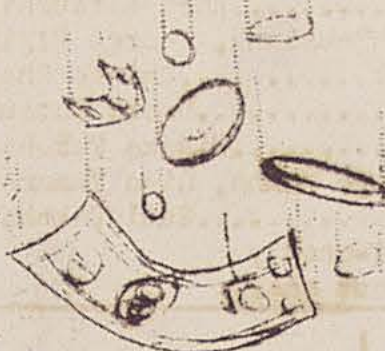

## BICAN ANNOUNCES NEW SYSTEM

A new detailed procedure concerning the selection of an Advisory Committee will be released at a near date by Mr. L. Bican, Center manager.

Twenty-one members will be nominated by the Center populace to form a panel. From the elected panel, the Center manager will appoint 7 to act as the Advisory Committee. On the Advisory Committee will be both Issai and Nisei (citizen or non-citizen), selected proportionately to their population in the Center. English speaking adult residents, both Issai and Nisei, without regard to age, who are capable of such a position will be given an opportunity to file for the position.

Voting will be conducted by secret ballot. All the people in the Center 16 years of age or over will be eligible to vote.

Details for the nomination and election will be released at a later date by the Center manager.

## ASHWORTH NEW CENTER CASHIER

Mr. Roy Ashworth, formerly with the Federal Works Agency in Portland, has replaced Mr. A.E. McAlister, head cashier of the Center, who has accepted a position with the Federal Housing Administration in Vancouver. McAlister held the position since the organization of the Canteen. ## BOARD OF SECTION MGRS. ORGANIZED 25 COMPLETE FIRST AID COURSE

In order to disseminate information and keep in contact with Center residents on all lines of public relations, a board of section managers has been organized. The duties of the managers will be strictly of advisory nature, such as observing welfare, sanitation, requests, and complaints of the people.

## NISEI

During previous years, the guidance and leadership of a Japanese community have been undertaken by the issei. However, in recent years, a few nisei have gradually begun to replace the issei as community leaders. And now under the presiding situation, we should realize that the era of the Issei is a thing of the past, and that the nisei must familiarize themselves with the various conditions and details that must be encountered in any community. Good leaders make the good community, careful and sagacious processing of details is the most integral factor that makes the well functioning community and it is only natural that those with intelligence and initiative will be the leaders.

Under the guidance of the issei, we lived day to day in a natural sort of way. However, living in a community with Caucasian and Oriental customs consolidated, our attitude must have been a trifle superficial. There is no question of loyalty to the United States, but the mode of merged living must have been incongruous. Let us reiterate that the era of the issei is past, and that from here on, it is up to the nisei who have been educated in ways of American living and who can visualize the progress of a community, to assume the leadership responsibilities of present and future communities. Let us always keep in mind that from here on, it is up to the NISEI.

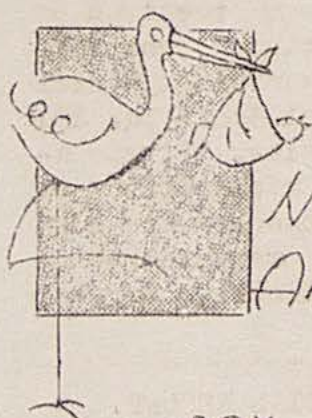
# BUDDHISTS HOLD FIRST SOCIAL FETE

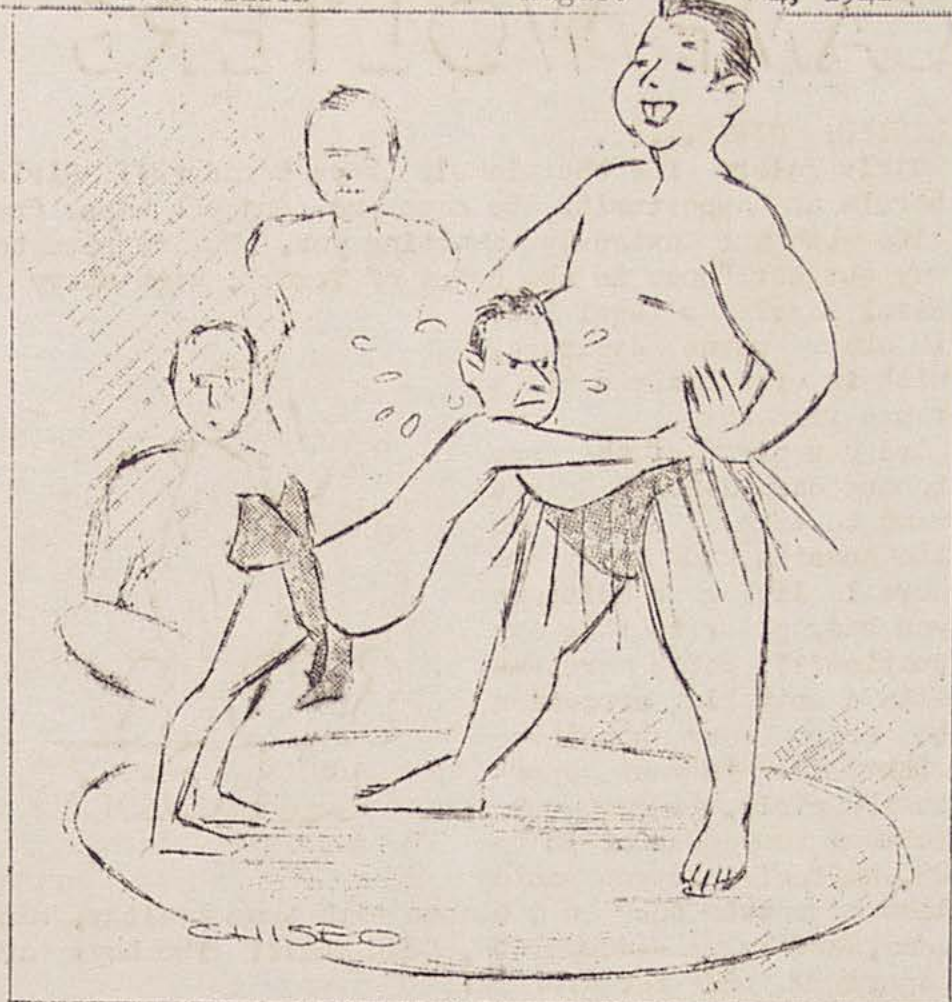
The pupils will begin with charcoal drawings and sketching; design and pottery work have been planned for more advanced work.
