You will notice that your apartment is affected. The administration understands fully the inconvenience and discomfort moving at this time will cause you. We are asking that you cooperate in this program only because there is no other alternative to the problem of getting the educational system temporarily housed and classes started. I am sure you understand the importance of this program for your more than 2000 school children.

A representative of the housing department will call on you within a few days. He will assist you in finding the most suitable housing from among the open apartments in the Project. You will be given your choice of any vacancy except those in Barracks 13 to 18 in Block 7.

No effort will be spared to see that you are properly housed. If the vacant apartment is not lined, a special celotex crew will be assigned to it immediately. Stoves will be ready for operation before you move. If you desire to return to your present apartment after the school buildings are built, the apartment will be reserved for you.

If there is any question regarding this matter, please feel free to discuss it with me or members of the administrative staff. I know, however, that you will understand the necessity for this and give us your usual splendid cooperation.
