## ALLOWANCES Meat Rationing FORCLOTHING ARE COMPILED

"Applications for clothing allowances turned into managers' offices block yesterday are being compiled as quickly as possible so that cash allowances for the months up to November may be paid soon, possibly starting weok," Carl V. Sandoz, head of clothing issuance, said this woek.

. All workers on .the project will automatically reccive allowances for thomselves and their dependents. Deductions will be made for surplus clothing issued and for after Oct. 21st and for time spent working off the project,

Non-workers will be ontitled to allowances on the basis of need, Sandoz added.

It was indicated that disbursement would be by blocks, each block being paid as rapidly as possi-

All meats on hand in refrigerating warehouses and all meats requisitioned by the relocation centers are affected by the ration ordor from regional headquarters in San Francisco.

Children below 6 years of age will be alloted 3/4 of a pound wookly, and children between the .ages of 6 and 12 will be on \_tled 12 pound weekly, while all persons above 12 years will be allowed 25 pounds por wook. The amounts include all bones and fat.

Official sources vealed Friday that rationing in Hunt was being gradually put into effect and that it would be in full force soon.

The situation for the past several days continues to be quiet.

Meanwhile, the story of how 14 young Japanese-American Boy Scouts heroically stood off a milling mob which attempted to seize the Stars and Stripes from a flag pole in the midst of the rioting Sunday, was revealed by Ralph P. Merritt, director of the Monzanar tang.

According to Herritt, the administration fragpole was near the area where the mob formed. One of the pro-axis sympathizers made a dash for the flagpole in an apparent attempt to haul down the flag, but the Boy Scouts surrounded the base of the flag pole, defying the agitator and the whole mob to touch the flag.

The Boy Scouts were armed with rocks the size of baseballs.


The results of the poll, however, were by no means taken as conclusive of the sentiment of the entire community as but 480 vetes were east out of ever 2,500 ballots which were distributed.
