NEW ORDERS REGARDING IRANSFERS

Latest orders concerning the transfer of evacues between WCCA Centers to WRA Relocation Centers were received yesterday. The ruling governs those who wish to transfer, other than those individuals or parties transferring under official orders.

Consideration will be giv en only for the purpose of reuniting immediate families, members which resided together prior to evacuation, and that, if such in dividuals are physically or mentally dependent upon the family for maintenance. Immediate family is defined as husband, wife, children and other relations as actually resided with the family as a member prior to evacuation. This does not include married children who prior to ovacuation maintained soparate households.

Requests received in San Francisco from other sources than through the Center manager will be return ed, without action, to the Center manager for proper investigation and submission.

Prospective transferers will fill out set application forms. Applications for transfor will be carofully reviewed, and reasons transfer other than that listed above, and actions that do not appear to be warranted, will be returned to the applicant disapproved. When approvod by the Center manager, applications will be forwarded to Chief, TSO Division, through Chief, crations Branch.

When other reasons than listed above are presented to the Center Manager, and when in his opinion, such reasons have merit, the ap plication may be forwarded and set forth for consider ation.

PAY CHECKS DUE AGAIN SATURDAY

The much anticipated second pay checks have arrived today and will be given out tomorrow morning, Satur day, July 18, at the canteen cashiers window, start ing at 8:30 a.m. May 14 to June 13 and will be giv on out from four window booths, starting at one end where all the professionals and skilled will be paid and the other three windows will accomodate the unskilled. The unskilled will be lined up in rows according to their identification number.

The cashiers window is lo cated by Section 7.

SOMETHING WRONG?

"My roof loaks!" "There're at least 6 alarm clocks that wake me each morning." "Can we make a door between our two apartments?" "We're too far from the nur sery." "WE WANT TO MOVE!" These are just a few of the cries heard daily by the Lodging crew. The work of the Lodging office doesn't center exclusively with general labor, but deals with the shelter of the 3600 or so residents of this Center. And that's no easy task.

One of the biggest problems is to keep people from moving into different apartments without proper notification. Checks of all residents are made dai ly by section foremen who make up records and note changes. The count made by the Lodging office must tally with the nose-count of the fire department and the finance office. The check-up is made by 7 watchmen in all 6 residential sections and the men's dor mitory , which includes 679 apartments, many which are divided into two smaller quarters. Section 4 is the largest with 150 apartments section 5 has 125; section 2--121; section 3--107; section 1--86; and section 7--80. The men's dorm, section 8, includes 261 bods.

Sally Takami is manager of the department, and is assisted by Mrs. Taiko Yam amoto. Mr. Bill Powell is head supervisor of the Lod ging office.

The kind of work done by them is often unsung, but they can rost assured, not unappreciated.
