

Clothing Issue Situation Clarified

A WCCA representative is expected at Heart Mountain some time this week to adjust clothing allowance of colonists who did not receive issues in assembly centers. C. E. Rachford, project director, told block chairmen Wednesday morning.

The statement was made in response to a request for clarification of the clothing issue situation.

Rachford also told block chairmen that the regional director in Denver had informed him that the Army will provide additional supplies of surplus clothing to be distributed to colonists under the free clothing allowance system.

Rachford declared that adjustments can be made in the initial allowance for individuals with an inadequate winter clothing supply, involving that some advances could be made on future allowances. He emphasized, however, that the temperature averages for October show that the weather is not severe and mild days often continue into November.

The WRA under Administrative Instruction No. 27 provides a monthly clothing allowance of \$3.75 for persons 16 years of age or over, \$3.25 for persons eight to 16 and \$2.25 for those under eight years of age.

This privilege is limited, however, to workers, their dependents, and other persons involuntarily unemployed.

Judges, Alternates Approved

By a vote of 1083 to 83, the panel of seven judges and two alternates nominated by block chairmen was accepted by the various block meetings. Fourteen of the 17 blocks which voted accepted the nominations unanimously. Only block 17, with 12 approving and 63 rejecting the nominees, voted against the panel.

With this overwhelming approval the judges and alternates are to meet with project director C. E. Rachford Thursday afternoon to discuss their duties.

The judges-elect and alternates are: Kivoji Doi, Totosuke Kimoto, Tadashi Kinoshita, Rinosuke Kumai, Dr. Kirohide Nakagi, Goro Terui, Minokichi Tsuneki, judges, and Takema Kawakami and Tokaji Tokinaga, alternates.

35 Beet Workers Leave for Montana

Boarding a bus at 9 a.m. Thursday morning, 35 sugar beet workers left Heart Mountain with southern Montana as their destination.

Work on this harvest will last approximately six or seven weeks, Joe Carroll, housing and employment officer, revealed.

Laborers will be paid the prevailing wage of \$1.05 per ton for the first 12 tons and 95¢ for each additional ton thereafter.

The employer will furnish adequate housing for the workers while the latter are responsible for meals.

"Further contingents of colonists will leave continuously for outside farm labor until volunteers are exhausted," Carroll added.

532 arrivals this morning boosted the Center population total to 10,867. This group concluded the main bulk of inductees. A small number of invalids is expected to arrive from Santa Anita in the near future.

Colonists Install Celotex Walls

More than 250 men are now employed installing celotex walls and ceilings and are finishing five barracks daily. By the end of the week a crew double this size is expected to be in operation, working at a rate fast enough to complete the project by the end of the month. Stoves are being installed at the rate of two blocks a day and this work is expected to be finished by the end of the week.

Officials state that fires may be built in the stoves after installation and inspection is completed. They emphasize, however, that instructions on the use of the stoves should be read carefully. Instruction sheets are attached to stoves

After ceilings are put in a piece of asbestos must be nailed above the stove pipe before fires are built.

Mail Order House Unit to Open

A Ward order unit, a service arranged by R. Darden, Montgomery Ward and Co. representative, through the community enterprise division will be set up in the two canteens and the new dry goods store within a few days, Douglas M. Todd, division director, announced today.

Todd emphasized that a percentage of the profits accruing from the catalog sales will be returned to the colonists by Montgomery Ward and Co. either in dividend form or for use in community improvements. The two alternatives will have to be voted upon by the colonists.

Ordering through the unit is declared to enable the purchasers to save on money order and postage fees, to avoid errors in ordering and to secure quicker delivery while not paying additional fees for the merchandise or service.

Peggy Furukawa, Florence Ito, Harue Kashiwagi, Suzanne Okizaki, and Yoshiko Tokuhisa, new employees, are now taking a 10-12 day course from Darden and Marian LaPoint, assistant, to familiarize themselves thoroughly with the merchandise in the catalogs through which they will assist residents in placing their orders.

More Students Enroll

With the addition of 167 students who were registered yesterday, Sept. 15, the enrollment of the Heart Mountain schools now totals 1735.

Yesterday's registration included 125 in the upper six grades and 42 in the lower six. The remaining students who have not yet registered may do so at the opening date of school.

Powell School Donates Books

A large number of varied text books were donated to the Heart Mountain education department by the Powell school system.

The books are much appreciated and will be used in addition to the new texts which were ordered for the local schools, states C. D. Carter, superintendent of schools.

Payment will be made in cash as soon as arrangements are completed. Pay checks for work performed at Santa Anita Assembly Center are expected to be available for distribution within a week.

Three-Fold Farm Program Released

The biggest community enterprise here will be the Agricultural division embracing 27,800 farmable acres out of 46,000. The housing area comprises some 640 acres.

Farming operations will be conducted upon a community cooperative basis.

Actual work cannot begin on the project until considerable repair work is completed upon the abandoned canal. The character of the soil in its tendency to blow away makes land clearing impossible until water can be obtained in sufficient quantity.

The produce program will be three-fold:

1. The primary objective will be to make the community as self-sustaining as possible in regard to food. The 1943 production will consist of staple vegetable crops adapted to the climate and soils of the project. The vegetables will be consumed fresh during the growing season and preserved for consumption during the entire year.
2. The project will produce crops to be consumed on other relocation areas not as favorably situated for crop production as Heart Mountain.
3. Products that are urgently needed by the armed forces and the United Nations will be cultivated.

Products as beets, cabbage, carrots, lettuce, onions, peppers, potatoes, squash, turnips, peas, corn, string beans, tomatoes, spinach, cucumbers, melons and possibly soybeans for snoyu will be raised. Later seeds and oil crops which are vitally needed will be grown. Crops which do not come into production for several years will utilize land not suitable for other crops.

Livestock production will be limited at first to poultry and hogs. Due to the indefinite period of the duration dairies will not be established until later.

Glen Hartman, agriculture and industry head, will be glad to meet and answer questions with groups interested in farming. He can be found in the administrative offices.

Bridge Instructions Offered

"If any private parties in bridge are held and instructions desired, I shall be glad to be of assistance," declared Dr. F. Francis Tanaka, bridge instructor at Pomona and now a resident here.

No bridge club has been organized at Heart Mountain, however, Dr. Tanaka revealed that the club organized at Pomona is still intact here.

School tables and benches may be used for bridge, provided they are returned, Marlin Kurtz, acting recreation head, announced. Dr. Tanaka can be located at 9-20-A.

Heart Mountain Has Own Zoo

Eight varieties of animals, all caught on the Center grounds, are now displayed at the zoo of the recreation department at 12-26. The majority of the animals, which include rattlesnakes, gopher snakes, a baby gopher, chipmunks, bats, rabbits, kangaroo rats, horned toad and field mice, was caught by the recreation field crew. Clarence Matsumura is the caretaker of this miniature zoo.

Impounded Property Being Released

Electric stoves of reasonable wattage, part of impounded property shipped from Pomona are being released to residents with babies and to sick persons, Ben Lummis, chief of engineering and maintenance, announced.

Residents will make their request to Jack Bústeed, electrician, at Warehouse 9, who will issue a permit for the release of the impounded article.

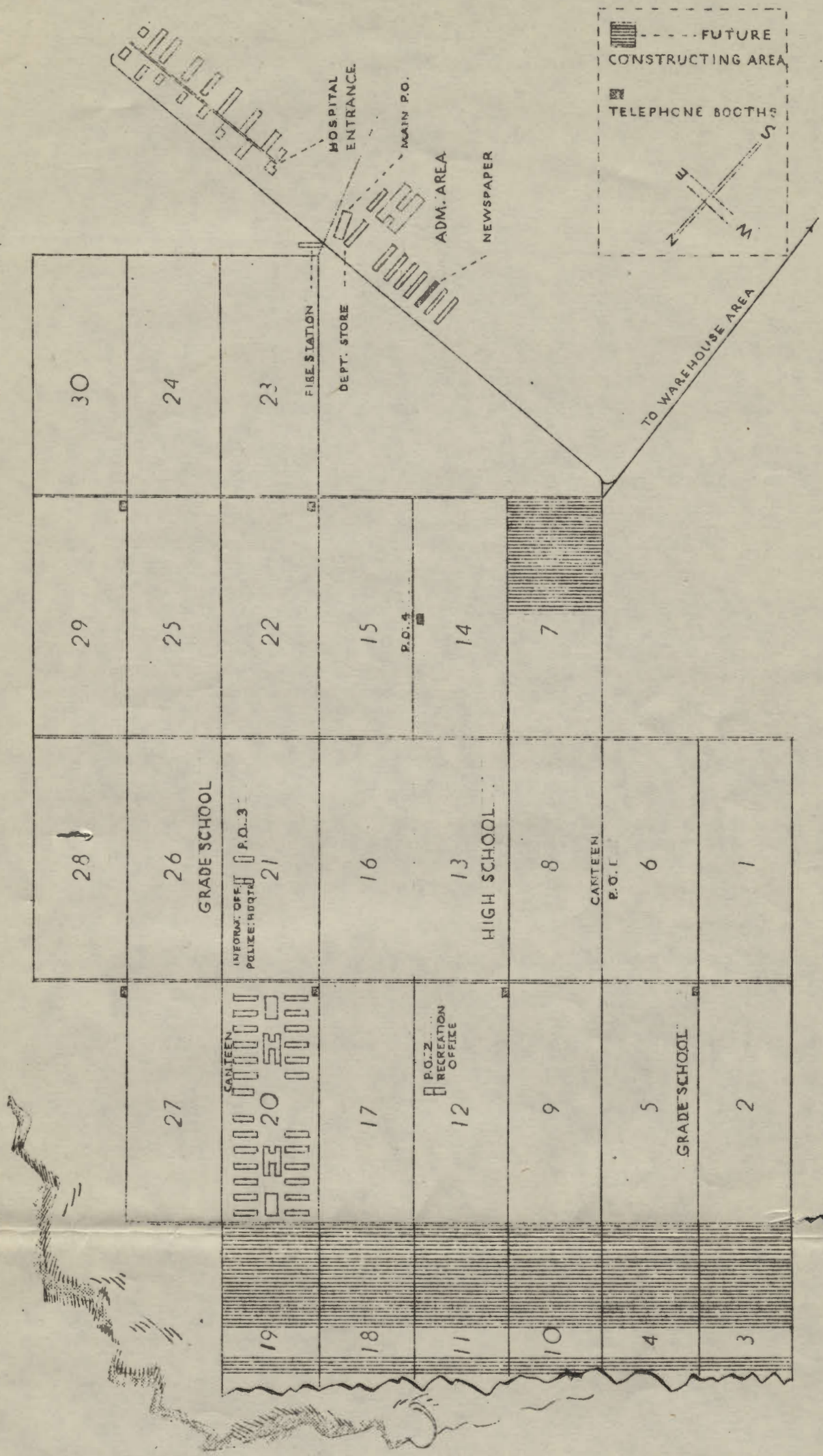

ストーブの使用に就いて

一 最初炭の火がつけられし時すぐに後の石炭を入れる事を怠らず既に赤くなつて石炭を出来るをけ鉄の穴(床下)の上にかろげる事。

二 ストープの中に煉瓦(柱)あり石炭は其の練瓦より上にあからぬ事。

三 石炭の大きさは大小何れでもよいが小形のもの俗に云ふナウコル位が最良も燃焼し易い。

四 ストープの下部にある灰溜りの小扉は常に閉ぢられ又煙の漏れ出る所である石炭を重につぎ足す時は其の灰溜りの外側にあるドラフトレシスター(竈)の空気流入を調節する扉を開いておくべし。

五 上部の蓋を開け石炭をつぎ足した後は其の蓋に付属のシロ房をドラフトレシスター(小扉)の扉を少し右に押し、それと共に下部の灰溜りの扉前にあるドラフトレシスターを少し開ける事。余り下部は空気を入らぬ事とするは灰がストーブより漏れ出す事あり。

六 新しく入れ石炭に火が燃えつき煙が無くなる迄灰溜りの扉前のドラフトレシスターは少し開けたまゝにして煙道より火が完全に石炭に燃え移つてからは室内の温度を適度に保ち此の石炭の閉ぢ方を調節する事。

七 床に灰の落ちたる事を防ぐ為に火床をぬす際床は灰溜りの扉は閉じたまま其れに附着する石炭(ドラフトレシスター)を解き、ハンドルを入れ、揺らすこと。火がよく燃える方めには灰溜りの灰を常に取出し、殊に灰が決して上の火床に落ちつかぬ様に注意せられたり。
