## 539 STILL UNPAID. TO GET SEPT. PAY

Charged with brandishing a butcher knife and threatening the cooks at D.H. 16 during the special dimer on Thanksgiving Day, Noboru Hashimoto, 21-year-old kibei, was taken Monday, in the custody of Capt. Clarence Lee, to the Jermene County Jail at Jerome to stand trial.

Hashimoto, who lives at 16-10-B, was said to have been under the influence of liquor when he created the disturbances in D.H. 16, according to the complaint filed with the Internal Security division by a resident of the block.

The young kibel first had his dinner at D.H. 14 from where he was ejected when he persisted, despite warnings, in heckling and booing a Mr. Mori who was making an announcement.

### MALNUTRITION COMMON IN JAPAN. DR. McSPARRAN NOTES

"A great deal of malnutrition, especially among the low coonomic class, exists in Japan -- infantile rickets and beri-beri being very common ailments."

"Since the Pacific war, food has been rationed in Japan but some of the pressure has been relieved by the importation of food from the occupied territories."

These and other observations were made by Dr. Joseph L. McSparran, who practiccd medicine in Japan for the past quarter of a contury, at an informal discussion held Sunday oven-ing at the project hospi-

Dr. McSparran is presently connected with the WRA Health Division.

He reported that status of women has improved in Japan, with women very active in the industrics and .various professions--more so than in the United States.

Dr. McSparran declared that 24 of the 25 years he spent in Japan were pleasant and ideal, but the last year of his stay was far from pleasant.

Bccause he was also medical adviser to the American and British consulates and suspected of possessing some knowledge of military value, he was held in solitary confinement for six months and nine days at Yokohama.


