Grandma and I received the swell apples that you sent us yesterday and thank you very much for everything. They certainly tasted good and before we, knew it, we ate it all.....Gee, but they sure are a treat compared to the kind that we get here in Colorado occasionally.

Hows the apples and everything coming along? I I imagine the late stuffs are nearly over aren't they?

Well, I guess I should try and tell you something about camp news and all but I'm sorry to say that nothing much happens around here and its the same ole thing day in and day out. I was out cutting Broom Corn, the stuff they make brooms out of, for a couple of weeks but its all finished now so here I am again, working in the center. I'm working in the Motor Transportation Division and driving a Truck around hauling perishables for the Mess Halls.

They just recently lifted the ban on center activities because no more Polio cases. I just recently read in the Sebastopol Times that the Graton School closed due to some Polio cases. This dreaded sickness sure seems to be spreading all over the country doesn't it?

Grandma and I and all the rest of the family are just as fine as ever. Grandpa writes often and he always asks that he be remembered to you folks. Uncle Johnny's wife recently had a baby boy and they are getting along swell. I imagine that you will hear from Johnny pretty soon, telling you all about it.

Well, Mrs. Perry, not much more news now so will be closing and everyone sends their best regards, especially my Grandmother. Please sayshello to Mr. Perry for me.
