Baltimore Office Closed on Apr. 15 Says WRA Officer

NEW YORK CITY—Closing of the Baltimore, Md., relocation office on April 15 and arrangements for continuing to serve resettlers in that district through the field relocation office in Washington, D. C., have been announced by Leo T. Simmons, acting relocation supervisor for the Middle Atlantic Area.

The services of the full staff of the Washington district office, including Emery Faust, relocation officer in charge, Charles T. Moon, and Ken Nishimoto, will be made available to evacuees already residing or planning to resettle in Baltimore and vicinity, Simmons said.

In a letter announcing the new arrangements to Baltimore resettlers, Simmons wrote, "WRA will continue to develop facilities in Baltimore so that when we finally liquidate, the cooperating agencies will be prepared to give you every necessary service. I should like to urge you to call on Mr. Faust and his staff for any assistance they can provide."
