitted to the Project Director on issuance of work assignment as full-time employees for a number of commissioners. The motion was passed by the Council unanimously.

Among 98 persons that were not permitted on the Gripsholm, 48 from relocation centers were transferred to the Rohwer Relocation Center, later to be segregated to the Tule Lake Center. 't was reported that 180 pieces of baggage had been left on the Gripsholm. The Council passed to draft a resolution to be submitted to the inti Spanish Embassy and the State Department requesting that by a transoceanic cable to the Gripsholm such baggages left on board the Gripsholm by 48 evacuees be transported back to U.S. and be shipped to the Tule Lake Center, and that financial assistance be given them until such time as their baggage arrive at Tule Lake.

Following Mr. Umemoto's resignation as councilmen, the Council appointed Messrs. Tsunokai and Nakashima as election committee of Block 21 councilman. lection date was set for Sptember 28.

Other matters referred to the Council were:

Report on Block 12 resolution on space problems report on resolution passed by
Block 22 on trustee set-up; establishment of \$100 or less wage rating for
appointed personnel from evacuees in posts such as doctors, registered nurses,
and editor-in-chief of the Sentinel by Mr. Kumai; and, work clothing for coal
crew which was passed by the Council.

Mr. Sashihara introduced a visitor to the Council meeting, Mr. Masao Satow, of the National Council of YMCA, and former chairman of the Temporary Community Council of Franada Relocation Center.

Mr. Satow commented that the Heart Mountain Council is really a council body in comparison with other centers where block Managers organization is the stronger hody. He disclosed that center problems are mutual and same in all centers. Denouncing rumor on fresh fish supply to messhalls, Mr. Satow explained that fresh fish is obtained by individuals from the Granada Fish Company operated by a Tsuchiya, formerly of Los Angeles. Regarding local sentiment towards evacuees, the fact that 25 personsdaily are allowed to shop at local stores explains the favorable reception by the Caucasian communities. As to food supplies, Gilaproject is the most blessed of all centers with fresh farm produce and Topaz center the poorest. Mr. Satow concluded that conditions in all centers are about the same but as the proverb says, there is noting like, and the people thingk their own center is the best of all.
