"GAL-A-VANT" FOR GIRLS MONDAY

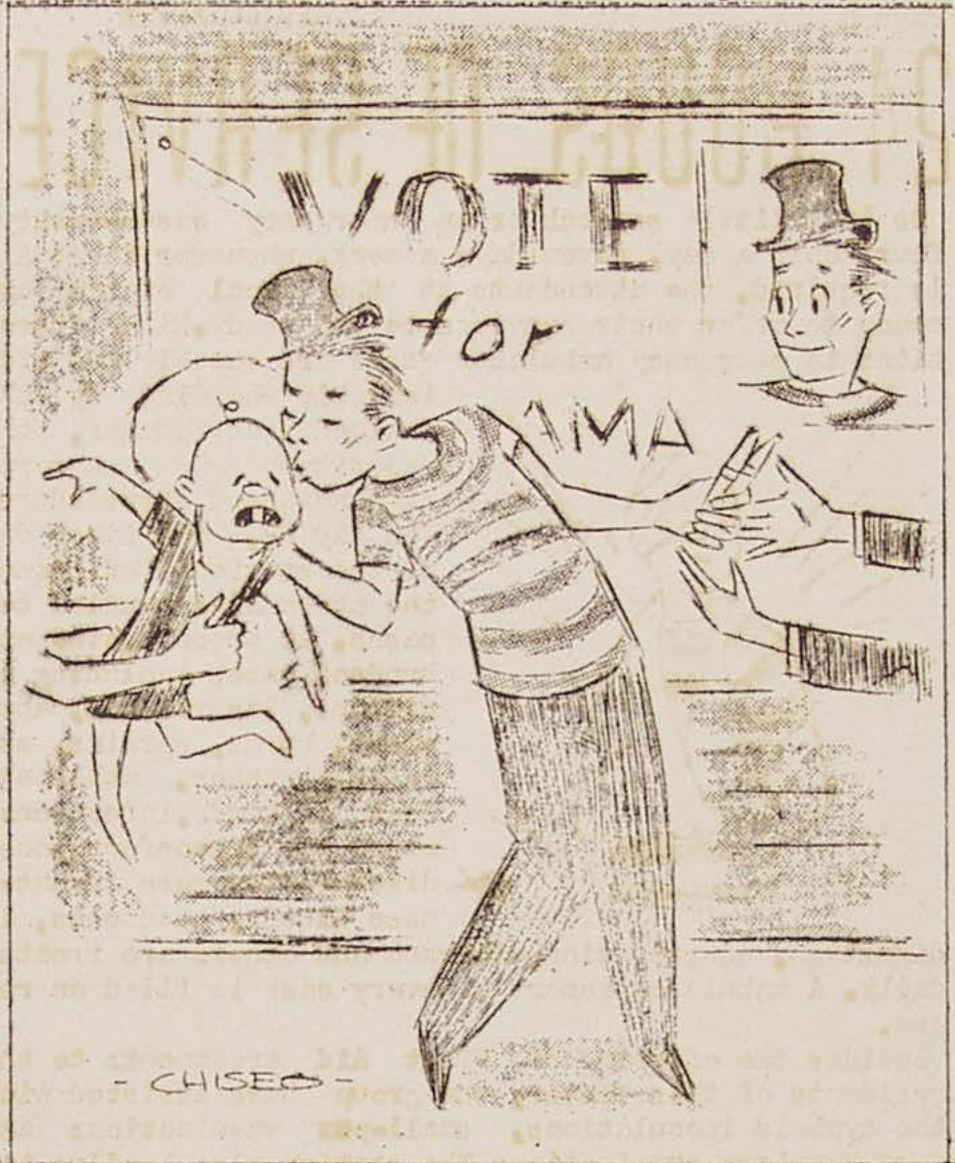

24 HOURS OF SERVICE

Be it a little scratch or an emergency case--twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week, whenever First Aid is required, the attendants at the local station are ready to offer their services to the needy. Minor insect bites to emergency ambulance cases are capably and efficiently handled by the trained attendants, the majority of whom are certified advanced FirstAiders.



On May 27, the first day of the station's existence the attendants handled ten cases. At present, over one hundred cases including incisions, lacerations, abrasions, burns, sprains, strains, rashes, athlete's feet and hands, infections, minor eye discomforts, nose discomforts, sore throats, nose bleeds, headaches, in-

digestion, constipation, diarrhea and others are treated daily. A tabulated report of every case is filed on record.

Besides the offering of First Aid treatments to the residents of this Center, the group have assisted with the typhoid inoculations, small-pox vaccinations and food handlers examinations. The station also handles the outside calls for doctors, issuance of salt pills, night emergency calls, quarantines, ambulance service and a dermatology clinic.

All this and then some are performed by the group of three class B foremen, ten workers, one secretary and a number of volunteer assistants with Dr. Ted Tsuboi as chief supervisor.

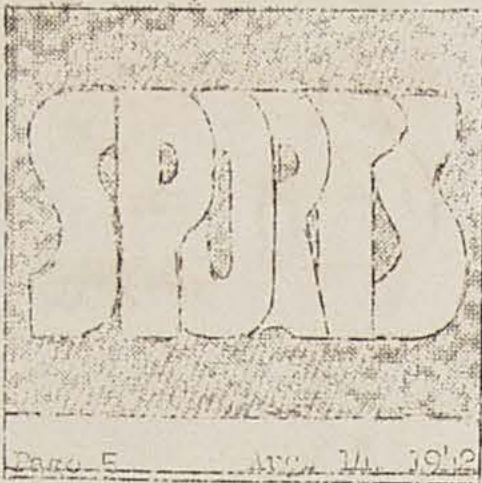
