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NISEI

During previous years, the guidance and leadership of a Japanese community have been undertaken by the issei. However, in recent years, a few misei have gradually be gun to replace the issei as community leaders. And now under the presiding situation, we should realize that the era of the Issei is a thing of the past, and that the misei must familiarize themselves with the various conditions and details that must be encountered in any community. Good leaders make the good community, careful and sagacious processing of details is the most integral factor that makes the well functioning community and it is only natural that those with intelligence and initiative will be the leaders.

Under the guidance of the issei, we lived day to day in a natural sort of way. However, living in a community with Caucasian and Oriental customs consolidated, our attitude must have been a trifle superficial. There is no question of loyalty to the United States, but the mode of merged living must have been incongruous. Let us re iterate that the era of the issei is past, and that from here on, it is up to the nisei who have been educated in ways of American living and who can visualize the progress of a community, to assume the leadership responsibilities of present and future communities. Let us always keep in mind that from here on, it is up to the NISEI.


