

SPECIAL CHRISTMAS FUND DRIVE ON DECEMBER 3-5

PRESERVE RIGHTS, ACT NOW--YASUI Advocates Cooperation With Govt.

Co-op Ready To File Papers Of Incorporation

After more than two months of discussion during which the Co-op's temporary Board of Directors considered all phases of organization, Yoshio Urakawa, Board spokesman, announced that the "Articles of Incorporation" for Consumers' Enterprises will be presented for approval to representatives next Friday evening.

If ratified by the representatives of the people the "Articles of Incorporation" will be forwarded to Washington for final approval, Urakawa indicated.

The spokesman said the place where the meeting will be held will be announced at a later date.

Determined to carry his case to the highest court of the land, and confident of eventual success in the final outcome, Minoru Yasui, in a Thanksgiving Day note to The Irrigator received today, urged that, through collective effort, nisei in evacuation centers take due and proper procedures for the "formal reservation of your fundamental rights and liberties as American citizens."

Writing from a prison cell, alone, without bitterness or rancor, Yasui recalled that he had advocated and "shall continue to advocate that you people in evacuation centers give your complete and fullest cooperation to all practical and physical phases of relocation, in order that you might most effectively contribute to the national policies of the United States, thereby winning for yourself the esteem and the respect of the civilian and military authorities in charge of the evacuation program and further the gratitude and appreciation of the American people."

For weeks prior to his departure from Hunt, Yasui had been assisting in the legal preparation of the proposed charter of self-government for this colony.

To the non-citizen issei, Yasui's Thanksgiving Day note remarked that "regardless of your inherent and natural feeling for your native land, America is your adopted country, which has bountifully provided for you and your children. For the sake of your American sons and

daughters, for the sake of your posterity, give your unstinting support and loyalty to your adopted land...."

Yasui's letter also noted: "Thus far, our government, the United States, has been solicitous of the physical welfare and decent comfort of the evacuees. Everything possible under the present

war-time circumstances is being done to preserve the human decency of the evacuee.

"For this and for the manifold blessings that come from living in these United States, instead of in some fascist nation with which we are at war, there must be given a full measure of thanksgiving and heartfelt gratitude."
