Eliminate Run-Off Election

Eliminate Run-Off Election

Monday, August 7 is the date for the election of Community Council for the cooming six-months term. Judging from the past election, it seems advisable to eliminate the run-off election and seat the councilmen according to the votes received by the seven highest candidates in the general election. Article IV, Section 6 of the Code of Organization stipulates that the run-off election shall be held in the event that all seven positions of the council were not filled in the general election. The candidates, as it stands now, are not elected unless he receives over one-half of the total number of votes east by the qualified electors of the community in the general election.

When the last election 'or councilmen was held in February, only two candidates received majority votes and were elected. A run-off election was held a week later to fill the remaining five positions.

It must be pointed out that the result of the run-off election was practically the same as the general election. However, interest

The Charter can be amended by a joint resolution of the Community Council and the Block Commissioners. Although the election is only a week away, there is still time to amend the Charter to eliminate the necessity of a run-off election.


