

21 CANDIDATES RUN FOR COUNCIL POSTS

Alternates to Fill Vacant Places on Ballot; 10 Nominees Decline

With the declination of ten out of 21 nominees named at the nominating convention on July 20 to run for Council positions for the coming term, Tom Ogawa, community clerk, issued notices on Wednesday to eligible alternates to fill the vacant places on the ballot.

The general election will be held on Monday, August 7, when the eligible electors of the community will cast their votes at their respective dining halls for the seven councilmen to serve the next term beginning on Sept. 1.

Ogawa announced that the additional 10 names to be placed on the ballot will be picked from the 17 alternates in their order of precedence. The community clerk indicated that it will not be possible until next Monday to ascertain which of the alternates will be on the ballot.

Declining to accept the nomination were men who were named by the block representatives to the convention. They were: Tom Takemoto, Shigeru Ogasawara, Koyama, Dick Toshiji Kanaya, Harry E. Harata, Motokuni Hayakawa, Chusaburo Ito, Tamachi Yamada, Teruo Tauboi, Yorisaku Matsui and Iwao Matsushita.

All residents eighteen years of age or over who are duly registered electors shall be eligible to vote in the coming election. Registration will be conducted in dining halls.

The By-Laws of the Cooperative state that at each semi-annual election the half of the number of the Board of Directors will be held during the first full session of August, started Yoshio Urakawa, executive secretary.

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The outgoing number of Board members to be replaced are as follows: Section I, 1; Section II, 2; Section III, 1; Section IV, 1; Section V, 1; Section VI, 2; and Section VII, 1.

On Thursday, July 27, the delegate members of each section are requested to meet at the dining hall of the section to elect the section chairman and the secretary who are to serve as the election committee. It was learned that the names of section chairmen and secretaries must be submitted to the office of the executive secretary not later than July 29.

A meeting of the section chairman secretaries will be held on Monday, August 31, at the Cooperative main office by the executive secretary. At that time the committee will set the definite date for the regular election as well as the run-off election. The election rules and regulations will also be formulated.

The deleting of the clause which limits the eligibility of the delegates to serve for more than two consecutive terms was rejected at the meeting of the delegates held in Queen City Hall last Monday, according to reports.

A lengthy report on the actions and deliberations of the Board of Directors for the past three months was made by H. A. Myer, general manager, and a treasurer's cash report was given.

Due to the closing of the books for the fiscal year ending June 30, and the opening of new books and transferring of funds for the 1945 fiscal year, June pay and clothing checks have been delayed, according to Marion Byrd, cost accountant.

"The Portland Disbursement Office promised to have the checks ready for the next four or five days," he stated.

In answer to many inquiries as to whether Rohwer center will close, Dillon S. Myer, national director of the WRA, sent the following reply: "I have recently referred there is no decision at this time to close Rohwer or any other center in September or at any other definite date."

First Sgt. Tom Takemoto, who worked in a grocery store in Portland in the years before he was inducted into the Army, was killed in action in the Italian campaign on June 27, as a family was informed here by the War Department on July 20.

Sgt. Takemoto, 27, had experienced overseas duty only one month at the time of his death in Italy. He was graduate of Clatskanie High School in Oregon, he was inducted into the Army on February, 1942.

The death son of Mr. Takichi Takemoto of 20-11-A, he is also survived by brothers Minoru and Taro, and sister, Himeko.

The United Press dispatch from Rome on July 27 reported that Gen. Mark Clark's Fifth Army cleared the lower Arno valley for the Allied army on Friday.

The Fifth Army carried out widespread mopping up operations on the north bank of the Arno and stepped up air-directed artillery fire against enemy strong points and concentration, the dispatch added.

Hunt Volunteers Fight Brush Fires

Mid-summer electrical storms were the cause of two brush fires that hit the surrounding Maglio Valley on July 27, according to reports received by his parents on July 20.

It came as a shock to a host of friends who knew him as a popular fished leader and skilled athlete in the Loura Troys during Seattle days.

In his latest letter, dated June 22, to his sister Chiyu, he wrote "to tell mom not to worry, because you know me, I can take care of myself." In a previous letter, he said that he had narrowly escaped death four times and so "I'll be sure to come back."

Pfc. Tanaka was sent overseas in Feb., 1944, from Camp Shelby, Miss. He was inducted, entering the armed forces on March 9, 1942. The 25-year-old Army man was a member of Franklin High School, 1938, of Seattle, Washington, where he proved himself especially popular with fellow students.

Funeral services will be held at Rec. 22, July 31, from 7 p. m.

Matches Prohibited In Sea Transit

Matches of every description are prohibited in sea international mail as well as in domestic mails requiring sea transportation, according to instructions of the Secretary and Assistant Postmaster General.

Particular attention is called to the fact that matches are not only prohibited in international mail, but also to all foreign countries, including Canada and Mexico, but also to all countries, whether the United States domestic destination where sea transit is involved and to Alaska, excepting whether the destination are members of our armed forces.

In all cases where parcels are presented for mailing to destinations outside of the continental United States, specific inquiry shall be made of the sender by the postmaster or accepting clerk as to whether matches of any description are included in the package.

Construction of Cellars Underway

Construction of additional onion and potato cellars were begun last week near the waterfront. To receive his mail, according to W. E. Haylings acting assistant project director in charge of operations.

"Since this year there is an increase in storage of potatoes, carrots, daikon and turnip, storage for these vegetables cannot be made in one root cellar," Haylings stated.

The root cellar located on the east side adjacent to the waterfront area was constructed last winter.

The cellars will be 40 ft. wide and 200 ft. long and will have a driveway running through the length of the facility for loading and unloading. This project will be completed around the first of October, Haylings said.

The second payment on the 50 per cent of the patronage refunds for the fiscal year ending in March, 1944, will begin on August 1, starting with Block 44, according to Y. Urakawa, executive secretary of the Coop.

The sum of \$28,701.00 will be distributed to the patronage members.

Draft Charge Of 26 Tuleans Dismissed

Judge Rules Internees Not Accorded Due Process of Law

EUREKA, Calif.—An indictment charging 26 Japanese-Americans of the Tule Lake segregation center with Selective Service Act violations was dismissed today by U. S. District Judge Louis E. Goodman, who ruled that an internee was not accorded due process of law, according to an Associated Press report in the July 23 edition of the Los Angeles Times.

In ruling in one case, Goodman said that the internee was in custody under a Presidential citation and "under the circumstances not a free agent nor is any plea he may make free of voluntary, and hence he is not accorded due process in this very proceeding."

"It is shocking to the conscience that an American citizen be confined on the ground of disloyalty and then, while so under duress and restraint, be compelled to serve in the armed forces or prosecuted for not yielding to such compulsion," Goodman ruled.

The judge said that "whether an internee's confinement under a Presidential order is lawful or not is a beside the question."

"The issue raised by this action is without precedent," the decision pointed out. "It must be resolved in the light of the traditional and historic Anglo-American approach to the time-honored doctrine of due process. It must not give way to overzealousness in any attempt to reach via the criminal process the ends which may be regarded as undemocratic."

Assistant U. S. District Attorney Masooka met with the defendants excepted to the decision, keeping open the way for an appeal.

Masooka, it was reported, improvised splints from field jackets and shirts, and calmly supervised the evacuation of the wounded.
