The contents, the working principles, and the descriptions of four types of incendiaries were also given as well as the methods for fighting these bombs.

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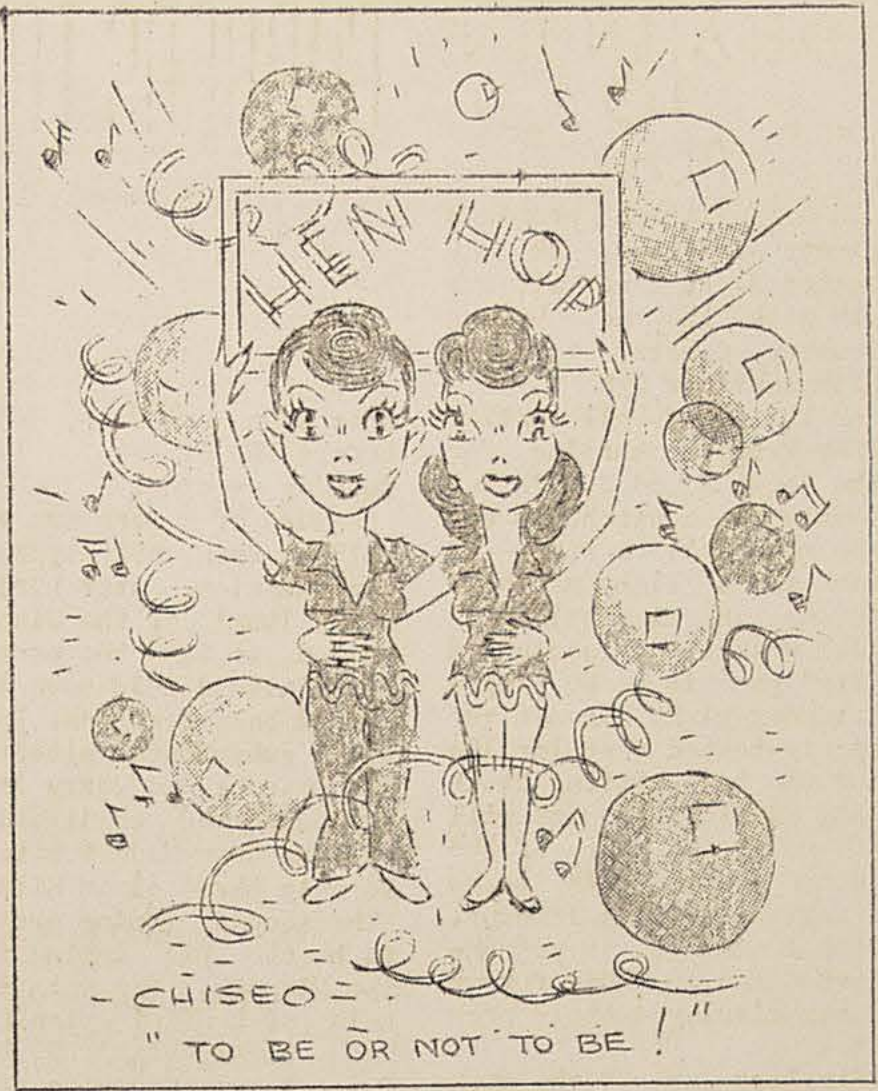
## VISITING RULES CHANGED

According to a letter from Tom Hayashi, formerly of Astoria, to Mr. Ernest Leonetti, Oregon WCCA manager the evacuees now at Tule Lake are content and happy in their new home. We quote his letter as follows:

"Accommodations excellent barracks strongly built, washrooms sanitary and convenient, food plenty and well balanced, weather unpredictable at present (cold and rainy the last two days). Large recreational building for sports unbuilt, but have 39 blocks. Entire city of 39 blocks will accommodate 11,000 people. The people are satisfied and happy. Today everyone will begin work on temporary assignments. Recreation has possibilities but will require a strong staff and much work."

According to information we have received from other evacuees, the trip took one whole day. Conditions are said to be much better than the rumor that has been heard around here.
