## Project Council Takes Up Many Community Problems

Commission at First Meeting Last Friday  
Eight Candidates Nominated for Judicial

At the Community Council and Bk. Commissioners meeting held on Thursday, March 9, Joseph Beeson, relocation officer, presented a brief talk on the relationship between the Community Council and the Relocation Planning Commission. Yoshito Fujii, chairman of the Council, was elected official representative from the Council to the Relocation Commission.

Also the local labor situation and the proposed national relocation conference were discussed. Due to the absence of Harry L. Stafford, project director, the executive secretary's position has not yet been filled. The Council decided to have a joint meeting of the Council and the Commissioners on March 21.

The councilmen met last Friday afternoon at Bk. 22-9-D in regard to a regular meeting schedule. It was their first meeting since their inauguration Feb. 28. It was decided to hold regular monthly meetings on the second Tuesday of each month at 1:30 p. m. and until the council can dispose of all immediate business weekly meetings will be held. It was also decided at the same time that the coordinating commission meetings will be held on the third Tuesday of every month at 1:30 p. m.

To comply with the provisions stipulated in the charter, candidates were nominated by the councilmen to the Judicial Commission for the approval of the Project Director. They are: Dr. M. Kuri, Junjiro Yukawa, Fujio Hata, Seizo Ito, Iwao Matsushita, Y. Matsui, Tamaichi Yamada and Chiochi Hagiwara.

Six standing committees were established at the meeting and committee men were selected to serve on them. The committees established are: Education, Food, Health, Public Relations, Welfare and Juvenile.

Delegation from this project to the national Chicago Relocation conference which was postponed was discussed.

## War Dept. Clarifies Army Policy In Reply to Petition by Mothers

In a letter addressed to Project Director H. L. Stafford, Harrison A. Gerhardt, Lt. Col., general staff corps and executive to assistant Secretary of War, made reply to a petition sent to the Secretary of War by a group of mothers of these units.

The letter follows: "A petition signed by a group of mothers at the Minidoka Relocation Center, addressed to the Honorable Henry L. Stimson, Secretary of War, has been referred to this office for acknowledgment and reply.

"The War Department appreciates the fine spirit with which this group has greeted the reinitiation of selective service for loyal American citizens of Japanese ancestry. I am sure that the sons of these mothers will serve loyally and faithfully in whatever capacity they may be called upon to serve.

"The present assignment of Japanese American inductees is very often interpreted as a segregation policy on the part of the War Dept. This is because the reason for the use of Japanese Americans in a single unit is not clearly understood. There is an urgent present and future need for replacements for the 100th Battalion and the 442nd Central Postal Directory. In order to fill this need, it is necessary to assign inductees for training for these units. Secondly, inasmuch as the War Department fears that retaliatory measures which might be taken against Japanese Americans captured in the Pacific Area are beyond the normal hazards of battle, it has been decided that this group will not be used in this area except for a special assignment. Because of this decision and to avoid an uneconomical and laborious screening process of all units, it has been deemed advisable to train this group as a single unit.

## 536 1/2 Acres to Be Put in Vegetables On Project Farm

Under the approved farm program sent back from the Washington office of WRA 536 1/2 acres of vegetables will be put in the project farm this year. The program was approved with little change and is in most part similar to the program printed in the Jan. 1 issue of the IRRIGATOR, according to W. E. Rawlings, chief of agriculture.

In addition to the 401 1/2 acres of vegetables to be grown for project consumption, 135 acres of staple crops such as potatoes, carrots, cabbage, beets, daisies, onions and turnips will be grown for exchange shipment to other centers.

Four hundred thirty acres will be planted in feed crops for the hog and poultry units. Feed crops will consist of wheat, barley, oats, peas and alfalfa.

The poultry unit will be enlarged until there are 7,500 laying hens in the flock and 24,000 meat birds at the poultry farm for center use.

One thousand - two - hundred - twenty-three hogs are to be slaughtered for the mess management during 1944. There will be 154 fat dressed hogs delivered to the mess management every month starting this month.

Commenting on the Hunt agricultural program, Dillon S. Myer wrote Mr. Rawlings, "You have made considerable progress since last year in reclaiming land and production of agricultural products. Your program for this year is sound and well-thought-out. I want to compliment you and your staff on the manner in which your agricultural program has developed. Your present plans, I am confident, will be carried through to a successful conclusion."

Planting of seedlings will begin Wednesday, March 15, in the hotbeds. Pepper, tomato, cabbage, egg plant and celery plants will be raised in the hotbeds.

Planting of other crops will depend on the ground and weather conditions, stated Rawlings.

Field crops will be planted during the latter part of April and the earlier part of May.

## "Puka Puka" Boys of 100th Battalion Prove Worth Under Fire in Italy

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY IN ITALY—Not many days ago a captured German officer filling to this type of doctrine. These men not only have been fighting with tremendous bravery, carrying the full loads of the larger ordinary G. I. soldier uncomplainingly and saying nothing about suffering from the bitter climate around here and trench foot to which they are unusually susceptible. But in a sense they apparently feel that they are serving in a sort of crusade to make the rest of America understand that they, too, are good loyal citizens.

Their commander, Major Casper Clough, Jr., of Saugerties, N. Y., said: "They are showing the rest of the people that they are just as good citizens as the John Doughboy. As a matter of fact they are the best soldiers I have ever seen."

This writer first encountered members of the "puka puka" around Cassino 12 days ago.

They had been in one of the toughest sections of the line for four nights and five days. They had eaten nothing but cold "K" rations. They had been under constant German observation and fire and could not even move during daylight. Such blankets as they had were useless in the steady cold rain.

Many of them had trench foot to which these men, accustomed to the tropics, were especially susceptible and which to them is unusually dangerous because it affects their circulatory system and often has necessitated amputation.

Said James Oyama of Honolulu: "As we were lying out there in the cold we could hear the German warping themselves at big stoves in their dugouts. It was hard to bring us even cold rations at night. We had heavy casualties. We are only thankful that it is us who are suffering and not our brothers and sisters at home."

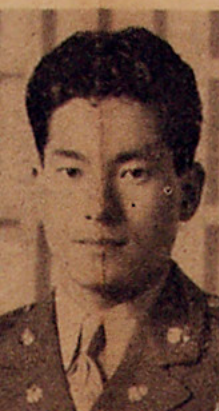
The full story of this battalion and its losses cannot be told yet for military reasons. It took San Michele in a night attack. It launched the first infantry attack right around Cassino, getting ahead of the other units in its enthusiasm. It held a terrible castle hill sector.

The colonel of the regiment to which the battalion is attached has the highest regard for them, as has the general commanding their division. But their battalion commander is the proudest of all.

"They make magnificent soldiers," he says. "All are enlisted men and they are Hawaiian—almost entirely of Japanese extraction, although I have some with purer Hawaiian blood, some Korean, and a few Chinese blood. Some of them are officers and they are exceptionally good."

"They suffer many disadvantages but they never complain."

## Pfc. Fred Sawada Receives Award

As a result of being wounded in action in Italy on Feb. 24 when a land mine exploded, Pfc. Fred Sawada was recently decorated with the Purple Heart. The award is the oldest military decoration of the United States, having been established by Gen. George Washington during the Revolutionary War.

Pfc. Sawada is believed to be the first person of Japanese ancestry from the state of Washington to be so decorated.

He is a graduate of Franklin High, Seattle, where he starred on the track and basketball teams. He was inducted into the army three years ago.

"He is getting along fine now," said his father, S. Sawada, 6-6-F. "And he is anxious to get well so that he can get back into active duty again. I am very proud of him." Pfc. Sawada has a brother George, who is now serving with the Combat Team at Camp Shelby, Mississippi.

## Removal of Nisei From Camp Grant Requested

WASHINGTON—Rep. J. Parnell Thomas, New Jersey Republican, charged last week "a lowering of morale that is seriously affecting the whole institution," and asked the removal of 125 Japanese American soldiers as orderlies at the Camp Grant Military Hospital near Rockford, Ill., according to a story written by Ray Richards.

Thomas transmitted to Gen. George C. Marshall, chief of staff, a house military affairs committee investigation report accusing the Japanese of offenses ranging from arrogance toward the Caucasian soldier-patients to the high-handedness of the Japanese, and recited instances in which the Japanese Americans, for no apparent reason, have been advanced in rating beyond Caucasian soldier performing the same tasks.

## Dr. Ted Tsuboi to Give Optical Exams

These regulations will be put in effect at the main gate Monday.

## Must Return Ration Books

A new procedure for collecting of evacuees' ration books at the gate was announced this week. Any person returning to the project for reinduction must surrender his books at the gate. This surrendering of ration books is a part of the reinduction process and no one can be reinducted without surrendering his ration book or books.

A visitor who registers for seven days or more must surrender his books upon entering the project. If a visitor registers for less than seven days, he must surrender his books on the seventh day of his stay here.

All persons leaving the project will receive their ration books from the Station Office, Bldg. 44. Ad area, at the time of departure. Stamps which have become invalid during the time the person was in the project will be taken out of the book. In the case of a visitor, enough stamps will be taken from his books to cover the period of his visit. These points will be taken on the basis of ten processed food points and ten meat points the first week. The second week, ten processed food points and 20 meat points will be collected.

## March Draft Calls 289 Hunt Men for Army

Draftees to Report to Project Hospital  
For Pre-Induction Examination Mar. 18

Orders to appear for pre-induction physicals which will be held at the project hospital March 18, were received by 289 Hunt men during the past week. The physical examinations are scheduled to begin promptly at 1 p. m. on March 18. All men in the vicinity of Hunt, including those from Twin Falls, will report at the project hospital. Individual memorandums will be sent out to the men indicating the time for them to report, V. V. McLaughlin, assistant relocation program officer, stated.

Men requesting immediate induction can obtain forms from McLaughlin.

The Jerome County Local Board for Selective Service announces that more than 200 sets of papers have been received from the Local Boards of Washington, Oregon and California for men who are now residents of Hunt.

Attention has been called to the fact that it is impossible for a registrant under Selective Service to be transferred permanently from one Local Board to another. A registrant under a Local Board in the State of Washington, for example, will always remain under the jurisdiction of the Washington Local Board which assigned his Serial and Order numbers.

When a registrant is called for pre-induction physical examination or for induction by his own Local Board, his Local Board will transfer the necessary documents to accomplish the physical examination or the induction to a Local Board in the area where the registrant is then located.

When the examination or the induction has been accomplished, the Board of Transfer must return all of the documents to the registrant's own Local Board, and any further action on the registrant's case must be handled by his Local Board.

The Jerome County Local Board stated that many letters are being addressed to them by registrants whose own Local Boards are not in Idaho. In order that there may be no delay in the handling of such mail, the Jerome County Local Board is requesting that registrants' own Local Board number and location be given. This Local Board is always shown on letters addressed to a registrant.

Any Ono, Yasuko Tsuboi, Chiyoko Watanabe and Mary Agnes Uemura are in Jerome last Monday and Tuesday assisting the Jerome County Local Board office in the preparation of forms and records for men who have had their papers transferred to that board for pre-induction physical examination and induction.

Instructions have been received from the Washington office, for the transfer of the labor pool from Central Service to Property Control, reports Dean Miller, acting project director.

Nisei and Selective Service

TO THE NISEI:

America is our home. When our home is in danger, any red-blooded man will fight to defend it. We, the Nisei, will fight to defend America. We should welcome the draft of the nisei as an opportunity to get into the fight.

There are some confused people in the centers who are trying to bargain with the government, and there are others who are trying to evade the draft, on the grounds that we have no rights to fight for. They are mistaken, for we cannot bargain with the U. S. Army and, in fact, we do have certain precious American rights. It seems clear that the Army authorities have extended the privilege of active service to us upon the basic principles of a democracy, for a mere matter of an additional 5,000 nisei soldiers among an army of 10 to 12 million men is of small military importance. But, when we have fulfilled our obligations, then it will be time enough to argue about rights, and we shall be in an infinitely better position to maintain our stand. But, in my personal opinion, it will be unnecessary to insist upon our rights, for the mere assumption of the obligations of citizenship will have inevitably brought the restoration of the rights for which we contend. Every day, we see that this is true.

It is this writer's firm belief that in this particular situation we Nisei must demonstrate our willingness to assume fully and patriotically the obligations of citizenship before we are in any position to petition for a redress of our

ALLOWANCES FOR DEPENDENTS OF SOLDIERS

Under the Servicemen's Dependents Allowance Act of 1942 as amended, the government helps enlisted men and women in all grades to take care of dependents by means of family allowances. Beginning this week the IRRIGATOR will publish the rules and regulations as printed in an official pamphlet "Family Allowances for the Dependents of Soldier" for the benefit of those residents who are about to enter the armed services and those who are already enlisted.—Ed. Note.

- What Is a Family Allowance?**
- A government check sent to the soldier's dependents regularly every month so long as he and they remain eligible. The family allowance is made up of money deducted from the soldier's pay and money contributed by the Government. It is payable only to dependents eligible under the law. It is granted only upon application.
- Who Is Eligible to Receive It?**
- 4. Class A Dependents**—The lawful wife of the soldier, his children, and a former wife divorced who has not remarried and to whom alimony is still payable. These, considered his primary responsibility, need prove only relationship.
- (a) Lawful wife includes wife living in soldier's household, also wife living separate and apart (legally separated) or, if legally separated, under terms providing for maintenance or support. Also includes common-law wife if the marriage was contracted in a state in which common-law marriages were recognized.
- (b) Former wife divorced includes only the former wife who has not re-married and to whom alimony is still payable.
- (c) Child includes soldier's legitimate child, his illegitimate child, a step-child, if a member of the man's household, or an illegitimate child, but only if the required proof of paternity is submitted. Also, any child to whom he has stood in loco parentis (in place of parent) for at least one year prior to date of application. To be eligible, a child must be unmarried and under 18 years of age, or of any age if incapable of self-support by reason of mental or physical defect.
- NOTE**—The husband and child of an enlisted woman are eligible only if they are dependent upon her for their chief support. They must submit as evidence, a Dependency Certificate (WD AGO Form 620) in addition to other evidence required of class A dependents.
- 5. Class B-1 Dependents**—Parents, also minor brothers and sisters who are dependent upon the soldier for their chief support.
- (a) Parent includes father and mother, grandfather and grandmother, stepfather and stepmother, father and mother through adoption, either of the soldier or of his spouse, and persons who, for a period of not less than 1 year prior to the man's enlistment or induction, stood in loco parentis (in place of parent) to the soldier. No more than two parents are eligible for an allowance based on the service of one soldier.
- (b) Brother and sister includes brothers and sisters of the half blood, as well as those of the whole blood, stepbrothers and stepsisters, and brothers and sisters through adoption. To be eligible, a brother or sister must be unmarried and under 18 years of age, or of any age if incapable of self-support by reason of mental or physical defect.
- 6. Class B Dependents**—Parents, brothers, and sisters who are dependent upon the soldier for a substantial portion of their support. Class B dependents may receive a family allowance only if there are NO class B-1 dependents named in the application.
- How Is Application Made?**
7. Application should be made only on the official Form (WD AGO Form No. 625). These forms are available from Army reception centers, Army recruiting stations, local chapters of the American Red Cross, Service Command Headquarters, and the War Department Office of Dependency Benefits.
- Who Should File the Application?**
8. The soldier should apply for the family allowance himself, if practicable. He should file the application with his commanding officer. The official application form (WD AGO Form No. 625) will be given him at the reception center. He should follow carefully the simple instructions printed on the form and, if possible, attach all required documentary evidence to prove claims of relationship and dependency.
9. Dependents may apply, too, but it is best for the soldier to apply. His wife or child (also a divorced wife who has not remarried and to whom alimony is still payable) may receive this benefit with or without his consent. But class B-1 and class B dependents may receive it only if the soldier agrees.
10. All questions on the form must be answered.
11. Documentary evidence must accompany all applications filed by civilians and by soldiers stationed in the continental United States. No payments may be made until such evidence has been submitted and approved. If soldier overseas files application without attaching such evidence, it must be submitted later, or payments may be stopped.
- When Is Application Sent After It Is Filled Out?**
12. Instructions are printed on the form. A civilian applying should retain the copy marked Applicant's Copy and mail the remaining pages of the form to the ODB in Newark, N. J. Soldiers should retain the Applicant's Copy and turn in the other pages of the form to their commanding officer, who will forward it to the ODB in Newark, N. J.
13. Civilians should be sure to put sufficient postage on their envelopes in mailing applications and evidence. Three cents' postage is not always sufficient.
- How Soon Is Family Allowance Payable After Application Is Filled?**
14. For class A and class B-1 dependents, an "Initial" payment (contributed entirely by the Government) is payable for the month in which the soldier enters on active duty in a pay status, provided that he applies within fifteen days of his entry on such duty. Regular monthly payments thereafter are payable from the first of the month following the month in which application was made. For example, if a soldier enters on active duty in November and applies within fifteen days, the "Initial" payment for the month of November is payable as soon as his commanding officer has received his application. The regular monthly family allowance is payable after the end of the next month—December.
15. For class B dependents, no "Initial" family allowance is payable. The regular monthly family allowance is effective for the month in which application is made unless an "Initial" family allowance is payable for that month to class A or class B-1 dependents. In this latter case, the regular monthly family allowance for class B dependents is payable as of the month following that in which application is made.
- How Much Is Deducted From the Soldier's Pay?**
16. \$22 a month, if the family allowance is for class A, class B-1, or class B dependents only. \$27 a month, if it is for more than one class of dependents. This sum is deducted for all regular monthly payments of a family allowance. (No sum is deducted from the soldier's pay for the "Initial" family allowance. The "Initial" family allowance is paid only if the soldier applies within 15 days after he enters on active duty in a pay status. The Government contributes the entire sum of such "Initial" allowance. "Initial" family allowance payments are made by disbursing officers in the field, not by the ODB.)
17. In case alimony payable to a former wife divorced is less than \$22 a month, a monthly deduction of less than \$22 (the exact amount of the alimony) will be made from the soldier's pay, provided the soldier has no other dependents to receive family allowance.
- How Much Will the Soldier's Dependents Get?**
18. The amounts are fixed by law for each eligible dependent. A chart of typical examples follows:

- Class B Dependents**

- (This amount is a flat rate, no matter how many dependents there are and is payable only if there is no family allowance payable to any class B-1 dependents.)
- Combinations**
19. When family allowance payments are being made to more than one class of dependents, the amount of the combined monthly payments may be computed by adding the amounts for each separate dependent, according to the scale shown in paragraph 18. The total will be the combine payment to all such dependents.
- Who Mails The Regular Monthly Checks**
20. The War Department Office of Dependency Benefits, Newark, N. J.
- Will Checks Be Sent To Each Dependent Named In Application?**
21. Unless otherwise requested by the applicant, the full sum due all dependents each month will be mailed in one check. For example, the monthly payment for a wife and two children will be mailed to the wife if she is named as payee in the application. However, payments may be made to more than one dependent, if they are designated by the applicant as payees, or are determined by the ODB to be proper payees. For example, the payments for a dependent father and a dependent mother-in-law may be made in two checks—one to each dependent (if both are dependent upon the soldier for their chief support (class B-1)). In the case of class B dependents, only one may be named as payee.
- What Documentary Proof Must Accompany Application?**
22. For a wife: Proof of marriage to soldier.
- (a) Certified copy of the public or church record of marriage.
- NOTE**—If the preferred proof of marriage cannot be obtained, certain other documents may be submitted for consideration. These include, in the order of preference:
- (1) A photostatic copy of the original marriage certificate. Or, the marriage certificate itself. However, in submitting original certificates, applicants deprive themselves of valued documents, hence the ODB urges submission of a photostatic copy instead. (2) Certificate by the clergyman or public official who performed the ceremony. (3) Affidavits by two eyewitnesses to the ceremony.
- (b) In states or territories where common-law marriages were recognized at the time such relationship existed, affidavit by either the soldier or his common-law wife, and, in addition, affidavits by two other persons having knowledge of the circumstances. These affidavits should state any previous marriages of the soldier or his wife, the date and the manner such marriages ended; when and where the present common-law marriage took place; when the soldier and his wife lived, and during what period of time; and in what manner present marriage is publicly recognized.
- Definition of Affidavit.** An affidavit is a written statement or declaration, made under oath before a civil or military authority who is authorized to administer oaths. An official seal of office should appear on all affidavits executed by a civil authority in those states where seals are required. Proper civil authorities usually include: (a) clerk of court, (b) notary public, (c) captain of a vessel at sea, (d) judge, (e) justice of the peace. Proper military authorities usually include: (a) adjutant or adjutant general of a command, (b) summary court, (c) judge advocate, (d) investigating officer, (e) president of board of officers, (f) recorder of board of officers. Ordinarily, affidavits in support of an application should be made by persons who will receive no benefit from the family allowance being applied for.
23. For a divorced wife or separated wife (with or without children): Proof of divorce or separation.
- (a) Certified copy of the court decree of divorce. (b) Certified copy of the court decree of separation and maintenance. (c) True copy of written separation agreement between soldier and separated wife (when they have not been separated by court order), together with an affidavit (see Definition of affidavit, above) to the effect that the same is a true copy in all respects and is still in full force and effect.
24. For a Child: Proof of age and relationship.
- (a) Certified copy of the public record of birth or church record of baptism (see Note below.) (b) If an adopted child, a certified copy of the court decree of adoption. (c) If an illegitimate child, certified copy of court decree declaring soldier the father of the child, or ordering the soldier to contribute to the child's support, or soldier's written acknowledgment that he is the father of the child. If the soldier applies, his application is acceptable as such acknowledgment. (d) If a stepchild, all of the following evidence: 1. Certified copy of the public record of birth or church record of baptism (see Note, below). 2. Certified copy of public or church record of marriage of child's mother to the soldier, or other acceptable proof of marriage; 3. Written statement of soldier or of other person who filed application, asserting that the stepchild is residing in the household of the soldier. (e) If a child to whom soldier has stood in loco parentis (in place of parent), affidavits from two persons familiar with the facts, stating that the soldier has stood in place of parent to the child for at least one year prior to date of application and stating the extent of parental control exercised over the child.
- NOTE**—If the preferred proof of birth cannot be obtained, certain other documents may be submitted for consideration. These include, in order of preference: 1. Affidavit from physician, midwife, or nurse who attended the birth, or from the godparents. 2. Affidavits from two persons, stating their actual knowledge of the name, age, date and place of birth of the child, and naming the parents. 3. If no other evidence is available, certified copy of records from a family Bible, church, naturalization or immigration office, or a hospital. Also, abstracts of passports or insurance policies, provided such abstracts are certified as true copies by a notary public or similar official and supported by affidavits from two persons familiar with the facts. Jerome Youth Works for Famous American Poet

CHICAGO, Ill.—(Special)—It's a long step from working in a California hop field to employment under one of America's foremost poets, but Kays Miyamoto of the Jerome center has taken the step and he considers it "one of the most interesting ventures of my life."

Miyamoto resettled at Harbert, Mich., in the home of Carl Sandburg, who has gained world-wide fame with his poems about Chicago and the Midwest, and is recognized as the outstanding biographer of Abraham Lincoln.

Miyamoto is a caretaker of the Sandburgs' famous pedigree Tuggerburg and Nubian goats. "Right now," he says, "I'm working under Mrs. Sandburg's direction with 'Allison,' her prize Nubian doe. She hopes to win nation-wide honors with Allison as the foremost milk-producing doe of its class."

Although he has worked for the Sandburgs less than one month, Miyamoto says, "I'm accepted as one of the family. I live in the home, I share the family table, and in the evenings I sit in the family circle and listen to Mr. Sandburg read from his literary writings."

He is not the only nisei employed there. Miss Sanao Imoto from Poston has been Mrs. Sandburg's secretary for almost one year.

Miyamoto previously lived in Elk Grove, Calif.

"One of the best things about the Sandburgs is their friendliness," he says. "When I arrived Mrs. Sandburg said: 'Everything here is yours. As long as you are here, you're one of the family.' That's what I call democracy," he added.

The Sandburgs live in a large four-story house on the edge of Lake Michigan, some 60 miles southeast of Chicago, in the dunes region that borders the southern tip of the lake.

"Mr. Sandburg is crazy about his granddaughter," says Miyamoto. "He writes beautiful little nonsensical poems for her and reads them to us at night."

Besides Miyamoto there is a hired girl who helps with the milking of the goats. He helps feed them, bed them, and keeps the barn in order. There are more than 100 Tuggerburgs and Nubians on the place.

"I've never done this type of work before, but it's interesting and I'm learning fast."

"Yes," says Miyamoto, "I'm glad that I have relocated. I'm glad I am with the Sandburgs. They are a real American family."
