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CO-OP MEET TO DRAW ESSENE TO SALT LAKE

Corresponding with Market Week, a conference will be held in Salt Lake City on February 15 and 16 by Co-op representatives from the various relocation centers, John Essene, Supt. of Community Enterprises, disclosed this week.

Two of the topics to be discussed at this meeting will be the problems of buying and education of the evacuees. Park Abbott, Manager of Associated Co-ops of Northern California, regional cooperative wholesale, Oakland, will also present plans for the establishment of a branch office to serve the relocation centers, Essene said.

Charles Belitt, former Supt. of Community Enterprises, now Chief Purchasing Officer in New York will be present at the meeting.

Representing the local Co-op at the conference will be Reno Yoshimura, assistant Co-op Manager, Harry Nakagawa, Dry Goods Buyer, Keiji Saito, General Stores Buyer, Joe Yasumura, Nisei Co-op Educator and Essene.

OUTSIDE EMPLOYMENT AIDS ORGANIZED FOR EVACUEES

A network of relocation offices and field stations through the Middle West and Rocky Mountain region, to aid workers now resident in relocation centers in obtaining outside employment, is rapidly getting organized after a series of conferences in Chicago and Washington, from January 14 through January 30.

In attendance at the Chicago conferences, which were conducted under the leadership of Employment Chief Thomas Holland, were staff and field members of the WRA

employment personnel, officials of the United States Employment Service, and representatives of various citizen committees and organizations cooperating with the WRA in its relocation program.

Five principal relocation offices have been opened in Salt Lake City, Denver, Kansas City, Chicago, and Cleveland, respectively, and each one is to be responsible for the establishment and operation of from 8 to 12 subsidiary field stations. These offices will have the dual function of seeking employment offers and answering the inquiries of prospective employers, and of aiding the workers to adjust themselves to conditions in the communities where they are placed.

Employment Chief Holland has announced a determination, on the part of the Employment Division, to find acceptable work opportunities for as many relocation center residents as can qualify for them.

"The action of the War Department in opening military service for draft-age nisei," he said, "has been our signal to make available to every loyal person in the centers an opportunity to serve the cause of American democracy, either in the Army or on the production front, and to prove his title to enjoy all the rights and privileges that America has to offer. We are not planning to find merely

No Return Of Japanese To Coast Yet - Asok. Secty. McCloy

SEATTLE--"At least for the time being," no return of any Japanese to Military Area No. 1 on the Pacific Coast is contemplated, the Northwest Oriental Evangelization Society of Seattle was advised in a recent letter from Assistant Secretary of War John McCloy.

McCloy wrote:

"There are vast areas elsewhere in the United States where they can get

employment, but the considerations which induced the initial evacuation from the strategic west coast areas still exist."

The Evangelization Society at its annual meeting last May had deplored the "wholesale evacuation of American citizens of Japanese ancestry from coastal areas," and urged the return of citizens to their former homes, the Rev. U. G. Murphy reported.

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SECOND ARNOLD FEATURE ASKS, ARE MINIDOKANS LOYAL?

Don't call us Japs-- they're who we're fighting, young Minidoka is quoted as saying in the second article in a series of three features on Minidoka by Mel Arnold in the latest Sunday Oregonian.

Intended to answer the question "how loyal are the Japanese evacuees?" the article, given graphic emphasis by descriptive photographs and art work by Minidokans, dwells on the "black gluey mud", the "powder-fine yellow dust of the hot dry summers", and in spite of exposure to them, the professed willingness of Minidoka's young manhood to take part in the war.

The youngsters, all Amer-

ican citizens, are still complaining about being given the same draft rating as enemy aliens, according to the sentiment Arnold met with during his visit here.

However there was little evidence of bitterness, Arnold adds.

"Every American has to make some sacrifices, and this is ours," Amy Mitamura, a high school senior, is quoted.

In the same issue of the Oregonian an editorial stated:

"Mr. Arnold.....covered his assignment with fidelity and understanding that commend the articles to all Americans who wish to form their opinions on information rather than prejudice.

"The Oregonian is proud of the sincerity and the instructiveness of the articles, and rightly considers them to be a most helpful contribution to the general understanding of a racial and national problem which, in its essence, will test in eventual solution the method, manner and validity of our democratic principles."

Arnold's Story: Pro And Con

Widely diversified opinions were expressed by readers of The Sunday Oregonian on Mel Arnold's first of three articles on "The Wrong Ancestors" which appeared last Sunday in that paper.

Mrs. Edna Murphy of Aberdeen, Wash., wrote the editor of The Oregonian as follows:

"After reading Mel Arnold's article in your Sunday magazine on Jap internment I want you to know how I feel as a mother with two boys in service and one in New Guinea.

"I'm sure he would be more than pleased to exchange his surroundings for those of the Japs in Idaho. He would be happy to wade in mud only to shoe tops instead of fighting muck to his waist.

"There are millions of fathers and mothers that feel as I do. We could

Eventual Freedom Prophesied

Disclosing that 110,000 Japanese, both aliens and citizens, now in the relocation centers may all eventually go free into sections of the United States where there are no restrictions, Dillon Myer, WPA director, is quoted in an INS dispatch as saying:

"The relocation centers are not detention or internment camps. They are merely relocation centers and the Japanese-Americans will be released when and where it is feasible for them to be assimilated."

Commenting on the plans for schools in the centers, Myer announced that "construction work on several school projects in the centers has been halted because the original plan to transfer about 15,000 Japanese-Americans from Hawaii to the mainland has been abandoned on account of the shipping problem."

ROUTING OF MAIL FOR INTERNEES EXPLAINED

Instructions regarding the routing of mail for internees via the District Postal Censor were received by The Irrigator Monday from the Office of the Provost Marshal General, Services of Supply, War Department, Washington, D.C.

The instructions, which were sent to Commanding Generals of all service commands for the attention of the Commanding Officers of all internment camps, stated as follows:

"The censorship of (incoming) domestic internee letters may be expedited by forwarding them to New York before being sent to an internment camp. Postage stamp is not required. The name and return address of the sender should be placed in the upper left hand corner of the envelope, the term 'Prisoner of War Mail - Free' should be placed in the upper part and toward the right of the envelope, the name and serial number of the internee, the name of his camp (but not the location of the camp) and 'Box 20, General Post Office, New York, New York' should be placed in the center and lower half of the envelope."

FORMING COMBAT UNITS OPPOSED BY REP. RANKIN

WASHINGTON.—Plans announced by Secretary of State Stimson for the organization of a Japanese combat unit in the American army were denounced last week by Representative John E. Rankin, Democrat, Mississippi, who declared that the United States must destroy Japan

or risk probable invasion of the Pacific Coast.

Rankin maintained instead that persons of Japanese ancestry who want to serve this country should be put into labor battalions "where each and every one of them could be watched at all times."

NISEI FARM ARID LOCALE IN WAR EFFORT

Leasing a 3800-acre ranch at Keetley, Utah, a group of Japanese American citizens have converted a mass of sagebrush into acres of well cultivated vegetables.

The group is under the direction of Fred Wada, Oakland, Calif., business man, according to George A. Fisher, who writes in the February issue of Survey Graphic magazine of the part these citizens are playing in the increasing of crop production for the war effort.

Most of the group is composed of Japanese American who are desirous to help win the war and are demonstrating this ambition in the agricultural field, Fisher explains.

RESIDENCE UNAFFECTED

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 6.—Attorney General Robert Kenny in an opinion expressed last Saturday said that a Japanese alien who was a resident of California until his removal to a relocation center, outside the state does not lose his residence because of his removal.

The opinion was asked by Matt Brady, San Francisco attorney. He wanted to know if such a person, in an out-of-state center, could file for divorce in California and submit his case through depositions.

Kenny said it was discretionary with the judge as to whether he should grant a decree on a deposition and in the absence of the complainant.

stop-gap and emergency jobs for people who desire work, but employment of the highest order that they are qualified to fill. I sincerely hope and believe that every man and woman in the relocation centers, who can be properly qualified for outside employment, will cooperate with us in our effort to make this program an outstanding success."

As a step to expedite the program in the relocation centers, every man and woman, 17 years of age or older, will fill out a special WRA questionnaire to be used in clearance procedures and classification for outside employment. This registration has started and will be conducted simultaneously with the completing of military questionnaires by draft-age nisei men.

Men eligible for military service will not be asked to answer the WRA questionnaire, since the military questionnaire will be used in clearing them for outside employment if they are not inducted into the army.

Clearances are to be speeded, both at the centers and in Washington, to comply as rapidly as possible the register of workers qualified for indefinite leaves.

not live in the same town with them, not the way we feel now."

Another reader, J.S. Bishop of 3150 N.E. Sandy Blvd., Portland, commented:

"I wish to commend most heartily the article in today's Sunday Oregonian entitled 'The Wrong Ancestors.' A plain statement of facts, free from any argument except what they themselves furnish, is sadly needed in these parts. Racial prejudice, degenerated into unreasoning hate by the war in the case of the Japanese, will prove a serious obstacle to a durable peace, unless it can be offset by a calmer, truer judgment based on the statements of unbiased observers.

"I think that some of my associates look upon me as pro-Japanese because I insist that the great majority of them are not tricksters and scoundrels. It was my good fortune not long ago to visit a number of the countries of the world and in none did I receive more genuine, not just formal, courtesy, than in Japan."
