

### Thirteen Families Complete Applications for Ordnance Work

Thirteen families totalling 39 persons have completed applications for vital war work at the Tooele, Utah, ordnance depot, according to Joe Carroll, relocation program officer. Applications have been received from five to eight other families. The first contingent from Heart Mountain will leave as soon as the applicants are cleared by the provost marshal general's office. Issei who have nisei in their families were urged by Carroll to make applications along with nisei members of their families.

### Revised Dental Program Announced

Under the revised dental program at the center hospital, residents requiring dental care should obtain appointments from the receptionist at the dental clinic, Dr. Charles Irwin, chief medical officer, announced. It is the desire of the health staff to give essential service to a large number of residents instead of elective dental work to a few, Dr. Irwin stated.

Since the dentists are working in rotation, appointments will be made to chairs instead of doctors. In order to avoid confusion in the appointment schedule, patients are requested not to ask for a special dentist. A quota of 60 cases per day, including 12 emergencies, will be handled by the dental clinic.

Minor dental work for school children are being cared for by the dental clinic at the high school. If a student requires special service, he will be referred to the central clinic. The high school clinic will handle only dental work for school children.
