

ALLOWANCES FOR CLOTHING ARE COMPILED

"Applications for clothing allowances turned into block managers' offices yesterday are being compiled as quickly as possible so that cash allowances for the months up to November may be paid soon, possibly starting next week," Carl V. Sandoz, head of clothing issuance, said this week.

All workers on the project will automatically receive allowances for themselves and their dependents. Deductions will be made for surplus clothing issued and for after Oct. 21st and for time spent working off the project.

Non-workers will be entitled to allowances on the basis of need, Sandoz added.

It was indicated that disbursement would be by blocks, each block being paid as rapidly as possible.

Meat Rationing Planned By WRA

The W.R.A., adhering to the policy of complying with government requests, revealed, this week, its plans for meat rationing in the project.

All meats on hand in refrigerating warehouses and all meats requisitioned by the relocation centers are affected by the ration order from regional headquarters in San Francisco.

Children below 6 years of age will be allotted $3/4$ of a pound weekly, and children between the ages of 6 and 12 will be entitled $1\frac{1}{2}$ pound weekly, while all persons above 12 years will be allowed $2\frac{1}{2}$ pounds per week. The amounts include all bones and fat.

Official sources revealed Friday that rationing in Hunt was being gradually put into effect and that it would be in full force soon.

FRYER LAUDS LOCAL GROUP FOR CHARTER

Work of the Community Planning Commission in drafting the proposed charter of self-government for Hunt has been highly commended by E.R. Fryer, WRA regional director in San Francisco, in a letter to Harry L. Stafford, project director.

The Planning Commission, in drafting the proposed charter and the manuals prepared in conjunction with the charter, felt it to be of extreme importance for the welfare of the residents as a whole that the nisei assume leadership and be elected to the Community government, according to Dr. George Tani, member.

Likewise, the Commission felt that in order to facilitate good-will and smooth functions of the government that an advisory board of citizens as well as non-citizens should be included in the plan of government.

Copies of the proposed charter will be distributed as soon as it has the final approval of the project.

Moore Arrives To Assume Duties As Project Attorney

Ralph J. Moore, former lawyer of Rochester, New York, has arrived to take over duties as the regular project attorney, Clarence T. Arai, Legal Division Officer, revealed Thursday.

A. E. O'Brien, present acting attorney, is slated to leave soon for Delta, Utah, from where he will

proceed to Manzanar and then to San Francisco to work with the Evacuee Property Supervisor's Office.

Moore, a U. of Minnesota Law School graduate, came to Hunt from Washington, D.C. where he conferred with Philip Gilich, WRA solicitor.

All payments of wages from now on will be made in the building located between the post office and the garage, Clarence H. Hurst, fiscal accountant, said today. Hurst also said that divisions will be notified through the

BOY SCOUTS DEFEND FLAG

Conditions at the Manzanar relocation center--scene of bloody rioting earlier in the week--have settled down into a calm, an AP dispatch stated.

The situation for the past several days continues to be quiet.

Meanwhile, the story of how 14 young Japanese-American Boy Scouts heroically stood off a milling mob which attempted to seize the Stars and Stripes from a flag pole in the midst of the rioting Sunday, was revealed by Ralph P. Merritt, director of the Manzanar camp.

According to Merritt, the administration flag-pole was near the area where the mob formed. One of the pro-axis sympathizers made a dash for the flagpole in an apparent attempt to haul down the flag, but the Boy Scouts surrounded the base of the flag pole, defying the agitator and the whole mob to touch the flag.

The Boy Scouts were armed with rocks the size of baseballs.

The flag was not hauled down.

Typical of the sentiment of many residents was that expressed by Tura Nakamura, Blk. 42 manager, who wrote the IRRIGATOR:

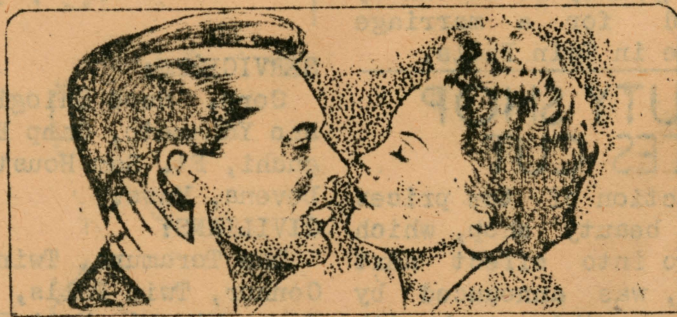

RETAIL PRICE IN CANTEENS TO BE SAME AS OUTSIDE

Prices on retail merchandise sold in the Community stores are to be comparable to the prices in the stores in the near-by communities, according to John Essene, Associate Supt. of the Community Enterprises.

Certain difficulties are faced in the determination of prices. Price ceilings on merchandise bought before the increase in wholesale prices have held the retail price down, Essene said, whereas the new merchandise bought at a higher price is necessarily sold at a higher retail price. As nearly as possible, our prices should be comparable to the retail prices in the stores at Twin Falls, Essene said.

Poston Next To Join Circle Of Printed Press

The Poston Press Bulletin's entrance into the growing circle of printed newspapers neared reality as a nitlock flat bed press, chases, and a power unit arrived in the nearby town of Parker, awaiting delivery to Poston, according to the center's mimeographed sheet, the Press Bulletin.

The 6,000 pounds of equipment from the American Type Founders Company of San Francisco were purchased through Poston's community enterprises with the income derived from the September and October Bulletin's advertising sales.

A Model C Intertype machine is expected from Los Angeles within 10 days.

RESETTLEMENT SUCCESS WILL DEPEND ON PUBLIC, EVACUEES

Success of the WRA's "permanent dispersed phase of relocation" will depend on the "sentiment of the public in general, and the sentiment of the evacuees," Dillon S. Myer, National WRA Director stated in an article written by him in the winter issue of "Common Ground".

The Director reiterated that evacuees may leave the relocation centers if they meet conditions laid down by the WRA.

Committee Meets On Assistance To Yasui

The ten committee members elected at a previous meeting to aid Min Yasui met Sunday night at the hospital to discuss the ways and means of giving aid to Yasui.

Prior to a general discussion, Ronald Shiozaki, leave officer, was elected chairman and Dr. George Tani was chosen secretary of the committee.

"Genuine progress can be made in permanent relocation if evacuated persons will be accepted by the public and if the evacuees themselves are willing to try to establish themselves in communities outside the relocation centers," Myer's article stated.

Myer seemed confident that the majority of the 125,000 residents of the relocation centers would be able to meet the requirements of the WRA--(a) a definite place to go and means of support, outside of designated military areas; (b) reporting to the WRA any change of address; (c) reasonable assurance of their acceptability in the community where they plan to go; (d) clearance and approval of their release by the FBI.

"The principles underlying public acceptance of the evacuees as individuals would seem to be closely allied to the things we are fighting for," Myer added.

Cognizant of the nations manpower shortage, Myer wrote that the policies of the War Relocation Authority will permit evacuees to meet that demand, and augment the dwindling supply of manpower in the nation.

Myer's article dealt mainly with a factual account of the evacuation and settlement in relocation centers of West Coast Japanese.
