Our Grave Hospital Situation

Our Grave Hospital Situation

We have always been proud of our local hospital. The big, clean 200-bed sanctuary for the project sick has always been pointed out the first to visitors. It has housed hundreds of patients and nursed them back to health.

For some time now it has faced a critical labor shortage. Nurses' aides, ward secretaries, medical records clerks are vitally needed to solve the community health problem. Where up to 70 nurses' aides are absolutely imperative, our hospital is limping along with only 45! Summer vacation and its consequent youthful help has appeased the shortage for a little time, but with the opening of school, 11 terminations have already passed through.

Days pass with the very sick receiving only a minimum of service, while the limited personnel unselfishly works overtime to ease the suffering of the patients.

Every family on the project has at one time or another been in contact with the hospital. Residents must make up the vital need for hospital help if our sick neighbors are to be relieved.

If only to work part-time, if only to receive the excellent experience, if only for the desire to make our sick residents a little more comfortable . . . help is needed NOW!

The Community Council has mulled over the problem, and has discussed making it mandatory for every block to contribute one nurses' aide.

It will be the third time they go through registration, compare study programs, compare teachers, and finally fall into the familiar routine of going to school. In spite of the time that has passed since the first time they sat down in strange surroundings, students will nevertheless feel alien in returning to tables and chairs. The graduates of 1943 have set the foundation for a fine student council, girls' and boys' clubs, sports, dramatics, etc. But it is up to the new student body to take over where they left off.

The students of project high schools have something over their fellow teen-agers in the big-city schools. Their scholastic averages are high. Former members now relocated, have all made successful conquests in their respective schools. They have made the best out of a tragic happenstance, and built a school with a proud reputation, and an admirable aura of "good school" around the gray barracks.

They have the right to say, "No, we we didn't have all the advantages of your city schols... the material was there, but in its raw form, and we had to mold and create... we learned a lot on the way... have you learned as much?"


