### Resettlement Report

★ "there's no place like . . ."

Mr. Richard Setsuda, medically discharged from the famed 442nd Combat Team, was in Seattle recently looking the situation over with a view of finding a home here for Mrs. Setsuda and their six-year old son, David, who are here in Minidoka.

Setsuda has been back in the states since January, and he is now on furlough from the convalescent hospital at Camp Lockett, San Diego, Calif., to which he will shortly return for another six weeks.

Prior to evacuation, Setsuda operated a wholesale beverage house in Seattle for eight years. His post-war plans are still indefinite, but he was quoted as saying in reference to Seattle that "there's no place like your own back yard!"

★ as teachers of democratic principles

Florence West, area reports officer, spoke to an assembly of country school teachers of King County at the invitation of County Superintendent William F. Poole. Supt. Poole said he was very interested in keeping the teachers informed on the WRA relocation program, and as teachers of democratic principles, he wanted to be certain that they remembered that tolerance was one of the most important. Approximately two hundred teachers were present at two different annual meetings, one held at Bothell High School and the other at Hill-View High School.

This report which emanates from the Seattle WRA office also disclosed that Mrs. West spoke to the women's auxiliary group of the Pilgrim Congregational Church in Seattle, and several of the women expressed themselves as anxious to have the evacuees return "so we can get plenty of decent vegetables at a reasonable price again!"

The article was ended with this smart quip—"Women are always looking for household bargains!"

The first family to return to Bainbridge Island is the Takemoto family, consisting of Mr. and Mrs. Saichi Takemoto and their five younger children, Victor Takemoto, who remained at Manzanar to graduate from high school, has had his pre-induction physical and is scheduled to be called into the army in about 90 days.

The Takemotos, according to the WRA, have purchased strawberry plants, the plot of ground has been plowed, and the family will be assisted with their planting on May 12 by members of the American Friends work party.

The family was scheduled to arrive in Seattle on a certain day, and after they were several days overdue the WRA office sent out a "scouting party" to see what had happened. They found the Takemotos just finishing breakfast in their home on Bainbridge Island. A Caucasian neighbor had loaned them some pots and pans, for their personal effects had not yet arrived from the center.

The Red Cross has aided the family tremendously in locating beds, mattresses, etc. The WRA helped Mr. Takemoto locate 10,000 strawberry plants at \$10.00 per thousand. The going price is \$18.00 per thousand, but the plants the WRA secured are the second size but of good quality.

So there is the true report about the Takemotos. Believe it??

T. Horike, also an ex-Huntite, is continuing his education. He is now attending classes at the College of Puget Sound. It is interesting to note that he is the first evacuee to return to Tacoma, Washington.

K. Yamane, who was formerly living at Heart Mountain, also recently returned to Tacoma. Yamane expects to reestablish his business; he also expects to call his parents from the center in the near future.

"The YWCA residence is available for permanent and temporary housing for women and girls at 5th and Seneca. We hope you will feel free to avail yourselves of these opportunities."

# YOGORES WIN 11-6; TAKE SENIOR TITLE

## Both Teams Suffer From Loss of Players; Akagi Pitches Victory

In a hastily scheduled tilt for the senior league championship the Yogores, champions of the first round, emerged victors over the Actives, who won the second round crown by virtue of their overwhelming lead.

Although both teams were suffering considerably from the loss of key men, the Yogores with a slight advantage in hitting power were able to score eleven runs and hold their opponents to six.

Pitching the title win was Jim Akagi who collected four of the eleven hits made by his team. Both teams were tied at five-all up to the fifth inning but from that point the Yogores pulled ahead steadily to score twice in the fifth, again in the sixth and finally four times in the seventh. The Actives meanwhile were held to a single run by Akagi and his mates who, despite their five errors, retired their opponents twice with the bases loaded.

The Yogores started off in the initial frame with a pair of singles by Takatsuka and Akagi. After a strike out by Kubota Sakurai singled to score Takatsuka. Akagi scored later when Mukai grounded to shortstop Abe who picked off Sakurai at third for the second out. The side was retired when Yamaguchi grounded out for the final out. The Actives came through in their half of the first frame with a pair of runs also when Urakawa singled, advanced to second on Hiroshige's sacrifice, reached third on Nakashima's single and came in on an error by second sacker Sakurai who failed to get the ball away in time to throw out Haggie Nakashima at first.

Another single by Tsuchida scored Nakashima who had reached third on Nakashima's grounder to second. This ended the scoring at the moment but again in the third frame with the score at five to three in favor of the Yogores, the Actives counted twice to tie the score. Spectators at the championship playoff game between the Yogores and Actives witnessed two teams which had at least half of their original squads missing go into action and they were enthusiastic regardless.

Incidentally this game was scheduled only a few hours before the start of the game when it was learned that several of the players would be leaving the next day.

Yours is the true Americanism, Mr. Brougham.

The combat veterans travel every week-end from Colorado Springs to Denver to compete with leading Denver softball teams. Their team is being sponsored by Dr. Yosh Ito of Denver and has won 4 and lost 2 record to date.

The afternoon proved to be just one heap of unlucky breaks for the No Names as they allowed their opponents to bring in five runs in the first inning on three singles and four walks.

A single by lead-off man Takatsuka for the Yogores, followed by Akagi's double down the left field foul line brought in the initial score of the game. A base on balls by Tamura put runners on first and second and another double by Sakurai scored Akagi and later Tamura who hit the plate on an error when left fielder Matsushita dropped the ball hit by Sakurai in attempting to throw it in to third base.

The fourth and fifth runs were scored by Sakurai and Mukai, the latter who drew a walk, stole second with Sakurai on third, advanced to third on a passed ball which scored Sakurai and Mukai scored on another passed ball. Walks were taken by Togami and Jitodal but they were later put out at second. Inooye had in the meantime grounded out at first.

The pair of runs collected by the No Names were scored in the second frame when Kawahara started off the inning with a base on balls and Sakakibara and Aono each singled with one out. An error by centerfielder Kino enabled both runners to come in as Sakakibara stole all the way home.

However, the Yogores still obtained a comfortable margin for they had counted twice in the second to make the score 7 to 2 going into the third frame.

In the third inning the Yogores added another run and counted twice in the fourth canto and once more in the seventh. Sakurai led the hit parade with a pair of doubles for three official times at bat.

of democratic, representative local government.  
There are dry-goods and grocery stores at Minidoka; and shoe-repair shops; barbers; laundry, dry cleaning, and check-cashing services; a newspaper; two movies; and a fish market. Taken all together, these enterprises do a gross business of almost a million dollars a year. About a tenth of this is returned to the residents, in the form of patronage dividends, since the entire trading structure of the project is organized as the Minidoka Consumer's Cooperative, incorporated under the District of Columbia Cooperative Association Act. The Co-op pays rent to the Government for the space it occupies, and pays the salaries of its employees, all of whom are evacuees. The Board of Directors, elected by the residents, operates the Co-op through a General Manager and his staff. Commodities are sold generally at prevailing market prices. There is careful quality control. The Minidoka Co-op is federated with co-ops at other centers and maintains a purchasing office in New York City.

One more word on the relocation problem: most evacuees are now free to leave relocation centers at any time; and since present plans call for closing all the centers by the end of the year, the number of people leaving the centers will necessarily increase. They will go to attend school or college, to be treated at a hospital, to do all the things other Americans do. They will re-enter the arena of America. And since a large part of America is absorbed in the war effort, the evacuees will also work in armament factories and join the armed forces. According to the War Department, approximately 13,000 Americans of Japanese ancestry have been inducted into the army since 1940. (Ed. note—that figure of 13,000 has now been upped to approximately 20,000—according to latest tabulations of Nisei in service.) Several hundred have entered the service from Minidoka alone, many of them volunteers. Their outstanding record, in the 442nd Japanese American Combat Team and elsewhere, has brought them and all America much honor.

America is a country of minorities living side by side. There are occasional unfortunate incidents, but it cannot be denied that the power and richness of American life are enhanced by the valued contributions of each minority group. As the thousands of Japanese Americans return to their homes in America, they will add their contributions to the general treasury.
