
A volunteer group of fifteen men left for the sugar beetfields last night at 8:40 P. M. from here.

The men boarded a Grayline Bus in front of the building and as some 300 persons waved farewell, they proceded to the Union Station to board the Portland Rose The bus was esat 9:45. corted by army jeeps and state troopers.
