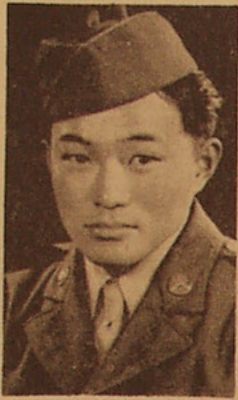

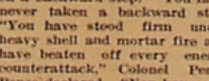
WOUNDED VETERANS OF ITALY MAKES SHORT VISIT TO HUNT

Chickens Total 14,839; 5,280 Dozen Eggs Produced in Aug.

The farm report for the month of August released by the Agricultural division shows the amount of acreage planted, and the harvesting dates.

The total poundage of the vegetables harvested is 114,800.

The livestock reports show that 111 sows were purchased and 137 hogs with an average live weight of 292 lbs. were slaughtered for project consumption.

Nakamura's War Casualties

"The Nakamuras themselves are war casualties. The war made homeless people of the American Japanese of the Pacific Coast. And the Nakamuras, American-born, were placed in the Gila River center."

Neighbors Bring Flowers

"Yesterday, after Sunday's tragedy became known, the neighbors began to come to the home, bringing consolation and flowers. And last night the father's fellow employees at the Clifton Coal & Supply Co. came to call."

Harder to Live in Brotherhood

"It is comparatively easy to be a good, loyal member of a group, family unit, a social organization, a labor union, a nation. It is harder, and more important as a good citizen of the world, to live in brotherhood with all, with those who belong to other groups to other nations."

"Once we thought we'd go back to California after the war," Mrs. Nakamura said. "But now, with our boy buried here, and because of our gratitude to our neighbors, Cleveland will be our home forever."

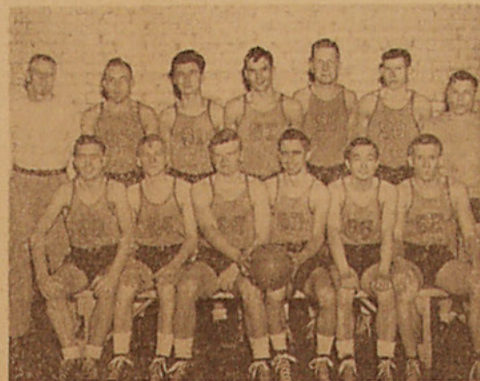
Though the tournament is of a single-elimination type, teams defeated in the first full round of play may still try for the consolation honors. All tournament games will be over on Thursday, weather permitting.

### COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES SLATE HOLE-IN-ONE GOLF CONTEST

Play In Qualifying Round Starts This Afternoon; Many Cash Prizes Offered

The Hunt sports picture which has been overly dominated by the playing of baseball this summer got a competitor, at least for this week-end, with the announcement from the Area "B" office of the C. A. that a "Hole-In-One" Golf Contest will be held this week-end.

### Two Fans Sustain Injuries In Tule Baseball Fracas

NEWELL, CALIF.—Two spectators were slightly injured in a "free-for-all" which took place following a baseball game here at the Tule Lake Segregation center between two segregation teams, reported the War Relocation Authorities on September 8.

A group of segregationists representing the Poston center was playing a team made up of former Manzanarites for a place in the play-off of the camp championship. In the twelfth frame, with the count knotted up at apiece, a Manzanar batsman hit a long fly to left field, the left fielder fumbled the catch, but the center fielder who had run over to back up the play, caught the pellet before it just hit the ground. The Manzanar team and its rooters all claimed that the center fielder did not catch the fly in the air.

However, the team of former Poston residents won, 8 to 5, in the fourteenth inning. After the contest, a group of spectators and ball players started arguing about the center fielder's catch. The argument became serious and fists were flying before the administrative police restored order. Only two of the group of 15 or 16 were hurt seriously enough to warrant treatment. A cut on the head of one required twelve stitches, while the other's arm was bruised.

In releasing the news of the contest, Frank Fukano, "B" recreation leader, stated that any and everyone may enter this tournament and that cash prizes will be given to the winners.

The first phase of the contest-play, the qualifying round, starts this afternoon on the 26 green, next to the tennis court at Blk. 26, from 2 p. m. Then, in order to give any late entries a chance to participate, on Sunday morning from 9 to 11 a. m., the second qualifying round will be held. With shots selling at three for a dime, any "Hole-In-One" aspirant may try as many times as he wishes in this round as there is no limit to the number of shots one may take.

However, in the final round to be played from 2 to 5 p. m. on Sunday, there is a limit of 30 shots. In order to become an entrant in the final round, there will be a fee of one dollar charged. In addition to this assessment, one must successfully qualify to enter the final match by making his qualifying shots come within two yards of the flag. A reward of one dollar will be awarded to such a feat.

For the big prizes of the tournament in the final, the C. A. is offering sixteen dollars (\$16.00) in cash for a hole-in-one; five dollars for the closest; three dollars for second place; two dollars for third and one dollar for fourth. Clubs and golf balls will be furnished.
