Evoing the possibility of attending some eastern or midwestern college, one hundred twenty-five students in this Center have filled in Student Relocation Questionnaires. The registration was conducted by the Center's Nisei Questionnaire Committee that works hand in hand with the Portland Relocation Council of which Dr. G.A. Oggers is chairman, and Miss Jo Anne Russell, secretary.

Detailed triplicate copies were made by each prospective student, to be mailed to the West Coast Committee in San Francisco for consideration. The program will include all group "eligible for advanced training" graduates and professional students as well as high school graduates and college students. Few more days will be allowed for all those who have not yet signed up. It is being urged that irregardless of possibilities of actually attending institutions, all interested post-high school young people register, as extension and study courses may be established in Centers depending on the response shown.

All questionnaires should be turned into the Committee and not directly to San Francisco.

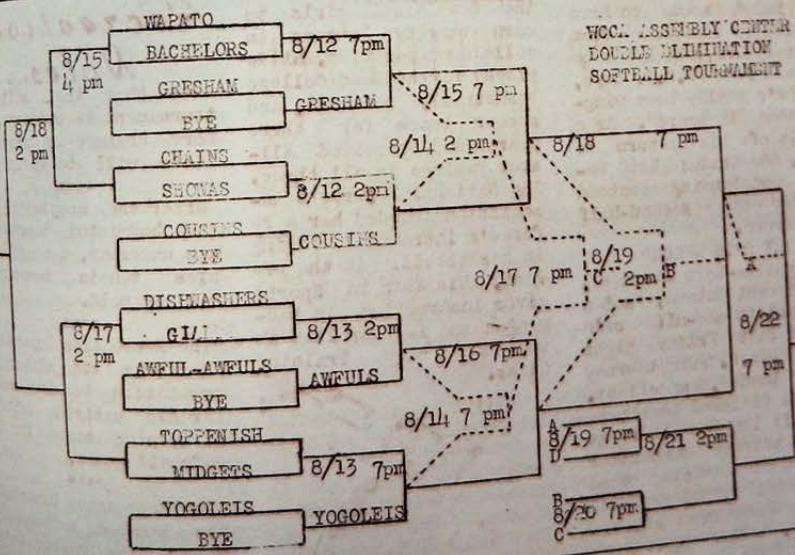
