Representative Due Here From U.S. Civil Service

To Obtain Application of Nisei Eligible for Skilled Occupation

A representative from the United States Civil Service Commission is expected to visit the center in the near future to get application forms into the hands of American citizens of Japanese origin who have already been cleared for permission to leave the center and have skills in shortage occupations.

The representative will make necessary arrangements for assembled examinations such as stenographers and typists. It was revealed in Circular Letter No. 3982, sent out by the United States Civil Service Commission to utilize American citizens of Japanese origin in War Relocation Centers.

After those persons who have been cleared by the WRA have been examined and rated eligible, the application and other civil service papers of those who are found qualified in all respects (including medical examination) and are available for appointment in Washington, D.C., in positions for which direct recruiting is being conducted (particularly stenographers, typists and clerks) will be sent immediately to the U.S. Civil Service Commission." Critical Injuries Sustained by Child In Auto Accident

Akio Inazu, age 2, was injured in an automobile accident at the intersection of 8th and A streets Monday morning. Sustaining fracture of the right femur, multiple contusions and possible internal injuries, it was reported that his condition is critical.

The accident occurred when the child was playing near the street with his playmates. The Mack water truck was passing east on the right side and little Akio attempted to grab the guard rail and climb on. The driver was exonerated of all charges and was not held.

Athletic Shoes

Instructions Released By OPA

From the Office of Price Administration comes the following instructions on how athletic shoes may be acquired.

Non-professional consumers may buy a pair of baseball, bowling, track or other rationed athletic shoes by using stamp 17. If a person has spent his stamp, but later needs shoes, he must apply at his local board for the additional ration stamp providing there are no unspent stamps in his family and he has less than two pairs of wearable and repairable street shoes.

NON-PROFESSIONALS

Members of semi-professional and company teams are not considered professional athletes and therefore baseball shoes worn by them are considered "work shoes." For such persons athletic shoes can be acquired only in conformance with the shoe ration regulations as they apply to the average consumer. However if a member of a semi-pro or "company" team spends his stamp 17 for athletic shoes and there are no unspent stamps in his family he may apply for a supplemental ration ticket for street shoes when he has less than two pairs of wearable or repairable street shoes.

TWELVE RECRUITS LEAVE CENTER FOR INDUCTION STATION IN UTAH

First contingent of Army volunteers to leave this center, 12 men who successfully passed their medical examinations which were held the first of April, left early yesterday morning by bus to be inducted at Fort Douglas, Utah. From Fort Douglas they will be transferred to Camp Shelby, Miss., to undergo basic training in the all-nisei combat unit.

The group consisted of Takeo Hirashima, Ken Onodera, Ichiro Matsuzawa, Fumio Jack Okamura, Suichi Ogura, Clarence Achiu, Heynai Iiyama, Isao Hara, Takeshiro Yamamoto, Henry Hikiida, Hideo Enomoto and Hiroshi Ukita.

The volunteers were recruited last month by the Army team headed by Lieut. Eugene Bogard, following the mass registration for leave clearances in all centers. The volunteers are among the 2500 from Hawaii and 2500 from the relocation centers who will form the combat team. They were preceded by 300 Japanese-American soldiers who are training cadres. The cadres, forming the nucleus of the unit, have been at Camp Shelby for several weeks awaiting the arrival of the new recruits.

Ways of Democracy Observed by Youths

In observance of Boys and Girls Week, various activities have been planned to carry out the theme "Learning the Ways of Democracy." Each day of this week has a significance which will be observed in the classrooms. Local Hi-School Adopts Ratified Constitution

A constitution for the Manzanar high school has been prepared and ratified by over 96 percent of the student body.

Under the direction of Dr. W. Melvin Strong, curriculum advisor, a parliamentary procedure study group, consisting of a pupil representative and a faculty member from each homeroom worked on plans for a constitution and a student council for about six weeks.

Storage Problem Solved for Army Volunteers

The Evacuee Property Office announces receipt of the following interpretation of the storage and transportation of personal effects for Army volunteers:

"The evacuee is enlisting or being inducted into the Armed Forces, he is to be treated the same as any other evacuee. If property is at the Project it may be stored at the Project. If they wish their property shipped from the Project to any other place they are entitled to one shipment of 500 pounds, or less, at Government expense. If they have been relocated outside the Project and their property has been shipped to them, that is all they are entitled to."

LIMIT OF 500 POUNDS

It was also announced that the office will approve shipment of personal effects and household goods for evacuees leaving on work leave within the limit of 500 pounds stipulated in the Administrative Instruction No. 78. However, Earl W. Barton, Evacuee Property Officer, stated that evacuees are only entitled to one movement of the property from the Project at government expense.

Local Red Cross Recent Bazaar Proves Successful

Interesting and instructive programs were given with many speaking on American Red Cross work and activities in peace as well as at times of war on Wednesday and Thursday at 19-15. Refreshments were served and the bazaar, ended successfully.

The first aid classes met every Thursday afternoon while the nutrition and home nursing classes will soon begin. Hundreds of messages have been sent to Japan from Manzanar residents through the American Red Cross.

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Youth Training for Tomorrow—

"Our most valuable resource is, and will continue to be, our youth who will become our men (and women). This is a resource which can be lost through ill health, lack of preparation in skills, and above all by lack of preparation in the democratic way of life. It is not necessary to sacrifice any military advantage to continue the care and education of American youth. Youth need not be set apart in some glass house where care and education are administered. They must, instead, be taken more completely into the life of the community and be taught through example the value of the democratic way of life." (From "Youth In a World at War," by Donald J. Shank, Bulletin of the American Council on Education, October, 1942.)

PLAN FOR YOUTH

While millions are fighting on the battlefields for democracy, millions of youths can be trained in the home, church, school, youth organizations and others to become successful exponents and proponents of democracy in the future. During this Boys and Girls Week when special interest is placed on youth, much can be done to stimulate a year-round activity program for the general welfare of boys and girls.

"A well rounded Boys and Girls Week program," writes the National Boys and Girls Week committee, "is designed to produce some or all of the following results:

1. Conducting surveys of the boy and girl life of the community;
2. Giving new impetus to existing boys and girls work agencies;
3. Enabling business men and women to appreciate what boys and girls mean to business;
4. Developing a closer understanding between boys and girls and their parents;
5. Establishing playgrounds, swimming pools, camps, community centers, clubs, and many other constructive agencies;
6. Creating added interest in occupational guidance and training for boys and girls;
7. Promoting the teaching and practice of democracy within the home, church, school and other community agencies."

Dear Pal:
When you bade me farewell I didn't say goodbye. Though knowing that seven or eight months, or even one year would elapse until we meet again, I didn't say goodbye. When the bus began to move, you saw me wave from the window, and even after your figure stood dimly in the distance I kept on waving. But never did the word "goodbye" reach my lips. These words which express a permanent or long separation weren't meant for pals like us. Ours was only a separation for the best season.

In the grasp of your handshake I felt the intimacy of our friendship. I always admired you for being able to find the right words to say at the right time, but this time you stammered and stuttered. What you said was sincere, but when you smiled I knew that you were fighting hard to hold back the tears. When I expressed the fact that I'll come back soon, you broke down with, "Maybe if you find the job too tough, you'll not." You didn't finish the sentence, sensing you might have offended me. Being a big you embarrassed. I cracked a joke. It wasn't funny but you laughed. Your unfinished sentence didn't offend me, pal. On the contrary. It only goes to show that you really treasure my friendship as I do yours.

WILL YOU REMEMBER?

As evacuees of Manzanar Center, we're proud to volunteer to save the sugar crop. In this little center we hope that people at this center as well as elsewhere can continue to enjoy their coffee with some sugar. Speaking about coffee, the next time you drink a cup of coffee at the messhall and put that teaspoonful of sugar in it, give the boys who are out in the sugar beet fields a thought, won't you? We sure will appreciate it.

I was happy when you told me to take care of myself. It wasn't exactly what you said, but rather the spirit in which you said it. A spirit possessed by only friends like you, pal, whose memories I shall always treasure and cherish. It only goes to show that friends are the best things a fellow could have.

Today I'm only one of the boys who are picking beets. I work hard, sleep sound, and feel much better. True, life out here is not a bed of roses. But one consolation I have is that I am a free man. I can do what I please, when I please, and how I please.

Back at Manzanar I was given three square meals and a drink to live in. Out here I am free to earn those things. It gives me a certain feeling of independence to think that I am on my own. I must admit at this writing that one year at Manzanar has made me afraid to face honest-to-goodness work.

The farmer out here treats me swell. So you see, pal, this beet work is not what some people painted it to be. Isn't there a saying that goes something like, "believe half of what you see and only one-fourth of what you hear?"

VALUE OF A FRIEND

It is only at times like these that one realizes the value of a friend. When I used to ask the question, "how are you?" it seemed to be just an everyday speech like "good morning" and "good night." Now I realize for the first time how much the answer to that question means to me. When you have time drop a line, won't you? I never was much when it comes to expressing myself but I'll write now and then too.

Once, when I was asking about furlothing, someone made a statement implying that only fogs went out for beet work. Then, again, there were people like you. You told me everyone was entitled to his own opinion. What you said to relieve my wounded feelings won't be forgotten for you represent the true symbol of a real pal.

Instructions read:
SAME CONSIDERATION
Those who are eligible will be given the same consideration in connection with the submission of their names on requisitions as other eligibles. Before an individual can enter the Eastern Defense Command area, he must be cleared by the War officials in Washington, D.C., through appropriate military officials.

Direct recruiting of eligible persons for positions in the field may follow the same general procedures as outlined for Washington, D.C., except that clearance with the Eastern Defense Command will not be necessary unless these eligibles are to be appointed to a field position located in the Eastern Defense Command area, it was announced. Anyone interested in Civil Service should register at the local Relocation office in 1-2-2.
