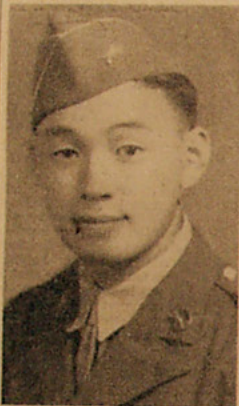


Two Hunt Soldiers Die on Italian Front

442nd 1st Bn. Redesignated Nisei Men Form 171st; Regiment in Class By Itself

Though redesignated as the 171st Infantry Battalion since Thursday, August 10, and not the First Battalion, 442nd Infantry Regiment, it means no change in the hard-training nisei men, said The Reveille, Camp Shelby newspaper last week.

Lt. Col. Sherman L. Watts, the commanding officer of the new Battalion, cited cases of men working after hours on the range—on their own time and of their own accord—to perfect marksmanship.

Most of the cadre—the non-com instructors—have passed their expert infantryman tests and will soon be receiving the coveted blue and silver badges, the colonel said.

Redesignating of the 442nd First Battalion to a battalion separate, puts the 171st in a class almost or completely by itself, Colonel Watts said there were few if any other separate infantry battalions in the Army of the United States.

Basically the change means that the outfit will be able to carry a medical detachment, other service units, and provisional companies if necessary, The Reveille said.

Co-op Patronage Refunds Completed

The second payment on the 50 per cent of patronage refunds for the fiscal year ending in March, 1944, was completed the first three days of August, announced Y. Urakawa, executive secretary.

Since the opening of the Cooperative stores on August 30, 1942, the total sum already distributed to the members is \$61,569.67. The first payment of \$29,185.67 was made on July 25, 1943, at the close of the books in March, 1943.

The membership collected in March, 1943, was \$11,512.00, and in March, 1944, \$2,550.19, making a total amount of \$14,062.19 received from the Cooperative members. At the present time, there are 2,676 patrons.

Inspector From Immigration Dept. Arrives Wednesday

Guy H. Walter from the Spokane office of the Immigration and Naturalization Department will arrive here Wednesday, August 23 through August 25, to take applications for lost or destroyed Alien Registration Receipt Cards, Certificates of Identification and take care of other matters concerning immigration and naturalization, according to Frank S. Barrett, project attorney.

So far appointments have been arranged for 26 residents and if there are any other residents who have business pending with the Immigration Service, they should advise the project attorney so appointments can be provided.

"Residents who wish to talk with the representative of the Immigration Department should bring their own interpreters to my office, because there will be no interpreters present," said Barrett.

Those who failed to report were: George Shigeki Kaasahara, Donald A. Moto, Yutaka Frank Maruhashi, Masakuni Kawako, Frank Tobe Matsuzaki and Isao Nakashima. These six men left the project yesterday morning under Federal custody to await trial in September.

Gas Drum Tips; Ignites Truck; Occupants Unhurt

Refugee Site Completed

WRA Takes Over 1,000 European War Victims In Oswego, N. Y.

Secretary of the Interior Harold L. Ickes announced recently that preparations have been completed by the War Relocation Authority at Fort Ontario in Oswego, New York, for receiving the group of nearly 1,000 European refugees who are being brought to the United States in accordance with the plan announced by President Roosevelt on June 9.

The group is being housed at the historical fort, the Secretary explained, for the wartime period, in two-story barracks which have been remodelled into family apartments. Thirty barrack buildings which have been remodelled into family apartments, a thirty barrack building have now been divided by partitions so that each contains eight apartments of varying sizes. These have been equipped with running water and supplied with cots, tables, chairs, and clothing lockers. Dormitory space has also been prepared for the individual refugees who are not attached to family groups, WRA officials said.

The WRA, which was made responsible by the President for administration of the Emergency Refugee Shelter, took over custody of the grounds at the Fort from the army on July 28. A staff of approximately 40 WRA employees is now stationed at the Fort.

Information received from a WRA representative who is returning from Europe with the refugees indicates, it was announced, that most of the refugee group are Jewish with small contingents of Roman Catholics, Greek Orthodox and Protestants. The principal nationalities represented are Austrian, Yugoslav, Polish, German, Russian and Czech.

Tule Youth Struck By Coal Truck Dies

NEWELL, Calif.—Four-year-old Osamu Nakata, son of Mr. and Mrs. Shigeto Nakata, formerly of Fresno, California, and the Jerome relocation center, was instantly killed last Monday when struck by a dump truck loaded with coal, according to a teletype from R. R. Best, project director of Tule Lake.

The evasive driver of the truck was cleared of all blame by E. R. Server, Modoc county coroner, who investigated the accident. Although there were no witnesses, it was believed the boy was running alongside the truck when the vehicle started to turn and struck him with the right rear wheel. The truck was preparing to stop at a block to unblock and was only moving about 5 miles an hour in second gear.

Besides his parents, he is survived by two brothers and a sister.

Mexican Youth Poses as Nisei In Manzanar

Ralph Lazo, 19, of Mexican parentage who passed himself off as a Japanese American for two years, was discovered on August 5 with the announcement that he would be released from the Manzanar Relocation Center for induction into the Army, according to the Los Angeles Times.

Lazo, who registered as a nisei in May, 1942, was sent to Manzanar, and has been out of the center only twice. He gave the following reason for registering as a Japanese American: "My Japanese American friends at high school were ordered to evacuate the West Coast, so I decided to go along with them. Who can say I haven't got Japanese blood in me? Who knows what kind of blood runs in his veins? I cast my lot with the Japanese Americans because I did not believe that my friends of Japanese ancestry were disloyal to the United States."

Lazo, who was born in Los Angeles hospital in 1925, expressed hopes of being sent to Camp Savage Intelligence School where he could take advance studies in reading and writing Japanese which he started in Manzanar.

"One of these days, I am getting a four-day pass to Rome. I'll see if I can find something good to send home."

"Mom, those four roses I sent home were blessed by the Pope. Keep one and wrap the others up. I want to send them to George and Art."

"Every now and then we receive fresh doughnuts from the Red Cross. They taste very good. We have been buying rice from the people here so we eat rice quite often."

"Will write later, and please don't worry. Your son, TADAO."
